One more fire extinguisher was mounted at Clubhouse.




invite all the cars we turn away now. We need a show co-chairman and chief judge etc...to run this part of the Show. I would like to use the Flea Market space move it to the rear.

Did you read Doc Stratton's timely presidental message on Page 1 of this issue of the Rummage Box?

Well, several years ago while I was on the show field at Hershey, I heard the very comment he addresses.

Here's the scene: Two, guys, both probably in their 60s, are strolling along just in front of me. As we admire the rows of '30s-model cars, I overhear one guy say to the other, "I just can't get excited about all the "used cars," (meaning those vehicles that have just become eligible for AACA judging.) The other fellow agreed with his pal and said he didn't like them either.

Apparently this left an impression with me, because if it hadn't, I wouldn't remember what they said almost three years later.

Well, like 'em or not, 1965 and earlier cars are considered antiques and are eligible for all the priviledges (other than certain tours) offered by AACA.


While many club members don't want to own anything other than '60s

cars, other members dream of the day they'll be able to own a classic from the '30s or maybe something from the Roaring 20s. But until they are able to make their dreams come true, some members have to settle for something a little more affordable. Or available. Often members don't even have to leave their hometowns to find a nice '60s car. And then, too, many AACA members think '60s cars are more comfortable and are perhaps safer to drive than really old cars. Maybe they learned to drive in a 60s car. It could be they just like their styling.

Remember, too, it is just as important to preserve these members of our automobile heritage as it is to preserve the really old cars.

So before you go around knocking '60s cars (or '30s cars if you are among the younger set,) just remember what Doc wrote about the Model A being just a nice, used car when AACA was organized in 1935.

Its' absolute beauty is indescribable, from the glaciers, the mountains, waterfalls, lakes, rivers, to the tall white and black spruce that seem to touch the sky.

O.D. and Mickey would especially appreciate the Frontier atmosphere of all the log houses nestled among fir and spruce. Some have '57 Chevys parked around. Others I saw were Thunderbirds, Cadillacs, Packards, and Edsels.

Along the Inside Passage, Skagway, Dawson City, Juneau, and White Horse, is like stepping back into time --Frontier days of 1850, with everything unchanged, even the Red Dog Saloon, etc.

forget that these cars are a lot more comfortable to drive to meets and on tours. Those with air conditioning and all that nice power equipment that we are accustomed to on our modern iron is nice, too.

The drawback to these vehicles probably is and will continue to be the availability of parts. Many parts were either made of cheap materials which were easily broken (planned obsolescence) or were manufactured with a process that is nearly impossible to duplicate in a home shop.

The owners of these later models seem to do either a cosmetic paint and upholstery job and drive them or a complete and thorough restoration. Imagine how many more pieces there are in a 1965 Cadillac convertible than there are in a Model T roadster - not to mention all the reproduction parts available for the Fords.

So, the next time you feel tempted to comment on the "used car lot," ask yourself, did I bring the oldest vehicle today? Then go over and look at some of the remarkable work being done on these later vehicles. I think that you will agree that there is room for all true antique enthusiasts in AACA.




