

Antique Tag Bills Back Again

It appears that we will be confronted with changes in the antique tags until the state's lawmakers find a way to increase revenues. I personally have no problem with a measure that would differentiate a true classic or collector car from what we normally refer to as "clunkers". One bill which was introduced by Senator Michael Figures(D) of Mobile. All vehicles 25 years or older currently is issued a tag for \$10 with no renewal fees. His bill would increase the tag cost to \$25 with an annual renewal fee. Another bill, sponsored by Sen. Doug Ghee (D) of Anniston would raise the cost of the tag to \$25 and prohibit them from being used on general transportation vehicles. Still another pro-posal by Sen. Dewayne Freeman(D) of Huntsville would raise the cost of the tags to \$20 and require owners to renew them every two years for another \$20. His bill also calls for photo documentation of the vehicle when applying for the tag as well as proof the vehicle has been used in shows, parades or contests during the previous 24 months. Last on the list is Rep. Paul Parker (D) of Tuscaloosa would require vehicles from now on to be 35 years old to get an antique tag but the cost would remain at \$10.

Other than the information on Senator Figures bill, the above information was passed on by the *Flat Tire News* which is the newsletter from the Central Alabama Region.

We were contacted Monday by John Myer who is Vice President of National Activities, AACA, who alerted us to the fact it was possible one or more of these bills could come up in the House of Repre-sentatives for a vote as soon as they convened this week. Also Ernie Youens received a call from Millard Young, a collector from Piedmont, AL.

You can express your opinion on the situation by contacting your local senators and legislators. The number for the Mobile Legislative Delegation is 432-0482.

Unmounted Tire Storage And Spare Tire Usage Recommendations

Wallace Wade, Dallas, Texas

The tread and sidewall of tires are compounded to resist deterioration caused by sunlight and ozone. Nevertheless, stored tires should be protected against these and other potentially damaging conditions. An important thing to remember about tire storage is to use the tires which have been stored the longest first. The longer the storage period, the more exposure there is to potential damage.

Storing Unmounted Tires

Do store -

- Where area is clean, cool, dry, dark and well ventilated but with a minimum of circulating air
- So that the tire on the bottom of a stack retains its shape
- Whitewall to whitewall to avoid staining
- Protected by an opaque waterproof covering, if outdoors, but avoid creating a heat box or steam bath
- Where tires are raised off the storage surface, if outdoors

Don't store -

- Where area is wet, oily, greasy such as with gasoline or petroleum based products
- Where subject to extreme temperatures or direct sunlight
- In the same area as an electric motor or other ozone generating source (if there is a question, check ozone levels to be sure they do not exceed 0.08 ppm)
- On black asphalt or other heat absorbent surfaces
- Adjacent to highly reflective surfaces such as sand or snow covered ground
- On piers, ship decks or other open unprotected areas

Storing Mounted Tires

Do store -

- Where area is clean, cool, dry, dark and well ventilated but with a minimum of circulating air
- Protected by an opaque waterproof covering, if outdoors, but avoid creating a heat box or steam bath
- Store the vehicle on blocks to remove all weight from the tires
- If the vehicle cannot be blocked up from the storage surface, completely unload it so minimum weight will rest on the tires. Keep tires, including the spare tire, inflated to recommended operating inflation pressure. The surface should be firm, reasonably level, well drained, and clean.
- Move the vehicle at least every three months to prevent a "flat spot" from developing (due to strain from deflection). If tires do develop a temporary "flat spot", it will usually disappear in a short period of time, about 25 miles of service.

Don't store -

- Where area is wet, oily, greasy such as with gasoline or petroleum based products
- Where subject to extreme temperatures or direct sunlight
- In the same area as an electric motor or other ozone generating source
- On black asphalt or other heat absorbent surfaces
- Adjacent to highly reflective surfaces
- On piers, ship decks or other open unprotected areas

Before Placing Tires In Service

- Inspect tires to be sure they are clean and free from foreign objects
- Remove any water that has collected in an unmounted tire
- When using a spare tire, have it checked for proper inflation pressure and condition as soon as possible after placing it in service on the vehicle.
