The celebration was a magical walk down the history of our club and a great time to celebrate among many car enthusiasts from all parts of the country.







Ford Marks a Century of Building Trucks


Announced on January 11, 1917, and introduced to the public six months later, Ford's one-ton truck chassis — later identified as the Model TT — was intended to fill a niche previously occupied by aftermarket suppliers. Originally available only as a rolling chassis, the Ford TT, which marked its 100th birthday on July 27, laid the groundwork for every Ford truck that would follow, including the perennially best-selling Ford F-150 pickup.

As soon as Henry Ford's Model T was launched in 1909, aftermarket suppliers began to adapt it for commercial purposes, adding stake beds and van backs to carry cargo. Sensing the opportunity, Ford supplied its customers and dealers Model Ts in rolling chassis form for conversions, some of which included strengthened frames and wheelbases longer than the T's 100 inches. For those seeking utility with less carrying capacity, Ford's Commercial Roadster, introduced in 1910, offered a small pickup bed (which could be adapted for use as a flatbed) and a removable third seat.

By 1914, third-party suppliers were building heavily modified versions of the Model T chassis capable of hauling up to three tons of cargo. The company began to receive more requests to build a heavy-duty platform of its own, but Henry Ford found himself distracted by several projects, including the

development of Fordson tractors and a December 1915 trip to Europe to negotiate an end to the first World War. His efforts in regards to the latter proved unsuccessful.

As Pat Foster writes in Ford Tough — 100 Years of Ford Trucks, Ford sent a letter to its dealer network in 1916, advising them that conversion of Model T chassis for heavy-duty purposes was henceforth prohibited, citing safety reasons. While this may have been a valid excuse, Ford itself was in the process of developing a one-ton truck chassis, and hoped to eliminate the

competition prior to its launch.

In January 1917, the United States' entry into the war still seemed uncertain. With an eye towards business, Ford formally announced its one-ton truck chassis on January 11, proclaiming a base price of \$500. A production schedule wasn't announced, which proved to be a good thing: On April 6, 1917, the U.S. formally declared war on Germany. The conflict which Henry Ford feared had come home, and the automaker turned its attention to increasing production for the war effort. By the end of May, Ford had been given an order for 2,000 Model T chassis to be converted for use as ambulances, and ultimately, the conflict served as a proving ground for both the Model T and the Model TT.

Though the war delayed the introduction of the Model TT, it didn't prevent it, and the chassis reached the market in July 1917. Its price had risen for the estimated \$500 to \$600, but for their money buyers received a reinforced frame stretched

Specifications of Ford Model T One-Ton Truck

Axles—Front azle of I-beam construction, especially drop-forged from Vanadium Steel, insuring the highest quality of axle strength obtainable. Rear axle also of Vanadium Steel, and enclosed in a tubular steel housing. The differential is of the two-pinion type; all gears are drop-forgings made of Vanadium Steel.

Brakes—Dual system. Service brake operates on the transmission and it controlled by foot pedal. Expanding brake in rear wheel drums serves as emergency brake. It is controlled by hand lever on left side of car.

Carburetor—Float feed automatic with dash adjustment. Specially designed to give maximum power, flexibility and easy starting, with economy of fuel consumption.

Clutch-Multiple steel disc, operating in oil

Control—On the left side of car. Three foct-pedal controls, low and high speeds, reverse, and brake on the transmission. Hand lever for neutral and emergency brake on left side of car. Spark and throttle levers directly under steering wheel.

Cooling—By Thermo Syphon water system. Extra large water jackets and a special Ford vertical tube radiator to permit of a contineous flow of water and prevent excessive heating. A belt-driven fan is also used in connection with the cooling system.

Final Drive—Is of the worm type, enclosed in a dust and oil-proof housing. Direct shaft drive to the center of chassis; only one universal joint is necessary. A balland socket arrangement in the universal joint reduces shocks and strains caused by the unevenness of the road.

Gasoline Capacity—Cylindrical tank of 10 gallons capacity mounted directly on frame. Lubrication—combination gravity and splanh system. Oil is poured into crank case through the breather pipe on the front cylinder cover. All moving parts of motor work in oil and distribute it to all parts of the power plant.

Magneto—Special Ford design, built in and made a part of the motor. Only two parts to the Ford mattot, a rotary part attached to the cylinder casting. No brushes, no commutators, no moving writes to cause annoyance on the Ford magneto.

Motor—Four-cylinder, four-cycle. Cylinders are cast in one block with water jackets and upper half of crask case integral. Cylinder bore is three and three-quatter inches; piston stroke is four inches. The Ford motor develops full twenty horsepower. Special Ford removable cylinders and valves. Lower half of crask case, one-piece pressed steel extended so as to form bottom housing for ratine power plant—six-proof, oil-proof, dust-proof. All interior parts of motor may be reached by removing plate on bottom of crask case—so "tearing down" of motor to reach seath shaft, sum shaft, pistons, connecting rods, etc. Ford Vanadium Steel is used on all Ford crask and cam shafts and connecting rods.

Springs—Both front and rear springs are semi-elliptical transverse, all made of specially Ford heattreated Vanadium Steel. Ford springs are the strongest and most flexible that can be made.

Steering -- By Ford planetary reduction gear system. Steering knuckles and spindles are forged from special Ford heat-treated Vanadium Steel, and are placed behind front axle.

Three-Point Suspension—Each of the Ford units is suspended at three points of the chassis. This method of suspension insures absolute freedom from strain on the moving parts.

Transmission—Special Ford spur planetary type, combining ease of operation and smooth, silent running qualities. Clutch is so designed as to grip smoothly and positively, and when disengaged to spring clear away from the drums, thus sessing positive action and maximum power.

Unit Construction—There are four complete units in the construction of a Ford car—the power plant, the front running gear, the rear running gear and the frame.

Valves-Extra large, all on right side of motor and enclosed by two small steel plates.

Wheel Base—Model T Truck has a wheelbase of one bundred twenty-four inches. The standard tread for all cars is fifty-six inches. Model T Truck will turn in a forty-six foot circle.

Wheels and Tires—Wooden wheels of the artillery type with extra heavy hubs. Only tires of the highest grade are used on Ford cars. Front, pneumatic, 30x3 inches; rear wheels, hard rubber tires, 32x314 inches.

Carrying Capacity-One Ton.

LUBRICANT FOR WORM—An A-1 heavy fluid or semi-fluid must be used to lubricate differential in Model T Truck.

to a 124-inch wheelbase, a heavy-duty suspension, and a worm drive axle that could be ordered with either standard final gearing (delivering a top speed of 15 mph) or optional gearing that allowed the TT to achieve the breakneck pace of 22 mph. A higher-output engine wasn't available, meaning the TT got by with the same 20-horsepower, 177-cu.in. inline four-cylinder engine found in the Model T.

Buyers were also on their own, at least initially, for cabs and bodies. In 1924, Ford debuted the C-cab, named for the shape of its rear pillar, along with a selection of commercial bodies. A fully enclosed cab was added to the mix in 1925, and the number of body offerings from Ford was increased. By the time that Ford's 1.5-ton Model AA replaced the TT in 1927, prices for the latter had fallen to \$325, and total production had reached 1.3-million units.

Ford continued to advance its truck product line over the years, adding features and capabilities demanded by commercial customers. The postwar years saw a shift in the market, and with many returning veterans moving from rural to urban areas, pickup trucks went with them. The F-Series debuted in 1948, with the number (F-1 through F-7) initially denoting its class and payload. In 1953, the F-100 replaced the F-1, initiating a naming convention that remains in use today.



Kenworth presents its history where it began at historic Weyerhaeuser mill

mill where some of Kenworth's first trucks went to work in the 1920s.

Kenworth recently took reporters to the sprawling and treelined location where Weyerhaeuser lumber mill once stood and produced seemingly endless board feet of lumber for the U.S. and abroad in the small town of Snoqualmie, Wash.

Before reporters hit the road and went off-roading in Kenworth's latest T-880 vocational stalwarts, Kenworth Marketing Director Kurt Swihart gave a brief talk on the history of the lumber business in the northwest region of the Evergreen State.

Here's the site today. Notice the smokestack in the background and the absence of the log pond.

"It was really in this context that Kenworth was founded in the early 1920s," Swihart explains in the roughly 3-minute long video below. "You look back to those early pictures of the 1920s Kenworths and you see these logging trucks that are driving out back in these hills. Those logging trucks is where Kenworth earned its mettle."

About 40 seconds into the video you'll see that the mill's old smokestack still stands. You'll get a sense for its size by noticing how it dwarfs the cars parked below it. We've posted an old picture of the smokestack alongside one taken this past week. You'll notice the absence of the log pond in the most recent shot.

The mill opened in 1914 and closed its doors in 2003. It is now home to DirtFish Rally School.

The goal was Hershey but sometimes you just don't get the brass ring. The journey to restore the 55 Fairlane started many years ago and several people have had their hands in the pot.



Everyday stirs up a new adventure in problem solving. For every two problems that come up one gets solved. The end is in sight.





Electric vocational vehicles need inspirational spark



Electric vocational vehicles need inspirational spark

New York City fleet from the 1930s to the 1960s.

Something else replaced them.

Competition. Supply and demand. Laissez-faire. The free market. The bottom line. A profit margin.

In the 1960s, UPS and any other company could more easily make the decision to yank an alternative-fueled vehicle from its fleet, based solely on profitability.

Now, greater emissions and public image concerns vis-àvis constant news cycles and social media must be taken into account when considering the roll alt fuel vehicles will play at a company.

Improved technology combined with generous tax incentives are improving the outlook of electric vocational vehicles, but not necessarily their sales.

Forbes recently ran an article in which it points out that sales at electric pickup manufacturer Via Motors are anything but electricfying. It questions the pickup's viability in one of the automotive industry's most competitive segments.

The Via Motors Vtrux is billed as the "world's first extendedrange pickup truck." It runs on electric power the first 40 miles then switches to a 4.3-liter V6 engine which will charge the batteries and get the truck up to its 400-mile range.

The truck looks impressive. It can deliver 120 and 240-volt exportable power. A full charge typically costs less than \$2, the company states, which comes out to about 5 cents per mile. Vtrux can be serviced at Chevrolet dealers and it qualifies for a \$7,500 federal tax incentive.

However, Forbes points out that the truck's electric range will take a quick nose-dive when it does what pickups are apt to do: towing and hauling.

While Via Motors lists the Vtrux' payload capacity at 1,000 pounds, it does not offer any towing specs.

But it's not just range limitations that pose concerns for electric vocational vehicles. It's also the use of lithium-ion batteries.

As Carlton Rose, president of Global Fleet Maintenance & Environmentalists have voiced concerns for years about the Engineering at UPS, pointed out recently at ACT Expo, the amount of energy used to produce the batteries and the hazards package delivery giant utilized electric package vehicles in their posed by their disposal. The batteries, derived from limited resources, have also caught headlines for causing fires. Granted, most auto manufacturers have extinguished fears of battery fires through competent engineering, but in short, lithium-ion batteries are not exactly pillars of conservation and safety.

> "Electric cars are major hypocritical BS already (just passes the alleged 'bad' fuel burning somewhere else), but an electric truck?!" a reader wrote in a comment following an article HWT ran in March of 2015 announcing Via Motors' electrification of a Chevrolet Silverado 4×4.

> Research into safer, more abundant and environmentally friendly sodium-ion batteries continues, but to date, challenges still largely stem from slow discharge and recharge rates.

> As most alternative vehicle proponents are apt to do, Via Motors points out that the volatility of the oil market makes their electric trucks and vans a more promising option. The latest media post on their website from April features a report from Bloomberg News which predicts an oil market crash.

> hile government tax incentives are attractive to some buyers, thWey offer no guarantee on the vehicle's impact on the company's bottom line.

> Companies and the people they serve want vehicles that offer the most return on investment while minimizing environmental impact.

> With that in mind, Forbes has endorsed fuel-cell electric vehicles. However, the hydrogen-based technology is too expensive at this point to warrant widespread production. It still is promising, though: fuel cell stacks replace heavy batteries to power electric powertrains.

> Until electric vocational vehicles catch up with the notions of profitability and the bottom-line, they'll still have to continue to rely on government mandates and tax credits to get a headstart.

And even with that kind of help fueling their advancement, they're still largely getting left behind.




