





DSR Member Awarded Two Best of the Best for 2016





The Deep South Region of the Antique Automobile Club of America members Jim and Nancy Henderson receive two prestigious awards at the National Meeting in Philadelphia, PA on February 11.

The Ford Award is awarded to Fords of the four eras of model years: Brass Model era & Model "T" era cars (1903-1927); Model "A" cars (1928-1931); Pre-War; Pre-War Ford cars (1932-1945); Post-War Ford cars (1946 to current allowable year).

One winner is selected annually from the nominees from all National Meets. Junior and Senior cars are eligible. All driven and non-driven cars are eligible, with consideration given to driven cars. The award is made on the basis of authenticity, appearance and reliability. The award was established in 1976 by the Southeastern Region of AACA.

Jim and Nancy Henderson won the Ford Award 1932-1945 for the 1932 Ford Cabriolet and the Ford Award Post War for the 1951 Ford Victoria.

On October 10, 2016 Jim received two letters from AACA National Awards stating that the 1936 Ford and the 1951 Ford had been nominated. The letter read "The AACA Hershey Fall Meet closed out the 2016 National Awards season. AACA Members in all four divisions of the country displayed thousands of vehicles. At each of our National Meets, the National Awards Committee was hard at work, selecting what was, in their opinion, the very best of all the vehicles shown. This committee, made up of some of the most experienced judges in AACA, is entrusted with the task of selection the recipients of the most prestigious of all AACA awards, the National Awards.

These awards are presented Saturday evening at the AACA Annual Awards Banquet held in conjunction with the AACA

Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania each year in February. Your Vehicle, listed below, has been selected for consideration for one of these awards."

One letter stated 1951 Ford Vehicle #21863 and the second letter stated 1936 Ford Vehicle #31444.

"The AACA full National Awards committee will meet on December 2, 2016, to determine the winner of each of the many categories of awards."

A questionnaire was filled out and two photos for each car were sent into National before November 1, 2016. Then there was a long wait time to see if a winner or a rejection letter would be sent.

On December 5, 2016 Jim and Nancy received two letters. The first letter read "On behalf of the AACA National Awards Committee, I would like to congratulate you as a recipient of a 2016 National Award for your 1936 Ford, AACA Vehicle #31444." And the second one read "On behalf of the AACA National Awards Committee, I would like to congratulate you as a recipient of a 2016 National Award for your 1951 Ford, AACA Vehicle #21836."

"Your award will be presented at the National Awards Banquet to be held at the Sheraton Downtown Hotel in Philadelphia, PA on Saturday, February 11. 2017."

Deep South Region members are dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of the antique automobile. The club's vision is to encourage membership participation in antique automobile related activities including displaying, touring, technical sessions and supporting other antique car group activities. The club strives to offer innovative, interesting and rewarding antique car programs to the entire membership.

Close to 1000 AACA members from all across the US arrived in Pennsylvania to celebrate the 81st AACA Annual Meeting.

Two full day of events along with tours of the Philadelphia area were packed in to the agenda. There were educational seminars, trade show exhibits, special breakfasts and banquets to attend.

Jim and Nancy were given name tags with special ribbons attached to show they were National Award Winners.

Award Banquet night the room has a glow to it and you had a few moments to speak with those you new. Jim and Nancy had a few moments to catch up with some long time friends.

Every winner was given the instructions that when your car appeared on the big screen that you were to make your way to the front to receive your award.

Jim was stopped by so many people along the way to the front that he really did not know what award he had one.

Jim and Nancy won two of the 40 or so awards the National gives each year. This is a big accomplishment

A March DeSoto Update

After a miserable experience, the gas tank is finally installed. For some reason the gas line connection is on the other side from the previous tank. The car came from Detroit, the tank from the west coast so perhaps the limited number of cars made in California had different tanks (Left side – West coast, Right – side East, sort of fitting...). A little extra gas line and a line connector and we thought we were in business. Except (isn't there always an except?), our junior helper didn't tighten up all the fitting and we were sucking air. Tightening was done and the car started

(Phew!!).

We are taking all the bright work so we can a. fix a few rust spots, b. replace the hood and c. wet sand the paint in preparation for a clear coat respray. We have a replacement

hood as the original has persistent rust on the front. We obtained a replacement from Montana (Freman's salvage which no longer exists – they crushed all their cars!!!).



There were a couple of dents in the front of the hood, so we removed the brace underneath and found surface rust as there is a water trap between the hood itself and the brace – thus the rust on the original. We are working to get the dents out then will send it off to be media blasted again.

We also have a few chrome pieces (bumpers, bumpettes, etc.) being replated at Graves in Florence. They are to be ready around St. Patrick's day. I guess that is appropriate timing as there will be a lot of passing of the green (from me to them, sigh).




about who had previously owned the car.



What have you been up to?

William F. Green Veteran's Home Car Show - Bay Minette, AL - March 11, 2017

A picture perfect car show day sent me up I-65 to Bay Minette on Saturday, March 11 to this show. I had received flyers for it for the past several years, but for one reason or another never went. The one hour Interstate drive also gave me a chance to really test out how my winter car project was performing. In December I had the new ZZ4 crate engine in my 1980 C3 Corvette significantly modified by removing the factory Holly 750 CFM four barrel carburetor and intake manifold and replacing them with an Edelbrock performance intake manifold and two Edelbrock 500 CFM four barrels – all in a blinding chrome finish – of course. All work done to perfection by my car show buddy Bob Gechijian's Gulf Coast Corvettes Shop.

Matched up with Hedman Headers and a custom Flowmaster dual exhaust system the impact on the car's performance was amazing. Instead of the measly 190 hp L-48 small block that the

car was born with, this new rig is now producing over 400 hp, and easily qualifies for "beast" status. In particular I opted for this arrangement instead of dropping a modern LS engine into the car, as I wanted the engine swap to look period correct in addition to significantly enhancing performance. (Yes – I think I did violate the 70 mph speed limit on portions of the trip to Bay Minette!)

Upon arrival at the Vet's home I was pleasantly surprised to find a really first-class facility, as befits the elderly veteran residents. The grounds are perfect for a car show – a big grassy lawn area immediately adjacent to the Home. In all, 109 cars showed up and registered – a very nice turnout. The show is a benefit fundraiser for the home, and between raffles, food, 50-50 pot, and registration fees generated over \$ 2,500.00 for the Home.

The Gear Jammers Car Club did a great job putting on a really first class event which included tons of door prizes and a really generous table of trophies. This show is somewhat unusual in that the top four award winners received trophies and cash.

I was very pleased that the judges really seemed to like my car. I received a nice "Top 30" trophy and a LARGE "Best Interior" trophy which came with a nice crisp 50-dollar bill attached. I immediately donated the cash award back to the Vet's home, as did two of the other major award winners.

Truck delivery gone wrong raises questions about ethanol and the cattle industry

A recent delivery mishap in Dodge County, Wisconsin left red skittles all over the highway and had reporters and readers alike eating up the news.

It was bizarre right from the start. The candies were not stamped with that familiar 'S,' yet investigating officers on scene said there was no mistaking that familiar candy scent.

Also, there was no offending vehicle in sight when officers arrived and no explanation as to why someone would be transporting so many red Skittles through the area, until later.

The Dodge County Sheriff's Office reported on its Facebook page that the candies were factory rejects that had been bought by a local rancher to feed his cows.

"The Skittles were confirmed to have fallen off the back of a truck. The truck was a flatbed pickup and the Skittles were in a large box," reads the post from the sheriff's office. "Due to it raining at the time, the box got wet and gave way allowing the Skittles to spill out on the roadway. It is reported that the Skittles were intended to be feed for cattle as they did not make the cut for packaging at the company. In the end these Skittles are actually for the Birds!"

Yes...you read that right. Skittles for cattle. To help cope with the high price of corn, some ranchers have turned to feeding factory rejected candy to their cattle. The headlines have captured plenty of attention, concern and even outrage.

But it's nothing new. Cattle have been getting candy and bakery rejects for a long, long time. I remember Mr. Woodrow in my ag class in high school telling us that cattle are actually fed a lot worse things than that. I don't want to spoil your next burger, so I


won't repeat what he said. But don't worry...a cow's stomach is designed to handle some pretty nasty things and convert it to some of the best ribeyes you've ever tasted. It's pretty amazing, when you think about it. Also, take solace in what the experts have to say, including Professor John Waller, an animal expert at the University of Tennessee, who said the cattle's unusual Skittle diet poses no danger.

And it turns out that Skittles have another unusual use besides feeding bovines. Folks traveling over the colorful candy mess on Wisconsin's Highway S last week said the candies helped improve traction on the icy road.

Though Mars, the maker of Skittles, acknowledges that its rejected candy has been used as cattle feed, the company has launched an investigation to determine just how all those Skittles ended up in Wisconsin. Could this mean that there's a black market for Skittles? I'm betting that someone just forgot to note the order.

while news groups covered some interesting angles on Skittlegate, the bigger issue here that has gone largely unreported, is the price of corn. It's no secret that ethanol has driven up the cost. In November, as part of its commitment to the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS), the EPA recommended that the nation's ethanol supply be increased by 35 percent this year, which if put into action, would almost certainly raise the price of corn even higher and leave ranchers ordering more candy for cattle and parents buying fewer bags of the candy at checkout.

However, President Trump's administration may not share the same view as the prior administration on ethanol. In fact, Forbes reports that, "Trump's pick to head the EPA — Scott Pruitt — has repeatedly fought

against the RFS. As EPA Administrator, Pruitt would have the authority to invoke a waiver to lower the volume of ethanol that must be blended into the fuel supply — a move he has advocated in the past."

Forbes notes that if Pruitt is confirmed an oversupply of ethanol will more than likely occur. The interesting part here is that Trump himself has advocated support for the RFS. (Ethanol stocks shot up following the election, but have since cooled off). Trump also has plenty of supporters in the petroleum business who've got his ear and may convince him to turn his back on ethanol, a competing product that the RFS forces them to sell.

Whatever comes of the EPA's ethanol recommendation, one can only hope next time that the cattle-bound Skittles are better contained. And who knows? Cows have certainly been a great marketing ploy for Chick-fil-A. Maybe Skittles will now put a few cows to work uttering their catchy phrase, "Taste the Rainbow."
