


club has been a part of the Center's Mardi Gras parade for a number of years.

#### **AACA 1997 Annual Report**

The year closed with a total membership of 56,241 and the Junior Membership grew to 148 members. There were 4,088 vehicles judged at the nine meets held during the year by 2,559 judges.

The AACA Internet Website came fully of age in 1997 with approximately 45,000 visitors. AACA ended the year with 405 Regions and Chapters, essentially the same as the previous year.

The Legislative Committee established an infrastructure of leaders in all areas of the country which have had good success in communicating in a timely fashion responding to local and state issues.

The Library & Research Center had a busy year. A major contribution was received from the Benny Bootle estate, a portion of which will be used to obtain a color copier of the quality need for operations. It will greatly enhance making color information available for members.

The AACA Museum received a very generous donation from the Wm. J. Cammack Supporting Organization. Included are three Tucker automobiles along with substantial memorabilia relating the Tucker vehicles. At year end, the Museum had 31 donated vehicles of which several are on display at National Headquarters.


