DSR Car Show scores big with "Antiquers"

When competitors began to arrive Saturday morning, May 9, 1998, they were met by the aroma of freshly brewed coffee and sausages cooking to be put into hot biscuits, That's the way to start a car show!

Signs, directing entrants and spectators to the clubhouse, were in place from I-65 out Springhill Avenue Extension and Moffat Road as well by 7:00 AM. The food wagon was set up and operating, the PA system was working, the flags flying and the workers were ready. All that was needed was participants. What had begun as a slightly overcast day was turning out to be perfect car show weather. By late morning the sun would burn off the haze and a slight breeze make being outdoors the place to be.

Last year DSR went back to a limited, or closed, show allowing only vehicles 25 years old or more to be entered. The numbers were down in 1997 which was expected. It was hoped there would be more vehicles this year. There were more this year and some very fine ones at that. Covering the grounds were over 100 cars including a few in a car corral. There were ten new Prestige Awards presented this year which means those ten vehicles scored 95 points or more of a possible 100. Nine of the 13 vehicles eligible for Recertification of Prestige were entered in the show and did, indeed, recertify by obtaining 90 of the 100 points.

The Editor spent 90 percent of the day inside at the Registration table or working on the score book so I didn't get to see the cars except when they drove by coming in or as they were leaving the field. Neither did I get to see all of the members who were there so this will be one time when "DSR members were" won't be included here. I will mention it was good to see our member from Louisiana, Charlie Froehlich, attending and to see Gavin Edwards there. Laura Faust sailed through the club-

house and I saw Bob Hedberg directing traffic. These are some folks we don't get to see often enough.

It appeared the Shriners' Chef Unit did a booming business. One of the fellows said they stopped selling hamburgers when the 160 buns were gone! I heard one woman say that the first one she had was so good she just had to have another. I am sure all the other food sold just as well.

Following the awards presentation, members and competitors alike helped to clean up so that most of the group was on the way home by 4:00 PM. It had been a long, hard day for some, a day of elation for trophy winners and generally speaking a good day for all. Those attending had the opportunity to visit with friends and fellow hobbyists as well as spend the day doing what they love, admiring vintage vehicles and sharing their knowledge. What more could one ask for?

Only a few people were aware of the show due to the lack of publicity or informational fliers. Representing DSR were E. Anderson, J. Finley and J. Reid, all of whom I understand brought home a trophy.

The Editor and spouse got hooked on touring a few years ago when we and the Lunsfords went with the Central Louisiana Chapter on a weekend tour. There just had not been another close enough and one that our car was eligible for. Last year we joined the Buzzard's Breath Touring Region. It is a non-geographical AACA Region which hosted the 1998 Southeastern Divisional Tour April 20-22 in Arab, Alabama. It was open to any pre-1973 vehicle. The Divisional Tours, or "mini-tours" are of shorter duration and less expensive. They were

started to encourage members with families and those who are not yet retired to

participate.

We left Mobile early Sunday morning and just a few blocks from the host hotel of the Spring Meet we got on US 321 Following our instructions we negotiated the secondary roads to Talledgea, Alabama where we toured the Talladega International Motorsports Hall of Fame and got a look at the NASCAR Speedway. After that we continued following our route to our lunch stop where we ran into other "tourists".

Back on US 231, we made our way through backwoods, small towns and villages to arrive in Arab, AL late in the afternoon. Headquarters was the Jameson Inn which has only 20 rooms, all of which were taken up by our group. Others were staying in their motorhomes set up in a

portion of the parking lot of City Park. We took the truck and trailer there to unload the car and fuel. The fuel was for ourselves. The Customs & Classic Car Club of Arab threw a barbecue for the 100+ of us on the tour. This figure represents 19 states and 56 cars. Back at the motel, we picked up our copy of the Roadkill Register which was the daily digest for the tour. You got a new issue each day and was important that you pick it up and read it for any changes in that day's tour activities.

It would be impossible due to space limitations to describe each day in detail but I just have tell a few highlights. Monday morning started off with breakfast with the mayor (who had his tie lopped off for transgressing the cardinal rule of being casual). This was

Not Another Bite Dessent

19 3/4 oz. packaged Fudge Brownie Mix

3 pkgs. Instant Chocolate Mousse (Each pkg. makes

4 - 1/2 cup servings)

8 Skor or Heath candy bars (1.4 oz. size)

12 ozs. frozen whipped topping, thawed.

Pre-heat oven according to brownie package directions. Bake brownies and let cool. Meanwhile, prepare chocolate mousse by directions. Break the candy bars into small pieces in food processor or by gently tapping the wrapped bars with a hammer or a meat mallet.

Break up half of the brownies into small pieces and place in bottom of large glass bowl. Cover with half the mousse, then half the candy and last with half of the whipped topping. Repeat layers with remaining ingredients.

This make a large dessert and one that requires only small servings. Be sure to have plenty of ice water or coffee to accompany it.

The first of the covered bridges, Horton Mill Covered Bridge, is the highest covered bridge above water in Alabama. Leaving it, we drove to Palisades Park for lunch. The view from the top of the mountain was spectacular although we did have to squint through some fog at times to see it. By this time we were approximately half-way through the day and it was time to eat again. We picked up our lunch pails, and I mean "pails" in the truest sense of the word, found a spot in the Lodge and did some "T & E".

Leaving the park, we were looking forward to the second covered bridge, Easley. It was a short bridge and there were no plans to stop. Not too far away was the last bridge of the day, Swann Covered Bridge. It is 324 feet and is the longest covered bridge in the state. It spans the Locust Fork of the Black Warrior River where our group had to stop for pictures There are several theories as to why there were covered bridges, most of which were built between 1830 and 1930. One theory is that it was to protect the bridge in foul weather; another is that it was to make the horses feel safe crossing the bridge or even to give travelers a place to get out of the rain. There are those who hold with idea they were to provide a courting place, hence the term "kissing bridge". Most likely, it was to strengthen the structure by making the four sides support each other as a unit.

We finished the day's drive of about 83 miles in early afternoon and were back in time to rest or get vehicles loaded up while we waited for the closing banquet. Ah. maybe that sounds a little to formal. Actually, what we had was a "Pizza Party in the Parking Lot".

The manager of the Jameson Inn had spent the day riding with Marien in her '23 Model T and couldn't quit talking about how much fun she had. We were all concerned about one of the tourists, Marjorie Mills, from Florida who had slipped on loose gravel, fell and broke her hip while we were stopped for lunch. We heard she had been transported to Birmingham for surgery. A little

more pizza, a little more talk and then it was time to say good-night and good-bye to everyone.

Thursday morning found us on the way home by 6:00 AM. When we reached I-65 South and were homeward bound, we realized it was the first time we had even seen an interstate highway since Sunday and had driven a little over 330 miles!


