
When the show ended on Sunday afternoon, the area in back of the Coliseum had dried enough to

#### **Historical Highlights**

#### 1911 Sears

Body Style: Motor Buggy Model: J No. of Models: 6 Engine: Air Cooled Cylinders: 2 Opposed HP: 10/12 Prices: \$325 - \$485

Maker: Scars Motor CarWorks Chicago, IL

The high wheeler, was perhaps, the most American of all motor vehicles. The solid-tired buggy wheelers, anywhere from 36 to 48 inches in diameter, were aimed toward the farmer, salesman, doctor, real estate agent, businessman—that market which used the deplorable, deeply-rutted, muddy or sandy rural roads of that era—since a high wheeler could go where its heavy air-tired, low-slung counterpart could not. Also, high wheelers were inexpensive to buy and to run.

High wheeled Sears machines (and all other makes) were simple, buggy-like, unsophisticated; barely fitting the description of an automobile. Tillersteering, friction drive with final drive by chain was common to all. Speed was no more than that supplied by horse and buggy. The midwest was the focal point of some 75 high wheeler manufacturers, and Chicago was the hub. The Sears is typical of the breed.

In 1908 the Sears automobile (motor buggy) appeared for the first time in its famed catalogue. Prior to this, Sears contracted for a cheap, sturdy car designed and built by pioneer inventor-engineer A.S. Krotz; secured a factory and placed him in charge. Some fifty men were employed and built the car themselves. However, numerous suppliers contributed bits and pieces to the final product. The 1908 model, Catalog No. 118, sold for \$395 complete with solid rubber tires, three oil-burning lamps, horn and fenders.

Sears vehicles for 1911 were offered in a variety of models (mostly one basic chassis with options). For the city and interurban trade, pneumatic-tired machines were available. Please see SEARS on Page 8

After lunch, I went to the Membership Roundtable and Buddy went to the Judging School.



Having completed those, we gathered in the lobby with others to re-hash what we had learned.

That evening it was back on the school buses to head for the

dinner cruise aboard the Belle of Louisville paddling

up and down the Ohio river. It was a time to relax with our fellow hobbyists and enjoy the buffet dinner and some hobby talk. The evening was pleasant out on deck but the area inside was like a sauna. Everyone ate quickly and scurried to find a place at the rail in the breeze.

Saturday morning dawned clear and warm but by 8:00 AM when the judge's breakfast began, so did the rain. It last about 30 minutes and folks were running to put windows up and covers on. As soon as the breakfast was finished, it was off to the show. The show itself was held indoors at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center in air conditioned comfort with 283 cars registered. Of course, there were a few who didn't make it. We were unloaded from the trailer and in the building within 45 minutes and boy, did it feel good. Last minute cleaning and polishing isn't too bad if it is cool. This is another opportunity to greet friends who come in the day of the show and also to meet people from all over the country. We were excited to actually meet personally a couple from Harrison, Ohio, that we had met on the Internet. We had made plans ahead of time and when they walked up, we just knew who each other was. They also met some members from their general area who will help them get into an AACA chapter there.

Before we knew it judging duties had been completed and the cars were officially released. We loaded the car up and headed back to the hotel to get ready for the awards later that evening. opted to skip the banquet and ate dinner with friends from Florida then go to see "who won what". We received our Preservation Award, said our goodbyes and headed for the room to pack for an early departure. Also, Sears built a limited line of commercial vehicles. Transmission was the friction disc type, frames were pressed steel, axles of 1-1/8 inch solid drop forge and rear brakes were double acting, expanding and "non-rattling". A standard wheelbase of 72 inches; the wheels selected solid hickory. The piano box body was 67 inches long, 30 inches wide and painted black. The fuel tank located under the seat held six gallons and top speed was 25 mph.

Sears pushed hard on all fronts to promote this car and apparently very successfully. It all added up to: "It beats feeding, watering, hitching, currying the horse--and it doesn't eat when it isn't working." Sears produced some 3500 high wheelers -- by 1912 they were gone from the catalog and gone from America.

Ed. Note: As previously mentioned with regard to Historical Highlights, I found twelve pieces in a flea market and it is simply laminated sheets with no information as to where it came from or the author.

# History in the Making .... Back to Back National Meets

It had never been attempted before, but as the old saying goes "Necessity is the Mother of invention". Originally, the 1997 Grand National Meet was scheduled to be held in Grand Forks, ND July 25-26. Due to the devastation of the entire community by floods earlier in the year, the North Dakota Region had to regretfully cancel hosting the event. The AACA Board of Directors took immediate action to solve the problem. Solution

came in the form of the Cedar Valley Region agreeing to assume the responsibility. The Grand National would be held in conjunction with the Central Division National Fall Meet they were hosting Aug. 7-8 in Cedar Falls, Iowa. What an undertaking!

Buddy and I left Mobile at 5:45 AM on Aug. 5 and arrived in Hendersonville, TN spending the night with friends to begin a four vehicle caravan the next day to Iowa. 
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
