Welcome to Old Town at Buddy's Corner By Ed McCusker and Don Dillehay with Ruth Gunter

<u>Ed:</u> It is now 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 17th and we have just returned from our second visit to a church today. Our first was to a very nice church way up in the country in the south part of Washington County to a place called Old Town. Our DSR members, Buddy and Anne Givens, accomplished what they have been trying to do for several years; have the DSR family to their "neck of the woods".

<u>Don:</u> This was a joint outing of DSR and the Gulf Coast Model A Club totaling 35 folks. Everyone met at the DSR clubhouse to form a caravan for the trip. It took approximately one hour and traveling the back roads made for a very nice drive.

<u>Ed:</u> The entrance to the Givens' property was well marked; there was a Model A sitting next to the mailbox. Driving up the driveway, it is obvious a lot of thought and work has gone into Old Town, especially when you see a railroad box car sitting on rails in the middle of a large expanse of newly mown grass. We were greeted warmly and told we would discover some of what life was like in this part of Alabama 60 - 100 years ago.

Don: The first building we visited was the Givens' Church which is what you would expect to have been in all those years ago. After Anne welcomed us and told about Buddy's long-time dream of having a place where older folks could come to reminisce and younger ones could come to learn. She suggested that as we exited the building, we stop to see the collection of Bibles in the foyer of the building, some dating back to the early 1800s.

<u>ED:</u> The original train depot for the town of Vinegar Bend was moved the three +/- miles to house the collection and display of early turpentine industry. A scale model of a turpentine distillery built by Buddy's father after he had a stroke some years ago has a place of honor atop **Continued on Page 3**

one of the display cases. Buddy explained how the pine trees were tapped and demonstrated the use of the tools used. He said this was the hardest job he ever had in his life and I can agree it certainly could have been.

Don: Having heard the history of the Stallworth (Anne's family) estate and the Givens family's 360 acres contributed to the making of turpentine, we left the depot and took the boardwalk to the print shop where several lin-o-type machines and numerous printing presses are kept. There were newspapers starting with the 1800s up to the present. Next came the sewing room where both Anne and their daughter, Stella's wedding gowns are on display along with patterns and materials beginning back in the 1930s. Then it was on the W.J.'s Game Room, complete with pool table and a large collection of model airplanes hanging from the ceiling.

Next was "Emmie's General Store. It contains a large number of items that would have been needed during this time period. Most important was the Post Office and the switchboard room for "Ma Bell". Next door we found Cassie's Corner Drug Store. There was a working soda fountain circa 1940s that was used for a lot of "photo ops". We moved down the boardwalk, a number of the ladies stopped to check out the "Necessary Room". Barbara tells me it was an old time outhouse that is now an "inhouse" and somewhat modernized.

<u>Ed:</u> We continued on to find ourselves walking under the overhang of Jake's Place, an old service station with several gas pumps, oil and tire racks and the usual array of original Gulf, Conoco and Phillips 66 signs. This brought us to the door of what is referred to as "Stella's Room" or what the family refers to as "The Cottage" which serves as a home for Stella's Creative Memories Scrapbooking. Most of you probably don't know but Stella and her family lived in Auburn for a period of time. This was when the scrapbooking hobby was just beginning. It was something she enjoyed and seemed to have a natural talent for that turned into a business. It was a quandary for her when she had to choose staying in Auburn with her successful shop or moving back home. We are all glad she chose the latter.

The next stop was the Toy Shop. The building was originally a beauty shop in Deer Park but now serves to display more model trains, cars and related items than I could begin to count. By now it was time for lunch in the De Van Motor Co. building a/k/a the "Car Barn." Again, we had a good history lesson, especially for anyone who thought De Van car dealership started in Mobile. It actually began in Citronelle and later another outlet was opened in Mobile.

<u>Don:</u> Lunch was outstanding; roast beef, sweet potatoes, turnip greens, corn, salad and a huge array of too-good-to-pass-up desserts. Not to mention some excellent tea and coffee. BUT the HIT of the cool day was a huge pot of Anne's specialty, VEGETABLE SOUP!! I think everyone really pigged out on that; I know I sure did! This building was home to a large number of vehicles of all types. Some original, some restored and some in the middle. There were license plates from every state and some from other countries. Interestingly, there was a license plate collection from every Region of Australia.

<u>Note:</u> The picture of former President Reagan and Anne was taken at the White House when she was presented the Eagle Pin as a thank-you for her work on the President's "Peace through Strength" Program. She served on the Federated Women's Club Board of International Affairs from 1984-1988 contributing much to the effort


