One of the first dances portraved the wed-

Another dance portrayed 1861 Confederate soldiers in their gray uniforms and issuing Rebel yells carrying the C.S.A. flag to the strains of Dixie. 
We wandered through at our own pace and were finished in approximately one hour.

Old diesel engine restored

Two Lamar County, Mississippi men have completed a project to restore an old diesel engine to original running condition. Vernon King retired from the grocery business in 1976 and took up collecting antique clocks as a hobby and later became interested in old engines. Harry Cole was a large-scale soybean farmer and owns a complete machine shop equipped to maintain large equipment.

The diesel engine certainly qualifies as that. The huge Fairbanks-Morse Model 32 YB is a two cycle, two-cylinder stationary diesel engine weighing about six tons. It stands nine feet high and occupies 80 square feet of space. With cylinders of 12" bore and 15" stroke, the 80 horsepower engine drives a flywheel of five and a half feet in diameter at 300 revolutions per minute.

The engine has an interesting history. Originally, it was manufactured in early 1926 at Fairbanks-Morse Engine Works. It was shipped to the Farmer's Gin Co. of Seminary, MS in August, 1926. Later, a Mr. Lawrence Hemeter purchased the engine and, deciding to modernize, traded the big engine to the Hattisburg Compress Company. It was sold at some point to two men in Oakvale, MS who used it to replace an old steam engine in their cotton gin. The Oakvale gin ceased operation in either 1957 or 1958, coinciding with the demise of the cotton business in South Mississippi.

Several years later another Oakvale man purchased the gin property with the intent of salvaging the gin building. The big engine was left sitting in the open until November, 1989 when Mr. King heard about the engine and purchased it. With the help of Harry Cole, in early 1990, he began dismantling the engine in order to move it from its woody location to the Hattisburg area. Over the next two years, the engine was completely disassembled, cleaned, repaired and reassembled. Due to age and exposure, many parts were unusable. Since no source for replacement parts existed, all of those needed were specially built by Mr. Cole in his machine shop. The engine was assembled, over a 30 month period, from the ground up as the parts were ready. In mid-1992 the 67 year old giant engine came to life again, some 34 years after being shut down "permanently".

Mr. King and Mr. Cole have restored and housed this grand old engine for the sole purpose of preserving, for future generations, this piece of history which is a legacy of our forefathers.
