



committee's choice plus a space for write-ins.

Lloyd thanked Herb Counselman for the clock he donated to the club house. He thanked all those that placed cars in the Bel Air Mall display, and all those members that contributed and assisted in our successful rummage sale on November 9th.

Hop said he would donate Christmas lights to decorate the building and

several people volunteered to put them up.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 on the dot!




friends in Mississippi. We will all miss him.

Then on Saturday afternoon, Ray Harper put a dummy in his model A rumble


