

Make your next vacation an old car tour

Can you think of anyone who doesn't want to get the most "bang for their buck" while having a really good time? An easy way to do both is take advantage of old car tours whether it is AACA or another vehicle club. I can't speak to any other than AACA or their spin-offs such as Regional/Chapter mini-tours but I can tell you the aforementioned are fun, relatively inexpensive, kid-friendly, and educational plus becoming increasingly popular.

The Antique Automobile Club of America has six types of tours offering something for nearly everyone. The five National Tours are vehicle-year specific, while Divisional Tours usually are open to any vehicle 25 years or older.

The *Reliability Tour* is held on even numbered years and is for brass era vehicles built in 1915 or earlier. It began in the mid-1960's to compliment the Glidden Tour® and test the reliability of earlier vehicles, hence, the name. The 2008 event will be in Chattanooga, TN during Sept 8-12.

The Revival AAA Glidden Tour® is sponsored in alternating years by AACA and the Veteran Motor Car Club of America (VMCCA). AACA hosts it odd-numbered years and VMCCA is the host in even-numbered years. This is the most prestigious of all antique automobile tours in the nation. Originally held annually from 1904 until 1913, it has been recreated by a number of hosts in different parts of the country. In 2006 AACA and VMCCA jointly agreed to permit vehicles manufactured in 1942 or earlier to participate in the tour. This year it will be held Sept. 9-14 in Gettysburg, PA.

The *Founders Tour* is sponsored annually for all vehicles (except race vehicles) manufactured 1936 through 25 years prior to the tour year (i.e. as if in 2007 it would be a 1982 model). This year's tour was held in western Vermont and you can read all about how much fun four DSR members had participating in it further on in this newsletter.

The *Vintage Tour* is held during odd-numbered years and is designed for vehicles built in 1927 or earlier. It was designed to provide additional touring opportunities for the earlier models. This tour is going on in Fredrick, MD as you read this newsletter.

The latest addition to AACA National Tours is the *Sentimental Tour*. After two prototype tours, the first

National Sentimental Tour was held in 2004. This tour is offered on even-numbered years and is for 1928 through 1958 vehicles. The third National Sentimental Tour will be held June 2-6, 2008 in Burlington, NC.

Last, but certainly not least, and one of the most fun, are the AACA Divisional Tours. There are two each year; the Eastern and Central may be offered in even-numbered years, while the Southeastern and Western can be during odd-numbered years. These are shorter than the National Tours which are traditionally five days. The hosting Region is free to decide which vehicles may participate as long as they are 25 years or older prior to the tour year. The Western Divisional Tour is coming up Sept. 24-27 in Sonoma, CA. This year it will be a huge hit with all the wine lovers in our AACA family. The Southeastern Divisional Tour will be Nov. 11-14 this year in and around Tallahassee, FL. As a less structured, shorter duration and less expensive event, these tours offer an ideal way to find out if you would enjoy this part of the old car hobby.

Finally, there are the Regional/Chapter tours that are put together mainly for the benefit of their members. I have to say that some of the best I've ever been on were those over in Louisiana. The groups that put on the tours in this beautiful state can find something interesting to show you in the middle of a sugar cane field with nothing else around! DSR has had multiple week-long tours in years past as well as some shorter ones. Helen, Georgia; Murfreesboro, TN; Meridian, MS; Morganfield, KY; and Hot Springs, AR for the longer ones. We've had several overnighters to places such as Monroeville and Northport AL and Springhill, TN as well as others.

We have members in various other marque clubs such as the Mobile Mustang Club, the Mississippi Coast Mustang Club and the Ford Model A Club. I don't know about the local Mustang Club but both the MCMC and the Gulf Coast Model A Club members do enjoy touring and driving their cars. You can read an account of a big Model A Tour enjoyed by two of our members on Page four.

Summertime in our area can be unbearable for those without AC but early spring and mid to late fall is an ideal time in the South. Maybe we should start thinking about a mini tour for DSR in the early spring of next year.

2007 Founders Tour By Charlie Froehlich

This year's Founder's Tour in Vermont was attended by two DSR couples, the Musgroves and the Froehlichs. In a somewhat unusual start for a National tour, a pretour visit to Hemmings Motor News in Bennington, VT was arranged. It was purely optional, but it seemed most of the participants elected this option. After all, who wouldn't want to visit the home of Hemmings Motor News? This visit occurred on a Saturday so the office building wasn't open but we did view the auto collection and the Hemmings-operated full service gas station. When did you last have someone pump your gasoline, clean the windshield, check the tires, etc? And this was all done at the same price as the nearby self service stations. We left Hemmings and drove northward to Burlington where the hub tour was headquartered. Another optional stop on the way to Burlington was a visit to Hildene, the former home of Robert Todd Lincoln.

Activities in Burlington started on Sunday, June 3rd with visits to the Shelburne Museum and Vermont Teddy Bear. It did not take long to see how Teddy Bears are made, but the Shelburne Museum held our interest for most of the day. It is spread over 45 acres and contains a diverse collection of items related to northern New England life. Among the more interesting to us car geeks were a depot with a private railroad car and an engine plus the side-wheeler steamship Ticonderoga which had been moved two miles inland on an especially constructed railroad. Also, there was a huge collection of horse drawn carriages and wagons plus about 35 more buildings, collections, etc. That evening, the opening banquet was held aboard a cruise ship on crystal clear Lake Champlain.

On all days of the tour, rain was threatening. On Monday the forecast was for 100% chance of showers. Well, it did rain before we left the hotel and it rained after we got back. But the tour itself was conducted under cool, cloudy skies. Our tours for the day included a large marketplace, the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum, Crown Point, NY and the University of Vermont's Morgan Horse Farm. Good stops all.

Tuesday we visited a very interesting open pit granite mine. We had a tour guide with us who explained how the granite blocks were cut out then raised to the surface. We were then able to visit the shop where the blocks are cut into slabs for sale as raw materials or are made into finished monuments. With this history, we were then taken to a cemetery where we were shown some unusual monuments, one of which was a racecar. The trip continued on to Montpelier for a visit to the Vermont

State House (i.e. Capitol building). Our final stop for the day was, oh! so sweet, at a sugarhouse, the source of pure Vermont maple syrup.

We began Wednesday with a drive through the scenic mountainside. This area is known as the Green Mountains and the Green Mountain Region was our host club. There were so many beautiful views of the countryside. After lunch, things got even better – a visit to Ben & Jerry's of ice cream fame. Complete with samples! If that wasn't enough we also stopped at a cider mill and a chocolate shop. Good, but not good for the waistline.

Our final day of touring on Thursday was kind of a "do it yourself" day. The tour book included instructions to use in finding and driving over six covered bridges. It was not planned by the Green Mountain Region to be a challenge, but it was. It is the old thing that when up north, there are two seasons; winter and road repair. And did we run into road repair with many detours; at least one of which ran into a dead end. It was quite a test to find all of the bridges. We succeeded in locating five of them. Some others did not do nearly as well. Naturally, we closed out the tour with a banquet that evening. The guest speaker was Richard Lentinello, Editor in Chief of Hemmings publications.

It was a nice tour in a very scenic part of the country. Morning temperatures ranged from around 42 to 45. There were about 125 vehicles participating. The Green Mountain members are very friendly and gracious hosts. One of the interesting things about the Region is that they are new and small. The Region received its charter in 2003 and has about 15 families in the club. That they were able to host a National tour speaks very well for them.

It was a safe trip for both couples; the Musgroves were in their motor home pulling the trailer with their 1962 black Ford Galaxy convertible inside. They had some problems with the motor home trying to overheat shortly after leaving Mobile on the outbound trip. Unfortunately, things weren't any better on the return trip. It was only wishful thinking hoping for rain to keep things cooler but no such luck so they drove straight through in just over one and one-half days hoping to be a lot closer to home in case of trouble.

Ardie and I took our 1957 Ford Fairlane Club Sedan, driving it somewhere in the neighborhood of 4400 miles total and, I am happy to say, with no problems. Car shows, the local ones as well as the National meets, are a part of our hobby but there are some of us who enjoy the tours more. Just proves there's something for everyone.

When you drive as far as many of the Model A'ers had driven just to get to Tyler, what is a little rain?" Well, it rained for the next three days! History tells us that East Texas was a very rich oil field during the 1930s and supplied most of the petroleum reserve for the Allies during WW II. Drilling increased from seven wells every two weeks to seven wells a day and then to 100 or more a day. The first oil produced sold for \$1.10 per barrel, but the price dropped to 15 cents as supply flooded the market. The East Texas Oil Museum depicts life during this era.

The London Museum is a memorial to the town of New London, TX, an oil town that lost 311 students, teachers and visitors during a tragic explosion that destroyed the London school. That explosion brought about the addition of the odor you now smell with raw natural gas.

Our group covered approximately 110 miles in driving rainstorms. We often heard the sounds of "Rain, rain go away! Model A'ers want to play!" Although touring is a major part of our gatherings, we always enjoy being with friends, hearing news of their children and grandchildren or new additions to their families. Even if the new addition is a "new" old car.

10:45 AM Arrive Henderson's garage/museum


11:45 AM Depart Hendersons to Paquets
