

Fairhope's "Glorious 4th" Family Fun Day

The Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce is working with the City of Fairhope in an effort to make the 4th of July festivities, held at the Fairhope Municipal Pier, more of a family day. Mr. Don McGriff has been asked to chair the event which is being labeled Fairhope's "Glorious 4th" Family Fun Day. The event will begin on the morning of July 4th at 10:00 a.m. with a full range of activities through 6:00 p.m. with the annual City of Fairhope fireworks display at approximately 8:00 p.m.

Beginning at 10:00 a.m. a parade will move south on Section Street from the Fairhope Civic Center and north on Fairhope Avenue to the Municipal Pier.

At approximately 10:30 a.m. an opening ceremony will be held at the Pier. Included in the ceremony will be a flag raising, a convocation, a speech by the Mayor of Fairhope, and patriotic music. Chairs will be provided for senior citizens.

Activities for all ages will be provided. Activities Chairmen are Buford Lipscomb and Dennis Brown. Children's activities will be purpets, clown face booth, pony rides, dance recitals, water balloon relay, sand sculpture, bike race, kite flying contest, watermelon eating contest, and fish for prizes booth, plus others. Other activities will be a dunking booth, volleyball tournament, chess tournament, checker tournament, picture board, best decorated boat award and boat parade, best decorated booth award, best American costume award, telent show, oratorical contest (What Makes America Great), old bathing suit revue, square dancers, gospel groups, art show contest (artists who best capture the American Spirit), American History skit contest, Miss Jubilee Pageant/fashion show (sportswear), and tug of war tournament.

Booths are available for any church, civic, school, or other non-profit organization at a cost of \$25.00 per booth. Twenty-five arts and crafts booths will also be available on a first come, first serve basis with local artists and craftsmen given preference.

Persons interested in volunteering their time or needing information on booths should contact the Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce. Organizations such as thurches, elvis groups, *te, are encouraged to participate by providing volleyball teams, tug of war teams, and participants in the parade. Prizes will be awarded for all contests including a prize for the best Early American costume.
