*A copy of the November treasurer's report was distributed. On a motion from John Reid with second from Ross Sloan, the group voted to move \$2558.60 from the car show account into the building fund account.

Put Safety First

I recently came across an article printed in "Things You Auto Know" some years ago by Bob Bilier that I think warrants a second look.

Two very common items were discovered to be potentially hazardous in the garage and workshop. One is disposable cigarette lighters and the other is contact lenses.

There was case where an arc was accidentally struck with an electric welder while the mask was not in place. The victim was wearing contact lenses and the flash of the high current arc resulted in the fusion of the contact lenses and the corneas of the eyes. The result was a total loss of eyesight. Whenever arc welding is going on, make sure the welder and the others in the shop are not wearing contact lenses.

Disposable cigarette lighters are seemingly harmless unless they are used to occasionally light a propane or acetylene torch. An open flame or a piece of weld spatter can perforate the plastic lighter casing. The explosion is capable of the same force as three sticks of dynamite.

Many potential dangers lurk in the garage and workshop. All members should put forth an extra effort to be sure their work environment is safe for themselves and others.

"Mama Mia...it's Italian"



You many not want to be a judge at a car show but you would like to know what they look at, right? The opportunity for you to find out this and more is yours when the DSR hosts it's second judging seminar Sunday, March 3, 1996.

It will be held at the clubhouse, beginning at 1:00 PM, and will be moderated by Jerry Finley, Buddy Paquet and John Reid. They will cover consistency in judging a car and the different types of judging methods. Writers are one of the most important parts of the judging team and their role will be discussed also. Following this will be a "hands-on" session with participants being formed into teams and going through the actual judging process on cars.

It is important that the female gender understand this is not for men only; there are a number of women who judge at shows. Last year we had almost as many women as men at the seminar and some of the best questions were asked by women.

This event is not just a DSR function, it is open to members of all car clubs and any visitors who might be interested in attending. AACA, Mustang and the 100 point system of judging will give you an idea of what goes on out on the show field. Plan to drive your antique/classic car, you may want it to be used for the participants to practice on.
