An Interview with Michael Palmer

When we were leaving the luncheon at the Rock Creek Catfish House in January, we making our first turn on the way back to Hwy 98 when I spotted Micheal Palmer's 1953 Chevrolet heading off ahead of us. For no reason other than to establish a small convoy, I tried to catch up with him. Now I know that his car has a six in it and it's got bias tires, and our Comet has a V-8 and radials, but no matter what I tried, I could not catch up with him. He disappeared off down the road. My assumptions: the man has a lead foot and he isn't afraid to put an old car through its' paces.

I met with Michael at his home in West Mobile. I was greeted at the door by Candy, the, approximately 5 pound attack-Yorkie who was using her intimidating bark. Michael explained that he'd had a pug that had passed away and an elderly lady had Candy but couldn't take care of her any longer. So Michael was adopted by Candy. I was impressed with her ability to scoot through a sizeable doggie door with ease.

Michael is a native Mobilian. He said he has never lived anywhere else. He has four brothers and a sister, some of whom also still live in Mobile. Michael graduated from McGill High School, being there when it transitioned from a boys only school. He worked at various jobs around town



until he joined one of his brothers in running a wholesale balloon business. He's been at it now for about 30 years. He had to explain that the types of balloons he sells are those that you see in the grocery store or floral shop, not the huge one's that people ride in. Michael's business keeps him busy and he travels quite a bit around the country on selling trips. He said this type of business requires that they work with vendors about six months ahead of any particular holiday. They only sell their balloons domestically, and try quite hard to only sell products manufactured here in the states.

Michael's first attempt at vehicle restoration was about 35 - 40 years ago when he bought a 1948 Chevy Pickup. He said he didn't have the time or the money then to do much, so after two years he sold it. About seven years ago, he was told there was an old "Ford" that was down the road from his business that he might be interested in buying. That Ford turned out to be the 1953 Chevy 210. While it still ran when he bought it, it took about two years to get it to where he felt comfortable putting it on the road. He's done some restoration himself, but farmed out most of

the work. The motor which had a cracked block was replaced and the transmission rebuilt. Fortunately, most of the chrome and stainless were on the car, and he had it refinished. He hasn't gotten around to getting the grill refinished so, as shown in the photo, it's painted white. The car was originally blue but he changed it to mint green with the white roof and wheels (apparently not an original combination). The interior has been completely redone to original specifications.

Michael did some of the restoration himself on the car. He helped replace 3 of the 4 floor pans, replaced the side glass and installed the wiring harness. We agreed that once you figured out what to do, the re-wiring was kind of fun. Michael pointed out, with pride, two small stainless pieces that go between the front and back doors. Apparently these are those annoying, never-to-be-found pieces. As he couldn't find them, a friend cut some stainless for him and made the two pieces himself. (and hey, they looked really good!)

After talking about the car, we went out back to look at it. His lot is quite small, and it was amusing that he has his bright yellow single-car garage at about a 45 degree angle in the back corner. I was wondering if the neighbors thought he was nuts when he put it up. However, once he cranks back his retractable awning and swings open his gates he can get the car out fairly easily. I didn't see any residual grease, so while I thought it narrow, he apparently doesn't have to lube up the car to get it out.

Regardless of the fact that his nieces (or was it great-nieces?) are quite nonchalant (possibly indifferent) about his Chevy, Michael seems quite happy with his achievements. And that's all that matters, right?










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
