

Resolution designating July 8, 2011 as "Collector Car Appreciation Day" Approved by U. S. Senate

Last month you read that this was on the calendar to be voted on. At the request of SAN, Sen. John Tester (D-MT) and Sen. Richard Burr (R-NC) introduced and the

Senate approved Resolution 154 (S. Res. 154) in the United States Senate officially designating July 8, 2011 as Collector Car Appreciation Day". The Resolution states that the Senate "recognizes that the collection and restoration of historic and classic cars is an important part of preserving the technological achievements and cultural heritage of the United States".

The date marks the second commemoration in what will become an annual event to raise awareness of the Vital role automotive restoration and collection plays in American Society. "Last year, thousands of Americans gathered at car cruises, parades and other events to celebrate our nation's automotive heritage," Said SEMA's Gov. Affairs Steve McDonald. "As we move forward, SEMA's commitment to preserving and promoting the automotive restoration industry through its projects and programs is evident in this special day."

Towrope Etiquette By Madame Manners
