The Psychological Stages of Restoration

If you have already completed the restoration of a car, they you are well aware of what this article discusses. If you're in the middle of a restoration, then you are somewhere in this staging process. If you haven't yet embarked on a restoration project, hopefully you'll find this story informative.

Stage 1 - Excitement

This stage sets the tone for the stages to follow. It begins with finding the car that you've decided to restore. You discover the imperfect jewel that you're going to rebuild into a custom or an original restoration is still, for the most part, unknown. The more intense this stage is, the more likely the stages to follow will also be intense.

Stage 2 - Anticipation

This stage is characterized by hours pouring over your vehicle identifying everything that needs to be fixed, replaced, etc. You begin researching needed parts and prices in catalogs, and envisioning what your finished project will look like. Most likely you decide whether your car will be restored to a custom classic or original.

Stage 3 - Realization

This is the stage where dreams and reality suddenly come together. It is where the magnitude of your restoration project finally sets in. The questions about how much time, effort, skill and money are going to be required starts to come into focus. Many restorations die a fairly rapid death at this stage in their owner's life.

Stage 4 - Frustration

There may be some out there who are able to escape this stage, but it's not probable. This stage is characterized by things not going according to your plan; parts do not arrive on time, one thing after another goes wrong, etc.

Stage 5 - Anxiety

If you can make it through stage 4, then stage 5 becomes a positive experience rather than a negative one: however, too much anxiety is not a good thing. This stage occurs when your car is now in driveable, presentable condition - not finished yet, but good enough to get out on the road and drive it a bit and maybe take to a few shows. At this stage, things normally can't occur fast enough to move on to stage 6.

Stage 6 - Enjoyment

This is the last step, and hopefully, the one that lasts a long, long time. It is this stage that the restoration is "complete" and you finally start experiencing the satisfaction of driving and showing your car and accepting the thumbs up and favorable comments. It is obviously the best stage of any restoration, and is well worth surviving the other 5 stages to get to.

So for those of you who have made the trek already to stage 6, congratulations and continue to enjoy! For those of you who are still on the journey, don't give up; the end is worth it all. And finally, to those of you haven't started yet, take a deep breath, tighten your belt one notch, and jump in! It's an experience you won't forget.

QI am responding to Jim Rouse's letter in the Dec. 8, 1994, issue concerning American light-duty trucks. I, too, have a 1946 Dodge half-ton WC express pickup truck, engine no. T112*79671, body number S1124065. My truck was purchased new by Lewis P. Kelker (now deceased) of Pensacola, Fla., on December 1, 1945. 1 have most of the tag/tax receipts. I purchased this WC on Nov. 1, 1972, and have restored, repaired, and/or rebuilt it and have enjoyed driving it ever since. This WC is a unique civilian unit in that there was no shiny metal on the entire truck except the outside door lock key receiver on the right door. The dash gauges and speedometer light bulbs had blue plastic diffusers over them making the interior lights very dim. I have never seen another 1946 or '47 Dodge pickup without shiny metal on the exterior. I am sure that if there was one, there are more seen another. Chrysler Corp. furnished me with copies of file photos of the 1946 WC halfton express that show shiny metal on the cowl light rims, headlight rims, hood ornament, hood name plates, nose moulding, outside door handles, and hub caps. The unit in the file photo has one windshield wiper, but my truck has two. I believe, but have no evidence to support it, that my WC was manufactured for military use and then sold on the civilian market at the end of World War II. If my unit was not built for the military and diverted to the civilian market, could it be the unit that Dodge truck authority Don Bunn stated was built in Nov. 1945? What about the units produced between April and Nov. 1945 — are production numbers available? Not to dispute Bunn concerning the likeness of 1945, '46, and '47 Dodge truck models, but the '47s I have seen had wing windows in the door glass. Carl Bailey, Robertsdale, Ala.

If you look on page 59 of the book A Dodge Pickups: History and Restoration Guide 1918-1971, co-authored by Don Bunn and available from Classic Motorbooks, 🕿 (800)826-6600, you will see a 🕔 photo of a 1945 Dodge half-ton express with painted trim, matching the description of your truck. The caption states, "On April 11, 1945, the first half-ton pickup built since February 1942 moved down the line along with 3/4-ton 4x4 military trucks. Most civilian trucks built in 1945 were 11/2-ton chassis cabs. These trucks were sold to buyers who could prove they contributed in an important way to the war effort. The grille, hubcaps, hood ornament and other trim items are painted to conserve chrome."


Seems as if everyone has been plagued with whatever it is that's going around causing aches, pains, sneezing, coughing, watery eyes, etc., including your truly.






For Mismatched Holes




For holes too near the edge




For redrilled holes that still don't match




Serrated head for vise grip torquing




For out of round holes


