

## Australian 9T2 Tour

G'day Mates!

Paula and I aren't very good at being reporters, but we did volunteer to write a report on the Australian 9T2 Model T tour we participated in on our vacation.

We have to say that our success on our Australian vacation and tour was due largely to Peter and Sally Kable and Bill and Merrill Holder-Keeping whom some of you met at the 1991 Gulf Shores Model T tour. They were the two Australian couples that came to the tour and our barbeque and invited us to attend their club tour this year in Griffith, Australia.

We were met at the air port and taken to Peter & Sally's home where we met with other American's attending the tour. There were 37 Americans on the tour from all parts of the United States---California, Alabama, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Iowa, Indiana, Illinois, and Washington state. Some of these people were also at the Gulf Shores tour. Some of you may have met them as well.

Before we went to Peter & Sally's, they took us on a cruise on Sydney Harbour. We had lunch and toured some of the shops and then we went on a tour of the Sydney Opera House. You have seen it on television and in photos about Sydney---it looks like clam shells standing on end. It is a really interesting and fascinating place!

We then came back across the Harbour and took the train back to Sally's van parked in the out-skirts of town and then to her home in Kiama, approximately 70 miles away.

Upon arriving at their home we were treated to a wonderful supper ("tea") prepared by some other Americans that were guests as well. Their were 13 of us visiting in their home. They have a very large home which accommodated all of us. It was a very interesting home too because they are antique collectors as well---furniture, glassware, everything as well as Model T memorabelia.

After a good night's rest, we were all up early for breakfast and a time of repacking and streamlining our luggage to travel to Griffith for the tour. During that time we began to meet other Americans who were guests of other Aussies. Sally had organized for all of us to leave together and caravan to our first night's stay in Cootamundra, Aust. only about 175 miles away. This isn't a long way by our standards, but for them it is quite a day's trip due to no interstates like ours, narrow two lane roads and lots of villages and towns along the way.

One of these villages was Wagga Wagga where we stopped for our morning tea and to join with two more families going on the tour with their T's called "J.R." and "The Undertaker".

After about 50 miles more we stopped in Yass where we had our lunch and met with MORE "T" people. We also saw three Model T's being driven from Sydney to the tour.

We then proceeded to Cootamundra where we were met on the outskirts of town by the Antique Auto Club of Cootamundra. The club members offered us rides into town in their antique cars. After settling into our hotel in which we all shared the bathroom facilities down the hall, this is very common in small town hotels in Australia as well as in Europe, we prepared to be met by the car club again to take us to a seven course Chinese banquet they had arranged for us in honor of our visiting their town. After supper they presented each of us with folders of points of interest and history of Cootamundra and their club badges. When we were finished we were all invited to one of the members homes to see his car collection and hit and miss engines. Then it was back to the hotel to rest and get ready to travel to Griffith the next morning.

Sunday was another day of traveling most of the day to get to Griffith.

Oh!, by the way---I was hijacked at at our lunch stop and was given a chance to drive the "Red Rocket", a 1923 Tourer. It was then that I got to see my first Kangaroo in the wild. They only come out when it begins to get dusky dark but this one was but early. On the way we stopped at a historical home known as Monte Cristo. It used to belong to a wealthy land owner and is now inhabited by 5 ghosts! They had been seen two weeks prior to our visit.

Upon arriving in Griffith we found our motels where we had all booked rooms for the week of the tour. After settling in the men went to tour headquarters to check in where we received our goodie bags and any T-shirts and things we had pre-ordered and purchased some souveniers of the tour.

This was a six day hub tour averaging 100 miles per day. There were about 185 Model T Fords and one Chevrolet on the tour. Our tour organisers and arranged for each American family to ride with different people every day. They also had a few cars available if anyone wanted to drive one on their own instead.

Our days began early but we were back in each day about an hour or so before supper time. We toured mostly back roads and visited different places of interest each day which included wineries, a rice processing plant, orange juice plant, scenic overlooks in the foothills, two large lakes and a small town on the edge of the "outback" called the "Black Stump". We also spent a day at Pioneer Park which is an old Australian village re-created as it was during the early settling days of Australia. There we enjoyed a steam engine and tractor display, an animal park and shops, hospital and living quarters re-created there. It was all very interesting.

One night we had a "Bush Dance". Contrary to what you might think, it is very similar to what we would call a barn dance. Instead of a country & western band they had a folk band. They were like an Irish folk band. They played folk music and had a picolo included in the instruments. We did folk dances and square dances as well. It was really great fun! This dance was attended by one and all---young and old alike. It lasted till about 1:00 A.M. which made for a long day the next day.

Another night there was a barbeque held at one of the wineries in honor of we Americans. It was a little different from our barbeques but the fellowship was no different at all!

We also had a short tour of the homes and gardens around Griffith. The Town of Griffith also hosted a parade of the antique cars which concluded at a rugby field where the cars were on display for the public to see. The Lions Club set this up as a fund raiser by charging admission and selling food to raisefunds for the Crippled Children's Home. A total of \$2500.00 was raised for this purpose.

There was also a "Grand Prix" race day for anyone who wanted to participate with their Model T's.on a dirt and sealed (paved) track. At the display there was no judging of the cars just a display of everyones cars that they had driven and most of them had another T at home.

Friday night was the final dinner and banquet where awards were given for the Grand Prix race, Furtherest Distance, Oldest Car, Oldest Couple and Oldest Person participating on the tour and the Most Unique Car on the tour. The oldest car was a 1904 Ford driven by Mr. James Eisenhauer who is, by the way, related to Dwight D. Eisenhauer. The most unique car was a 1913 Tourer which was an all original car and the man who ownes it is the third owner. The car had only 675 ORIGINAL miles on it when the tour began! This car is in pristeen condition! Recognition was given to all day chairmen and organizers. After that we were all treated to anniversary cake and coffee for it was on that day that the first Model T was sold in the year 1908. Paula had heard that as well on the television news.

Saturday a breakfast was held for us and a short tour of a steam powered generator plant and irrigation system. Then we left for our twelve hour drive back to Kiama.

It was a really great tour. Morning and evening teas were provided for us every day free of charge as were one or two lunches on the tour. All of the food and fellowship were fantastic. It was very much a family oriented tour where the kids had something to do each day and babysitting was available if needed as well. There was one family there with a Depot Hack which had three car seats in the back for their children!

If anyone on the tour did not have a great time it was their own faults because all of our needs were certainly taken into consideration. It was wonderful.

After arriving back in Kiama on Saturday evening, Sunday was a day of rest, laundry and re-packing. On Monday we said fairwell to most of our new American friends who were flying home. We continued to tour Australia with our friends for five more days before we had to say a very sad farewell to our new and old friends. We could have easily spent another whole month there without staying in a motel at all for we had so many invitations from our new Australian friends and a couple of New Zealanders to stay with them in their homes. Perhaps next time.

There is going to be another tour in Australia in 1995 called--"T's Alive In '95" and Paula and I are planning at this time to try
to attend it as well. If anyone else is interested in going let us
know and we will try to get a group together to go. It will be well
worth it and a trip of a life time!
