

COOKING WITH DSR

The club has so many great cooks and nearly everyone who has had the opportunity to taste Geneva Cammons' ORANGE SLICE CAKE has asked for the receipe. So for all of you, here it is:

3 1/2 cups flour

2 cups sugar

eggs

2

1 cup butter or margerine

tsp vanilla flavoring

cup buttermilk

tsp baking soda 1

cups chopped pecans

8 oz can cocanut -1

lb orange slice candy

chipped

1b chopped dates 1.

cup fresh orange juice

2 cups powdered sugar

Dissolve baking soda in buttermilk and have ready. Mix better, sugar, vanilla and buttermilk. Add eggs, one at a time. Roll Specans, orange slices, dates and cocanut in flour. Mix with liquids until stiff using hands to mix. Preheat oven to 250 degrees and bake for $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours in tube or loaf pans.

Mix powdered sugar with orange juice and pour over cake while it is hot.


GENEVA'S CHEESE BALL

Don't ignore yourbrakes

If your reaction time is typical, you'll travel about 70 feet in an emergency stop from 65 mph before your foot reaches the brake pedal. With visual impairment — poor eye sight, bad lights or windshield wipers, or if you're experiencing the effects of medicine or alcohol — reaction time will be slower.

Further, if you've neglected mechanical maintenance, hitting the brake pedal may be only the beginning of your crisis. Erratic braking action can cause a bad emergency situation to become worse, as it can pull your car right into the accident—or it may not stop at all. That's the number one fear among drivers, according to one national survey.

Despite recent advancements in braking system design, including anti-lock brakes, this vital safety system is among the most neglected on our motor vehicles and a leading mechanical cause of acci-

dents.

The chain of events that occurs in your car's braking system is, as the expression goes, as strong as its weakest link. A malfunction of any part of the system can cause brakes to be erratic or to fail completely.

Here's what happens when you apply

the brake pedal:
The pressure of your foot against the pedal is transferred to the hydraulic master cylinder, were pressurized fluid is fed to trainingly hydraulic cylinders at the

four wheels.

On disc brakes, the caliper causes friction pads to squeeze the spinning rotor (like brake calipers squeezing the rim of a like wheel), slowing or stopping the wheel.

On drum-type brakes, a wheel cylinder receives the pressure and forces the brake shoes against the rotating drums.

Some vehicles have disc brakes or drum brakes on all four wheels; many have a combination of disc on front, drum on rear. In every case it is friction that stops the vehicle. Motion energy is converted to heat, which is dissipated by air cooling the rotors and drums.

Simple as the process may sound, it involves a complex system of parts that must function in concert. Friction and heat, combined with exposure to the elements and road contamination, lead to wear and deterioration of the braking system. Periodic inspection and service is essential.

Legislative Update

Update on antique tag bill

Past Exhaust Whistles have included news about a proposal in the state legislature to tighten up regulations concerning antique tags. Introduced by Rep. Mike Mikell (R-Mountain Brook), the main thrust of the act is to keep vehicles with autique tags offthe streets during morning and evening rush hours. Those who wish to drive with an antique tag during those hours would be required to display a decal costing \$20 a year.

The impetus to change the existing law has come because so many such tags now are being used on "clunkers" instead of vehicles for which they originally were intended. And Alabama's Department of Revenue estimates it's losing up to \$2.5

million annually.

Officially Mikell's proposal is House bill #665. Alabama old car hobbyists are studying and distributing copies of the bill, but no clear consensus has developed pro or con. Some suggest they'd like things to stay as they are, but in light of the possibility of no antique tags, the Mikell proposal might be worth considering.

Ed Rouze, editor of the AACA Central Alabama *Flat Tire News*, suggests a better proposal is one which may be coming from lawmaker Gerald Dial. While current antique tags would be grandfathered, the Dial measure would permit antique tags only on cars 35 years or older.

Just before Exhaust Whistle press time, we contacted Common Cause lobbyist Betty Cork of Montgomery. She said the Mikell bill was reported favorably from Ways and Means March 3, but at this point "isn't going very fast." Chances are it will die, at least during this session.

If you'd like to express your views to Mikell, his phone at the House of Representatives is 205-242-7600.
