

The First Conversation with Pierre Fontana

A couple of weeks ago, the Old South Antique Auto Club held a car show. Pierre Fontana called our club president, Zeno Chaudron, to encourage him to attend. During the discussion, Pierre confirmed that he was the first president of the DSR when it was formed in 1967. This past weekend, Zeno, Tracy Metclaf and I met with Pierre at Zeno's shop. Pierre brought along some information mostly pertaining to the Old South Club. But he did provide some interesting tidbits about the early years of our car club.

Pierre was born in Paris, France and immigrated to the United States in 1950. Funded by his uncle who was a conductor for the New Orleans symphony, he came on a Liberty ship headed to New Orleans. However a hurricane caused the ship to be diverted to Texas and he arrived via bus in New Orleans. His uncle sponsored him for citizenship in 1951 and as part of the citizenship process he agreed to serve in the US Air Force for four years. Pierre was trained as a lab technician/medic while in the service. Of note, he trained for eight weeks in nuclear warfare training and was given all of his gear, including a Geiger counter, when he left the service. His home base was Brookley Field which is why he remained in Mobile after discharge.

After leaving the service, he worked for the Mobile General Hospital for 14 years. He worked nights at the hospital and they provided him with a five car garage at the back of the hospital, fully equipped, where he worked on cars. In 1982 he opened his own shop behind the Malbis Bakery which was on Broad Street. His shop was on Pillans Street. The shop was in a crime area and as a result he closed it and 'retired'. However, the cars managed to follow him to his home in Tillman's corner. He currently has an extended five-car garage at his home where he continues to work on cars, some of them his, some belonging to others.

The Deep South Region Car Club was an outgrowth of the Old South Antique Auto Club which was founded in 1962. Interest in the club was strong with outings to picnics and tours being offered. The club grew quickly and began to meet twice weekly at the First Federal Saving Building in Crichton (Springhill Avenue). Interestingly, the club met twice monthly from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. They were granted a charter of incorporation in August, 1963.

In 1967, a group formed within the Old South wanted to sponsor a Glidden tour. Glidden tours were, and are, sponsored, in part, by the Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA). A division within the club developed between those who wanted the tour and those who did not. In 1967, those who wished to hold a tour split off from the Old South to form the Deep South Region as an Alabama Chapter of the AACA. The Glidden tour was held in Mobile in 1968.

An Interview with Pierre Fontana (continued)

While Pierre has agreed to meet with us again to discuss the formation of the DSR, he did regale us with two interesting events. In the late 1960's the club was contacted about providing era-appropriate cars for a movie being shot in Montgomery. The movie, entitled the Travelling Executioner, was set in 1918. It starred Stacey Keach and was based on the life of a Mississippi

man who travelled with an electric chair to provide executions. According to Pierre, all the DSR members who travelled with their cars to Montgomery were given the full luxury treatment by the film company. He said the best part, not to give anything away, was the explosion that occurred as part of the story. The film was made at the closed Kilby Prison in Montgomery, and as part of the deal, the film company was to blow up the old prison to clear the area. For those interested, there is a DVD available for the film which was, basically, a flop.

Around 1972, Dr. William Wetta bought a 1932 Duesenberg from someone in Mexico. He, Pierre and others travelled to Mexico to

pick up the car. They carried American dollars and were somewhat anxious about being robbed. However, they arrived safely with the money only to find the seller would only accept Mexican pesos. Pierre stated they ended up exchanging the dollars for an immense pile of pesos and the deal was complete. On the return trip to the US, they were stopped by four Mexican policemen. Dr. Wetta apparently knew how to deal with the situation and handed each man a 20 dollar bill. The policemen indicated there were two more officers at the station, and after collecting 40 more dollars, the Deusenberg and its crew were on their way back safely to the US and Mobile.

Pierre said he has quite a bit of information about the early years of the DSR and we will meet with him again soon. As he prepared to leave, the sky opened up and we were all delayed. While it rained, Pierre informed us that cars are still finding their way to him. He currently is working on a 1970 MG GT that is one of his own current cars. He further gave us a lecture about using eBay to buy or sell cars. He has done both, for himself and for others. With some cautionary information about using PayPal, he picked up his briefcase and headed to his car. This man is obviously still very much in the game.

As most that know me, I do Automotive Machine work. From time to time we have different people stopping in wanting to know what projects Freddie Pendarvis & I are working on. Not the everyday stuff, but old & strange engines. I told Paul (Mr Editor) I would like to share some of what we have going on at the shop. We have a real unique engine project that Freddie's been working on for the last 100 yrs or so. (Just kidding) We are going to start with this article and be giving some updates in later newsletters to keep you informed.




I wanted to tell you a little about Freddie Pendarvis who is my partner in crime. I've been knowing Freddie for about 40 yrs. He was born in Pascagoula in 1942 and came to Mobile County at 3 days of age to the big town of Bayou La Batre. He has a wonderful wife Ms. Jackie and they have 3 children Jack, Will & Cindi & 4 Grandchildren. Do I need to say Ms. Jackie keeps all of them in line?

At an early age Freddie was learning why the wheel rolled as it did. He was always in the middle of an engine, either overhauling it or modifying parts to help the performance of whatever he was working on. His first car at 15 yrs old was a 37 Chevrolet & at 16 he put a 283 Chevy engine into it. At 17 he installed a

3736097 Duntov Camshaft with 3 two barrel Carburetors (Strombergs) into the car. He later pulled the motor & installed it in a 1953 Studebaker Coupe.

Freddie started his Machinist career At Cagle Auto Parts in Theodore, Alabama at the age of 20.He was turning brake drums & they had a Hydraulic Press. He was off and running at this point when they added Cylinder Head & Block work. As time would have it, he was in business for himself in various locations beginning in Bayou La Batre and later in Theodore.

Talking about some of the more innovative engines, there was a 1962



Falcon running H Gas with a 240 6 Cylinder Ford engine and a 300 6 Ford that they ran in I Gas at the old Dauphin Island Drag strip. Then the fun started when Freddie took 2 brand new 351C Ford Motorsports Aluminum Heads & cut a cylinder off of each head to make a cross-flow setup for the 300 Ford engine. A lot of work but he did it with the help of fuel Injection. The result was impressive to say the least.

Without saying too much more, the project we are working on now is naturally a GM Super Duty Pontiac 200 Cu Inch 4 Cylinder Engine that will have alcohol Fuel Injection, Turbocharged. For you that are interested we will keep you posted as we progress forward.


