



### THE UNITED STATES

#### ALABAMA-1903 or later

On October 9, 1909, the Alabama State Legislature approved an act requiring automobile owners to register with the probate judge of their county. But few — if any — of these counties required any sort of numerical display on motor vehicles. By 1910 the cities of Birmingham, Mobile and presumably others were providing number plates to automobile owners. These annually-issued plates were porcelain-enameled iron and dated.

The first state-issued license plates in Alahama appeared in 1912 and were attached to the nearly 5000 motor vehicles in the state. The only difference between these annually-issued plates and earlier local plates was that these state plates carried no date. In 1916 these enameled iron plates were replaced by an embossed metal type, and in 1917 the first dated markers appeared.

From that day to this, Alabama plates have been issued annually, with the exception of 1943 when, due to the metal shortage caused by World War II, 1942 plates were reused with the addition of windshield stickers in a variety of color combinations.

From 1922 to 1927 license plates on privately-owned vehicles carried the word "PRIVATE," and since 1955 the plates have carried a heart-shaped design bearing the motto "HEART OF DIXIE."

#### FLORIDA-1905

The history of motor vehicle registration in Florida is somewhat confused since registration started under state aegis, passed for several years to city and county control and finally reverted again to the state.

Car owners provided their own plates between 1905 and 1911. Most of these were metal numbers attached to the conventional leather pads and included the abbreviation of the state.

In 1912 counties and cities became responsible for registrations, and between that year and 1917 hundreds of varieties of plates were issued. Some cities bowed to county authority in registrations, but in other instances where city plates were issued, those motorists were exempt from county registration.

In the six years of local registrations nearly every imaginable material and color scheme was noted on Florida plates as well as a great diversity in size, some being no larger than motorcycle tags. Oddly enough, nearly all of them carried the designation "AUTO," the "FLA" abbreviation as well as their local designation and, in a few cases, the county seal.

A flat metal plate appeared in 1918 after the state again became the enforcing and issuing agency, and from 1919 to the present all plates have been made of embossed metal.

For a few years in the Twenties the plates were embellished with an outline of the state's shape, and in 1934 and 1935 the design in-

corporated a separate plate in reversed colors on which the date and vehicle classification was noted.

A particular oddity was the 1935 series on which Florida attempted to get in a plug for its grapefruit and accordingly added two small symbols intended to convey the shape of the fruit. If the plates had been yellow on black instead of black on yellow, this might have been beneficial, but as it was the insignias resembled small bombs as they appeared to caricaturists in their cartoons of anarchists.

Florida plates have included the legend "SUNSHINE STATE" on them for many years, and in 1965 they noted the "400th anniversary" of discovery.

For the last thirty years Florida plates have carried prefix numbers designating the county of registration with some also carrying a small letter denoting weight classification.

A unique series of Florida passenger car plates are those issued to members of the Seminole Indian tribe. These plates bear the designation "SEMINOLE INDIAN."

### MISSISSIPPI-1912

Mississippi is unique among all the states in that its first officiallyissued number plates turned out to be illegal!

Effective June 1, 1912 the first Mississippi plates appeared as dated, black on white embossed markers of soft metal. A new series, also black on white but undated was scheduled to be issued April 30, 1914. Until then, it was reasoned, the original issue would have to serve for 1913 as well as 1912.

But controversy brewed over the legality of the first, 1912-13 plates, and under an act of the Mississippi State Legislature of February 19, 1914, some \$28,040 was ordered refunded to automobile owners for registration fees paid in 1912 and 1913. The law which had required said registrants to pay had been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court!

The new, undated 1914 plates were used through 1918. During the following year annual plates began to be issued, a practice which con-

tinues to today.

Since 1941, the county of issuance has appeared on Mississippi passenger car plates.

#### LOUISIANA-circa 1906

Although the date when numbers were first used in Louisiana registrations is unknown, numbers were carried on motorcars in Shreveport as early as 1906; several cities and a few parishes required registrations annually after that time including Baton Rouge and New Orleans.

Between 1915, when the first dated and embossed metal state-issued plates appeared, and 1942 plates were issued annually. The 1942 series was continued through 1943 with revalidation by windshield sticker. A compressed paper, marker was used in 1944 and the embossed metal type reappeared in 1945 destined to last till the present time. Since 1964, plates have been issued every other year with a windshield sticker used for revalidation purposes.

Two differently colored plates were issued in Louisiana between 1922 and 1929; one went to owners of cars developing less than 23 hp and the other plate was issued to owners of cars developing more than 23 hp.

The first pelican insighe was used on Louisiana plates in 1932, replacing the conventional hyphen between numbers. It was omitted from the design of 1940 and 1941 plates which featured instead a small map of the state, but the pelican reappeared in 1942, continuing until 1964 when passenger-car registrations exceeded a million. Then a code letter was substituted for the insigne. An interesting feature of the pelican device itself is the bird's open bill on plates used between 1942 and 1958. On all other plates carrying the pelican insigne, the bird's bill is closed.

Louisiana plates advertised one of the state's primary crops in 1954 with the motto "LOUISIANA YAMS." In 1960 tabs paid respect-to one of the state's leading educational institutions by including the legend "LSU CENTENNIAL" in its plate design. Louisiana has used its number plates to advertise "SPORTSMEN'S PARADISE" in 1958-59 and from 1961 to date.
