A conversation with Brian Daly

I had hoped to meet up with Brian a day earlier that we did. He works for the National Weather Service and as such some of his time is, well, weather driven. Brian owns the Black MGA MKII that we occasionally get the pleasure of seeing. Brian told me that he was born in Newark NJ but that his family was relocated to the Houston TX area when he was a boy. His father was an engineer who worked at Ellington Field just south of Houston.



Brian obtained a degree from the University of St. Thomas in Houston in the field of meteorology. He said he wanted to be a pilot. However, as he wore glasses he wasn't eligible. As flying involves intimate knowledge of the weather in which planes fly, he gravitated towards meteorology. Brian started graduate school at Penn State but decided to leave (he ran out of

money) and join the Navy in 1979, being commissioned in 1980. He was in active service for 10 years then 16 years in the reserve. He said he really enjoyed being in the Navy and wore many hats while there. One of the activities he engaged in was the development of custom weather forecasts for individual ships. He left active service as a Commander. After Brian left active service, he lived in Galveston and worked for the National Weather Service. It appeared to me

that he's enjoyed the various activities he's experienced over the years both with the National Weather Service and as a reservist. He moved to Mobile in 1998 where he says the weather is always a challenge. Brian reported that during the move he bumped into a group of DSR members who were on a club trip to either Mississippi or Louisiana. The DSR members informed him of the various British Car clubs in the area which he joined fairly promptly upon arriving in Mobile. He did not join the DSR or AACA until a number of years later.



Brian bought his MG in May of 1969. He bought it from a young priest who needed a form of transportation that was more practical. He paid \$700 for it. The original car color was black. In 1970 he painted it red. It remained that way until he had a major restoration in 1995. He said his father was appalled at his purchase assuming that he would kill himself in the small convertible. Brian did say he was a bit of a radical when he first got the car (he got it up to 110 mph) which

he wisely did not report to this father until years later. He told me of a hydroplaning incident on a major Houston freeway in 1970. It turned out his tires were hard due to dry rot. He said this resulted in a wake-up call to himself that he needed to learn about care and maintenance of the car.



The MG has had somewhat of a checked past and is not a stranger to rust. Brian stated that around 1975 he found out there were no splash plates inside the front fenders (sorry, wings). He said he dug out about 8 inches of dirt and gravel from the insides of the fenders and had to have both of them replaced due to rust. He has no clue who removed the splash plates or why. From 1975 the MG sat in a backyard shed that he and his father built in this father's backyard. Brian had intentions of restoring the car

himself but realized he didn't have the equipment or the space to do it. He started the restoration in January 1996, the flatbed truck was accompanied by Brian, his ecstatic mother and happy father. Brian called this a "parent inspired" restoration (read: Dad wanted his space in the backyard back). The car was professionally restored in Houston which turned out to be a two year project.

Early 1600 MkII. Approximately 389th of 6,000 built. This was the last of the MGAs (April 1961). Original color black. Engine 1622 cc (~98 CID) 93 BHP. Twin SU HS-4 carburetors. 4 speed non synchronized in 1st gear (Brits called it a "crash gearbox"). Weight ~1950 lb.,


