

Robert Moore thanked the group for participating in the Christmas Weddings that earned \$400 for the club.


The 50/50 pot (\$22.50) was won by Frank DeCrease and the holiday wreath was won by Anna White.

That's what I thought, too. But there's this little word that's going to change all that: PARTS. There are parts that your car needs, and parts that it might need some day. There are parts that it doesn't need, but would be good for trading for parts that it might need. There are parts that it already has, but it needs better looking ones. At this point you might say, "We're not going to show this car. We just want to drive it." But I have found that to a man, every car is a 'show' car. You probably don't really care if the left rear ashtray is missing. How often are you likely a

to have a left rear passenger who smokes? But he cares. And he cares if all the hubcaps don't match, or the radio doesn't work, or the rearview mirror is incorrect (another word you're going to hear a lot). "I know it's got a perfectly good one-but it's incorrect for a '48." After all, even if your new pride and joy is not going into competition, his car buddies are going to be looking it over. So it is, in fact, going to be 'shown' and it's got to at least be respectable. Imagine his embarrassment if some total stranger at a car meet. glancing casually under the hood were to remark to him, "Hey guy, you know you got the wrong dipstick for that year?". Well, there is a never ending need (lust?) for parts, and they are frequently expensive and often hard to come by, as you will find out, the first time you are sent out into a mile-long flea market to turn up a what's it exactly like the one weighing twelve pounds and covered with grunge which you have been given to carry around in your purse for easy reference.

To see, and to be seen, is the key to stay out of trouble. Dim lights are usually NOT wiring related. The problem lies in the return route, grounds. Corrosion, loose fixtures, too good of a paint job before re-assembly, etc. A simple cure is "STAR" washers, inside or outside. They bite through the paint/rust and into fresh metal. Locate them from chassis to body to fenders to brackets to light fixtures, etc...like a chain of command.

Bulbs can be purchased with different candle power, "Halogen" or "Xenon". Bulbs can be adapted, they are much brighter and use less voltage.

Diodes can be introduced to make some bulbs do two jobs, such as brake lights and turn indicators without modifying the existing harness. Antique, old or whatever, it needs help to survive in our modern traffic or you are a liability. Extra lights can be unobtrusive or a part of what you have or can be "clamp on" which you can remove for a show.

Lloyd Crowdus is in Providence Hospital (Room 633) as of Feb. 14 having been admitted on Feb. 10.


LaVerne Hopkins is home after her check up in New Orleans and is "A-OK".

Jerry Finley was severely bitten by the "flu-bug" and is just now beginning to mend.


Mickey Cox has been having a difficult time with allergies after her recent heart surgery.


