

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AACA Southeastern Division Spring Meet By Jim Henderson

Not yet being one of those persons of leisure, sometimes referred to as a retiree, I don't get to go to as many automotive events as I would like. But I was able to work into my schedule the AACA Meet in New Bern, NC and am so glad I did.

Getting up before 3 o'clock is not what I normally do but it's not a lot earlier than my usual time to rise if not always shine. I met with Pete DeLung and Clyde Smith, both car enthusiasts who are also longtime friends and traveling buddies, shortly before 3:30 AM on Thursday, May 10th who were ready and waiting to hit the highway. We made good time and in about 12 hours we were in Fayetteville, NC where we spent the night. This meant we could have the luxury of sleeping in on Friday with only another 150 miles to go.

I have to tell you this story. My car hauler is a diesel truck and with a trailer hooked on, it is 72 feet long. The way the truck came from the factory, it was geared with a top speed of 65 mph. After taking several long trips of approximately 2,000 miles round trip in it and at 65 mph and everything on the road passing us,

Clyde, being a professional over-the-road owner-operator truck driver, suggested I change the rear end to gear the truck to go faster. I took his suggestion and after putting a new rear end with 433 ratio gears, this car hauler will now run 90 mph. However, don't be alarmed; we never drove above 80. Can you imagine us running down the interstate passing those Peterbilts at 80 mph with these valuable antique cars in the back? I couldn't so I told Clyde to slow down, but the truck was raring to go and wouldn't driver slower than 75 mph all the way to the car show.

We arrived in New Bern around noon on Friday, found our hotel after driving 847 miles and got the tow vehicle and trailer situated so we would be able to unload easily on Saturday morning. We walked to the host hotel to pick up the registration packages, say hello to some AACA friends, a few of whom I had not seen since the AACA tour in Mobile back in 2001, then do some exploring.

New Bern, NC is one of the earliest settlements on the east coast. Occasionally, you can see buildings

that have endured over two hundred years with little change. We spent the afternoon doing what you are supposed to do at an AACA meet; seeing the sights, looking over the competition and visiting with folks who enjoy the same things. Friday night we experienced something new to me, North Carolina bar-b-que. Although it was good, it had a rather vinegary taste, which identifies it North Carolina bar-b-que. It was served along with fried chicken, potato salad, cole slaw and iced tea. They also have the best crab cakes I have ever eaten in New Bern.

I was told this was only one of many Meets the First Capital Chapter of the North Carolina Region has put on. That was evident from the start. What makes this meet unique is that the cars are parked in the

downtown area on streets that are closed to traffic starting Friday at midnight. Each class has its designated parking area although there may be only a very few cars in that particular class. This allows the participants the opportunity to mingle with the spectators who enjoy asking questions and talking with the owners. Another plus is being able to visit the small shops, cafes, and other places of business, all of which are open

all day. Many of them are very unique and interesting.

West Peterson, Editor in Chief, of the Antique Automobile magazine had me move the Crestliner out of the line and took some pictures, which may be in an upcoming issue of the magazine.

That evening was the Awards Banquet, which all the competitors look forward to. I am glad to see this is becoming less formal and more "member friendly", allowing everyone to be relaxed and comfortable. It was good to spend some quiet time before the meal with Buddy & Patt Paquet who had been there since Wednesday taking care of registration and trying to solve all the problems that go along with that part of a meet. The five of us had a table near the front of the room and a good view of all the presentations. I was thrilled to received a Senior Award for the 1951 Ford Crestliner that got its Junior Award in Punta Gorda, FL last February. Original Hershey's Kissmobile on display

The original Hershey's Kissmobile Cruiser is celebrating its 10th anniversary this year and we're excited to have the opportunity to showcase the Kissmobile Cruiser at the AACA Museum. The Kissmobile will be available for visitors to see through Oct. 14, 2007.

The Hershey's Kissmobile cruiser is a 12-foot tall, 26-foot long custom-made vehicle resembling three Hershey's Kisses – a classic Hershey's Kisses Brand Milk Chocolate, a Hershey's Kisses with Almonds and a Hershey's Hugs Brand Milk Chocolate.

This specific Kissmobile Cruiser, one of four that have been built, has reached the end of its tour life It will now stay in the Hershey area as an important part of the Hershey Chocolate story. Since the creation of the Hershey's Kissmobile in 1997, the cruiser has traveled over 250,000 miles and distributed samples of over 2,000,000 Hershey's Kisses Brand Milk Chocolates.

The mission of the Kissmobile is to create an emotional connection with Hershey's consumers and to raise donations and awareness of the Children's Miracle Network. All money raised locally stays in the community and benefits the Children's Miracle Network hospitals.

2007 marks the 100^{th} anniversary of the Hershey's kiss

Hershey's Kisses were introduced on July 7, 1907. Lore has it that the treat was named for the lip-smacking sound of the machinery "kissing" the conveyor belt during the manufacturing process. Automated wrapping replaced traditional hand wrapping in 1921 but it was 1924 before Milton S. Hershey, the corporation's founder obtained a registered trademark for the confection.

The bite-size chocolates were not produced between 1942 and 1949 because of the rationing of silver foil during and after WWII. Instead, ingredient mixing units in the Kisses' molding department were used to temper chocolate paste for the military ration bar, producing more than 3 billion units during this period.

Arriving just in time for Christmas, the traditional silver foil Kiss was joined by red and green ones in 1962. It would be another six years before wrapping colors changed coming in pastel blue, pink and green for Easter.

In 1976 a trademark was obtained for the configuration of the Kisses with their familiar foil wrap. The red and silver kisses for Valentine's debuted in 1986 and the Fall Harvest Kisses joined the product lineup in 1991. While almonds were added in 1990 it wasn't until 1993 that Hugs came into being. The years of 2002, 2003 and 2004 each brought changes to the Kisses with different flavors; some on a limited basis while others remained permanent. Way back in 1989, the Kisses became the fifth most popular candy in the U.S.

Few confections can match the iconic Kiss featured on a postage stamp launched on Jan. 13, 2007 which is only the beginning of an advertising blitz that will "smother you with Kisses" this year.

And that is totally aside from bringing home an AACA Senior Award for the '51 Crestliner and a Preservation Award for the '60 Thunderbird. Until recently I did not know what a Preservation Award is. If you are like me and don't know either, I will try to explain. When a vehicle has won an AACA First Junior Award and a Senior Award (you have to get a First Junior before you can compete for a Senior Award) and is entered again in a national meet and it scores at least 350 points, you receive the Preservation Award which is a 11" x 16" walnut plague with a 7" x 9" pewter plaque and another smaller one engraved with your name and the vehicle. You can receive a Preservation Award recognition 200 times or more as long as the car scores the required number of points.

Local shows like we have here in the Deep South Region do not use the same criteria for judging as does national meets. For example, at our local show the best car in the category wins. At a national meet, cars are judged against the book and not other cars. Everyone should go to a national meet, at least once. Not only is it fun, but you meet lots of nice car people from all over the country, in all walks of life and best of all, they're all on a first-name basis.



DSR creates special venue for Battle House Hotel grand re-opening By Scott Henderson

I am not a history buff and therefore don't remember much about the Battle House Hotel except it was a landmark in Mobile for almost two centuries. Originally built in the early 1800s, it burned down around the end of the century but reopened again in 1912 and was shuttered in 1973. More than one US President slept there adding to the heritage of this fine old structure. In it's day it was *The Place* for weddings, civic gatherings, Mardi Gras balls, proms and the place to be seen. Being only nine years old at the time, its closing wasn't of any great importance to me.

Afterwards, it became a place of disuse and disrepair. But not any more. Following more than five years and millions of dollars of renovations, it is now one of the premier Renaissance Hotels.
