John and Janet Ricketts Leadership Scholarship

A \$1,500 cash award to any AACA member, child or grandchild of an AACA member in good standing for at least 5 years, who has been accepted to an institution of higher learning or is now enrolled in such institution. This award is granted by the family of John and Janet Ricketts in recognition of their love for AACA and their belief in service to the club. It is also in recognition of our first female National President, Janet Ricketts in 1999. Region or chapter membership is encouraged but not required. Susquehannock Region Automotive Technology Scholarship

Formerly known as AACA Student Scholarship, this award is granted by the AACA National Board of Directors to encourage adults to further their education and stimulate interest in AACA and automotive history. One or more awards may be presented each year. Click here for more information and to download the application.

AACA Young People's Award

The AACA Young People's Award is a cash award to an active AACA member in good standing for at least five years, who has been accepted into an accredited institution of higher learning or is now enrolled in such institution, i.e. a four-year college leading to a bachelor's degree or a two-year vocational education program leading to a degree. Applicants MUST

be nominated by a Region or Chapter of AACA and must be no more than 25 years old. This award is merit based, and while financial need may be considered, it is not a deciding factor. AACA Scholarship

The AACA Scholarship is granted by the AACA National Board of Directors. All applicants must be current

AACA members for a minimum of 5 continuous years. Applicants must be accepted to a recognized accredited institution, or currently enrolled in such an institution leading to a fourvear college Bachelor's degree or completion of a two-year vocational education program. They must be 25 years old or less by December 31 of the year when applying for the scholarship. AACA region or chapter membership is encouraged, but not required. Louise Bianchi Chiotti Memorial Scholarship Award

Louise (Bianchi) Chiotti was born on June 11, 1914 in San Jose California. The Family's first automobile was a 1926 Dodge Sedan. Her two younger brothers purchased a 1939 Studebaker and took delivery in January 1939. They wanted to give it to Louise's son Dave in 1956. His mother thought it too big of a car for a fifteen year old in San Francisco and talked him into buying a 1930 Model "A" Ford Coupe. In 1959 the little Ford was a bit slow, so Dave



purchased a 1959 Ford convertible. As Dave sat on the running board of the Ford waiting for the new owner to arrive his mom came and sat next to him. "You really don't want to sell it do you?" she asked. "No, I don't was my reply." "Then don't," Mom said.

Dave and Marilyn Chiotti still own the Model "A"; it is a Senior and First Place Grand National Award Winner. The 1939 Studebaker came to the Chiottis after spending 40 years under a walnut tree. It is now a Senior and First Place Grand National Award Winner. The 1926 Dodge was cut into a truck for ranch use in the 1940's. Dave brought it home in 1976 and built a Woodie. In 2000, they donated it to Luther Burbank Home & Gardens in Santa Rosa. After Dave and Marilyn's uncle's passing, they acquired their 1968 Cadillac El Dorado. It now lives in the AACA Museum in Hershey, PA. This \$1,500 scholarship is based upon the same rules as the AACA Automotive Technology Award and is awarded as funds are available. It was instituted and funded by Dave and Marilyn Chiotti as a way to honor Louise and a way to continue to support youth in the hobby. Download the application from AACA.org.

We finally got the brake problem fixed. We put new springs in it. I guess they hold the shoes away from the drums.

So, on to fixing a piece of chrome that attaches to the quarter windows. It holds the weather stripping that fits between door window and quarter window. They had dry rotted and been replaced a while ago. A true pain to get the rubber down a 15 inch 'c' shaped piece of chromed metal. 




Mystery Solved

Here it is, the phenolic gasket rather known as a phenolic block. It is a carb spacer that restricts the heat flow from the intake manifold to the carburetor, therefore reducing the heating of the gas in the carburetor. We have now solved the mystery of fuel boiling and causing vapor locking.

When the gas boils the vapor will cause the engine to stop. Thanks to Dick Fischlein and his mastering of woodworking and Walt Fullers locating the phenolic stock we were able to distribute numerous copies of this gasket to our Model A members. Happy motoring in our summer heat.




Twenty Five Gallons








Mobile adorns the July/August Cover of Antique Automobile

Tulsa "elected" Capital of Route 66

Nations have capitals; states have capitals; roads generally do not. Route 66, however, technically hasn't been a federally designated road for more than 30 years now — instead, it's become something more like a blend between a destination and a cross-country community — so why not designate a capital for it?

So went the thinking over at Route 66 News, where Ron Warnick decided to put it up to his readers to vote for the city that best exemplifies the history and the spirit of the Mother Road. Inspired by a recent article in the Tulsa World in which writer John Klein argued that Tulsa "is already the heart of Route 66," Warnick included the Oklahoma city in his list of candidates alongside nine other primary candidates and eight other secondary candidates.

Among those candidates were Tucumcari, New Mexico, which as Warnick and Klein pointed out recently made USA Today's list of 50 places to visit across the United States; Springfield, Missouri, which bills itself as the birthplace of Route 66; Pontiac, Illinois, which houses the Route 66 Hall of Fame; and Williams, Arizona, the last location along Route 66 that Interstate 40 bypassed.

Nearly 60 percent of Warnick's respondents agreed with Klein and voted for Tulsa. Indeed, Tulsa has

strong links to Route 66 history: Cyrus Avery, the businessman who advocated for Route 66's adoption during the 1920s, hailed from Tulsa and was instrumental in bending the course of the highway to travel through Tulsa rather than straight across from Chicago to Santa Monica, California.

In addition, Tulsa has preserved a



good number of Route 66 landmarks, from the original alignment bridge over the Arkansas River (punctuated by the Cyrus Avery Centennial Plaza, above) to the massive Meadow Gold neon sign; and the city will soon host the Route 66 Experience, a museum dedicated to the highway, expected to open this fall.

"There has already been so much done to help promote our rich Route 66 heritage," Ken Busby, executive director and CEO of the Route 66 Alliance, told Klein. "There are projects underway. There are plans for the future. All along 11th Street there is a renaissance. The Kendall-Whittier neighborhood to everything in west Tulsa and out to our eastern edges. There is so much going on."

That's not to say Tulsa unilaterally ran away with the vote. While it beat Springfield, the runner-up, by a handy 45-point margin in the general tally, Warnick noted that participants from outside the United States voted for Tucumcari, with Tulsa falling to third (tied with Flagstaff) among that demographic.

The voting could amount to little more than a thought experiment, as Warnick suggested. However, it also illustrates a yearning for the community of Route 66 enthusiasts scattered across the country and across the globe — to begin to coalesce and centralize around preservation efforts. Not core coincidentally, that yearning comes at a critical time for Route 66, as Congress debates granting it National Historic Trail status, as the National Trust for Historic Preservation considers the road an endangered place, and as a long-term federal funding program for the road is set to expire next year.

Whether this unofficial vote means we'll be getting more road capitals in the future remains to be seen.

Publications Update

looks like a great year for AACA
Publications. I want to first
thank all of the evaluators.

Without them, the awards program could not exist. These people spend hours of their personal time studying every newsletter submitted for evaluation with no reward! Please thank them when you see them.

Now I want to discuss the most common problem that we, as evaluators, have found so far. The use of copyrighted material has been found in a lot of publications this year. Using copyrighted material can set you, your region and its officers, and the National club up for legal action. There have been court awards of 10's of thousands of dollars when the original writer of an item has sued a publication for the use of his material.

What is the most common source of that material?...The Internet. If you use something you found online, you can almost assume that it is copyrighted!

Articles, jokes, pictures, trivia contests, even crossword puzzles, are usually copyrighted. Using this material can cost you and your club a lot of money. Make sure material that is submitted to you from members is also checked as they may have gotten it from copyrighted sources.

So how can you get the material you need and still protect yourself? ASK!! Take the time to find the source of the material and ask the originator for permission to use it. In most cases, you will be asked to credit the source and nothing more. You

may however be asked to pay a fee. It is then a decision as to pay or not use the material. I know it takes time but it can save you a lot of money! Many web sites state that permission is granted with crediting. If it doesn't say that, you can bet that it is protected material. In addition, there are sources, such as the Rummage Box or the AACA Speedster that are printed just for the purpose of helping provide our editors with materials to use. Also sharing of newsletters from other Regions is helpful in getting material.

Obviously, any original material written by editors and chapter members, is ok to use without any further permission. But otherwise protect yourself and your club.



First Diesel Car Citroen Rosalie

First Diesel Car

The first diesel car invented was also the first biofuel car. Rudolf Diesel showed off the first Diesel engine in Augsburg, Germany in 1893 and it ran on peanut oil. In 1892 Diesel applied for a patent in Germany and in 1898, he was granted a U. S. patent as well.

At the 1900 Paris, France World Fair Rudolf Diesel showed off his engine and was given the Grand Prix award for excellence. But, the first diesel engines did not go into cars, trucks or even locomotives.

The first diesel engines were used in the shipping

industry. In 1898, Rudolf Diesel licensed his new engine to the Branobel Russian oil company for use as an engine in a ship. In 1903 the first oil tanker propelled by a diesel engine is launched and in 1904, the French build the first diesel-powered submarine.

It was until 1912 that the first train with a diesel engine was introduced by the Danish. In 1922 the first land vehicle without a track, a tractor by Mercedes-Benz was built with a diesel engine. Finally, in 1923, the first truck with a diesel engine was introduced by Daimler, Benz and MAN.

The Cummins "Diesel Special" racecar was driven at both Daytona and the Indianapolis 500 in 1931 and did not have to make a single pit stop. In 1933 an older Bentley fitted with a diesel engine was the first of its kind to compete in the Monte Carlo Rally. In 1934, the Diesel Cummins Indy Car made another appearance (both are pictured above).

In 1933, the Citroën Rosalie (pictured above) was introduced as the first production passenger car to be powered by a diesel engine. Because of legal restrictions on the diesel engine, the car did not go into production until 1935.

Shortly afterward, in 1936 the Mercedes-Benz 260D and the Hanomag Rekord diesel cars were introduced into the marketplace. Because of the size and weight of the diesel engine, however, they did not flourish in the automotive industry like gasoline-powered cars did. They remained in trucks and larger vehicles.

In the 1950s and 1960s diesel cars were slowly reintroduced to the public on a limited basis. Mercedes-Benz, Peugeot, Austin, Isuzu, Fiat, and several others began introducing diesel driven taxis, ambulances, station wagons and a few other autos.

In 1967 the Peugeot 204BD was introduced as the first high speed diesel car. In 1976, the Volkswagen Golf diesel was marketed to the public. Since this time, turbo charged, fuel injected diesel engines and low emissions diesel cars have hit the market.

If fact, today in Europe some of the lowest polluting vehicles are not hybrids, but rather low emissions, clean burning diesel cars.
