#### AACA Touring, Louisiana style by Charlle Froehlich

The Louisiana Region of AACA is set up a little differently than the DSR and other regions in Alabama. The Louisiana Region is simply an umbrella for eight AACA chapters. The chapters are the actual clubs with membership, meetings, etc. One nice feature of this type organization is that each chapter sponsors an annual activity that all other chapters are invited to participate in as members of the region. As of this writing, there have been two tours conducted by the Louisiana Region chapters this year. The following is a summary of each.

Normally, the first weekend of April each year, the Contraband Chapter of Lake Charles holds a Spring Tour. It is usually headquartered somewhere in Southwest Louisiana but has been located in Texas at times. This year, the tour headquarters was in Lake Charles the weekend of April 6-8. Ardie was in North Dakota so I attended solo. I drove the green and greener '57 Ford Fairlane to Baton Rouge where I met two other couples who are longtime friends. We traveled together to Lake Charles, arriving on Friday in time to have lunch before the afternoon tour began.

One of the best things about touring is that you will see attractions you would never find on your own. An example was our first stop - the Gray Mansion on Shell Beach Drive in Lake Charles. It is not ordinarily open to the public but by special arrangement, we were given a guided tour. The Gray Mansion was built in the 1920s, modeled somewhat after the ante-bellum plantation homes of the south. Large rooms overlooking the lake and beautiful landscaped gardens are features of this home. It was designed and built for a lady who inherited the family fortune of lumber, oil and agriculture land. Additional portions of the afternoon tour included visits to the Imperial Calcasieu Museum and the Mardi Gras Museum located in the old renovated Central School Arts and Humanities Center. Friday evening concluded with a catered hospitality dinner at the host hotel.

Following Saturday morning's Continental breakfast, we headed north for a full day's touring. The first stop was 47 miles away in DeRidder. Here we visited the Doll Museum in a restored train station. Afterward, we were given a guided tour of the Hanging Jail. Now this was more interesting than it sounds. The jail is a designated historic site and has rather unique construction. Basically, there

is a spiral staircase in the middle of the building and the cells are staggered at different levels off this staircase. It was built in the early 1900s and was quite modern in that each cell had toilet facilities The "Hanging Jail" terminology and a shower. comes about because there was a double execution performed there about 1930. The two honorees had brutally bludgeoned and knifed a cab driver as he was pleading for his life. When caught there were brought to this jail. After a fair trial, they were sentenced to death. The execution was carried out by building a scaffold in the middle of the circular stairs and performing the deed. I would imagine this made quite an impression on the other prisoners in the jail at the time. No additional hangings were necessary. The jail was last used in 1970 and efforts to raise funds for restoration are underway.

Our group then proceeded to the town of DeQuincy and its Train Museum. A box lunch was served at the Train Museum grounds and then we The drive back to Lake toured the museum. Charles was by scenic rural roads. The banquet that evening was on the twenty-first floor of the Hibernia Tower in the private City Club. Now this in itself is worth a trip to Lake Charles. The view of the lake, the gambling casinos and the city from 21 floors up is spectacular. We had a special treat in that they had to open the Board Room especially for us as Louisiana Governor Foster was addressing a group in the regular dining area that night., They said we were moved for security reasons, but I am suspicious that they just wanted to get us out of sight. At any rate, good food, companionship and scenery were a fine conclusion to a nice tour. The drive home on Sunday was without any problems.

The next tour was the Louisiana Tour May 4-5 in Lafayette sponsored by the Evangeline Chapter. The Louisiana Tour is a rotating event in that a different chapter hosts the tour each year. It is usually the largest tour of the year, and about 50 cars from Texas, Alabama, and Mississippi, as well as Louisiana, were present this year. DSR was represented by 2 Froehlichs and 2 Musgroves. The Musgroves drove their '57 Thunderbird to Lafayette via I-10 while the Froehlichs tooled (Cont. on Page 5)

along in their '37 Ford 1/2 ton pickup leading a group of other old Fords. We started in Picayune with one couple in a 1940 Ford tudor. In Lacombe we were joined by another twosome in their 1947 Ford coupe. We pick up another couple driving a 1954 Ford club coupe. Arriving in Covington, we added a 1951 Ford 2-door and its owners to the We stayed off the Interstate and drove caravan. U.S. Highway 190 and a few state highways to Lafayette. One reason for the back roads was the slower speed we were traveling, but even more importantly, was the desire of the leader to take this group to one of the best restaurants in South Louisiana. If you can ever figure out how to get to Livonia around meal time, be sure to eat at Joe's Restaurant in Dreyfus Store. Excellent food at very reasonable prices.

After arriving in Lafayette and checking into the motel, we promptly found the liquid refreshment wagon (actually some found it before checking in). Tours in Louisiana are often accompanied by a refreshment wagon that might not be allowed in most other states. Enough about that! The tour officially opened Friday evening with a hospitality room and a band playing old sing-a-long songs. Naturally, this was followed by a meal and brief instructions for the Saturday tour.

Following a good night's rest and a quick Continental breakfast, we were ready to tour. The first portion of the tour was a 40 mile scenic route approximately circling the city of Lafayette and ending at the Acadian Culture Center. The Center is a portion of the Jean Lafitte National Historical Park and Preserve. It includes exhibits on Cajun culture and features a film illustrating the history of Acadian people. Their eviction from Canada and eventual arrival in Louisiana is a dramatic story.

From the Acadian Culture Center, we drove to We had lunch while being Vermillionville. entertained by an authentic Cajun band. Afterward we wandered through the exhibits of this recreated Adacian village. It is complete with craftsmen demonstrating their skills as they would have been performed in the past. The return trip to the motel completed this touring portion of this event. That

night we transported by bus or via our own autos to Lafayette Hall for a closing banquet. After a delicious meal, (read that as your choice of prime rib, steak, or crawfish entouffee) we were entertained by a lady Cajun humorist. Ask Leah to tell you some of her stories (if Leah can do the Cajun accent, that is). Awards and door prizes were presented making the 34th annual Louisiana Tour history.

The Froehlich-led tour group as described earlier was joined by Jay and Pam Armstrong in their beautiful 1950 Mercury woody wagon for the trip home via a different route. If anyone remembers driving U.S. 90 years ago from New Orleans to Lafayette, you would not believe the change that has occurred. This is now a thoroughly modern four lane divided road, parts of it with controlled access. I had not been on it since the last section was opened so that influenced our decision to try it out. Now, it is not as scenic as the old highway but it is a whole lot more driver-friendly. The trip home was a trouble free as the trip to Lafayette for which we were all thankful. Come to Louisiana and join us in our tours. Buddy and Patt and Bill and Leah are usually aware of the schedule and can help you obtain registration information.

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
