

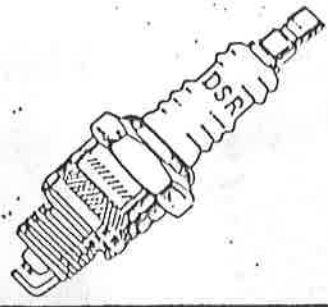

Minutes

Deep South Region, A. A. C. A.
November 17, 1989

President Bill Tunnell welcomed visitors Mike Huddle, Ron Bush, and Michael Thomas.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

President Bill asked Ed Grimes, Sue Mason, and Eric Auyang to count votes in tonight's election of club officers for 1990. He announced that each ballot will have a voting member's name attached on a tag. To vote, one is to remove the name tag, putting the filled out ballot in one envelope to be collected, and his or her name tag in another.

The President called on Bob Hedberg, asking the membership whether there were questions on the Treasurer's Report submitted to them with the newsletter. There were none.

There was a call for Old Business and the Christmas party was discussed.

President Bill called for a discussion of the by-laws, as a copy of those with proposed changes were sent out to the membership in advance of this meeting so they might be discussed, then voted upon. After considerable discussion the following actions took place:

"Hop" Hopkins moved, regarding Article II, Section 2, that this item be altered as follows: That the Executive Board of the DSR be allowed only to make recommendations to the general membership, and that the members be allowed to vote on those recommendations. Ray Harper seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

Tom Brown moved that a by-laws committee be assembled, to consist of at least three people from the general membership. The committee would be charged with collecting opinions of the membership, then meeting to make specific changes on by-laws, which they would bring before the membership for a vote. Bob Mason seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

Sue Mason moved, and George Mazzagotte seconded a motion, that those who object to specific sections of the by-laws as proposed for discussion in this meeting, be assigned to the above committee. The motion was passed, and the President asked for volunteers. Those selected among the members who volunteered are: Pierre Fontana, Nell Few, "Hop" Hopkins, Ray Harper, and Lou Eschete. Jerry Page moved that we vote on these five volunteers, and his motion was seconded by Bob Mason. The motion was passed.

Addition general discussion on the by-laws followed. Katherine Harper questioned, regarding Article IV, Section 4, why four offices must be available to sign checks, and President Bill assigned this question to the committee for discussion and a recommendation.

In a question about Article V, Section V, Elvin Few suggested that the DSR should not pay the yearly national dues of any member deemed "honorary" by the membership. The President assigned the question to the committee.

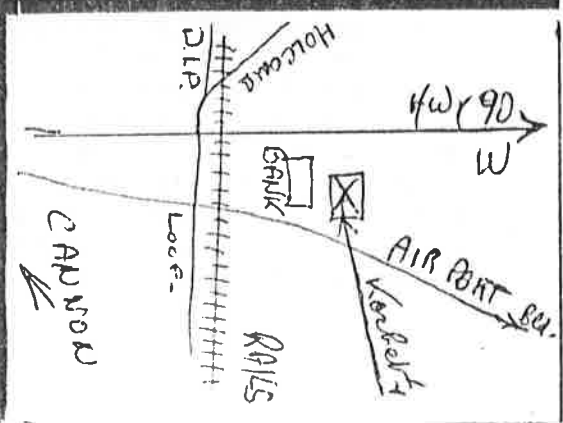
After a further general discussion by the membership, President Bill adjourned the meeting.

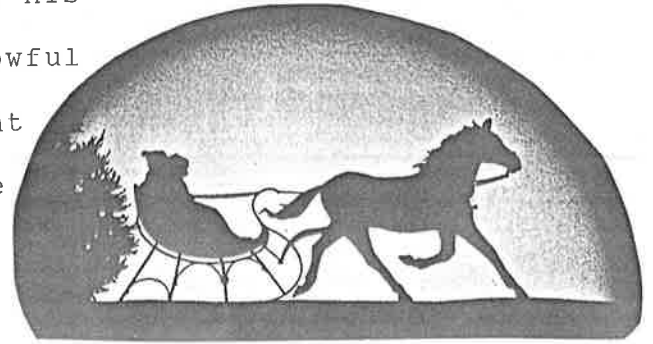

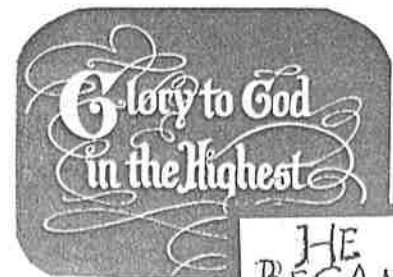
ON GOING HOME FOR CHRISTMAS

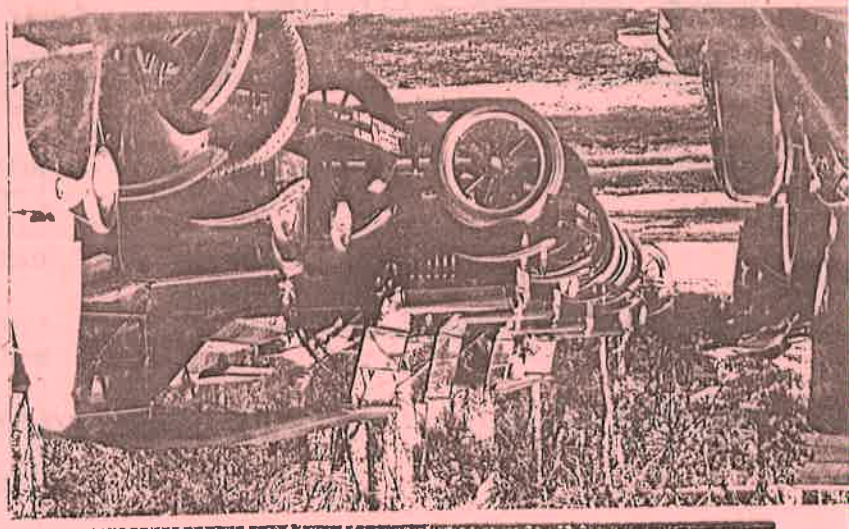
