Pure-gas.org Has The list of ethanol-free gas station in the U.S

Pure-gas.org is a site dedicated to one, simple task: to list the gas stations in the U.S. and Canada that serve ethanol-free gasoline.

Why pure gas?

Many cars, motorcycles, boats, aircraft and tools have engines that run worse, or have parts that deteriorate, when run on gasoline that contains ethanol. In addition, ethanol leaves residue on valves and other parts that can hinder performance.

Aren't certain brands ethanol-free?

No. All gasoline brands have both pure and ethanol-containing gasoline under the same brand names. For example, Shell V-Power ranges from 91 to 93 octane both with and without added ethanol. It just varies from station to station, and it's up to the station owner whether or not to sell pure gas. In fact, in Madison, Wisconsin there is a Shell station that sells 93-octane V-Power with ethanol at most pumps, but which has a single pump, at a higher price, dispensing pure 91-octane gas.

How do I know if a particular gas and grade is ethanolfree?

In most states, stations are required to label the pumps if they contain ethanol over a certain percentage, which varies by state but is usually 1 percent. A few states have no labeling requirement, and you just have to ask someone at the station that knows what goes in the tanks. State-by-state labeling requirements are listed at fuel-testers.com.

Can I test gas myself to see if it contains ethanol?

Yes, and it's quite easy to do. Inexpensive fuel-testing kits are widely available, or you can just do it yourself:

Pour a small amount of water into a narrow jar (an olive jar works great) and mark the water level with a Sharpie. Add the fuel to around a 10:1 fuel:water ratio. Shake well, let settle for a few minutes.

See if the water level has risen above the mark. If it has risen, it has combined with ethanol from the fuel.

But isn't pure gas more expensive?

It can be, often due to federal and state tax incentives. We buy it because we want to fuel our vehicles with it. If you want to save money on gas, this site is of no use to

you - it will NOT have gasoline prices on it. They vary from day to day and this site isn't about saving money. It's about finding pure gasoline for your machine.

Why aren't prices posted?

Time Saver

This site isn't about money. If you want to know the price, call the station. Or look the station up on a price site. This site is about one thing: where to find pure gas in Canada and the US.

Why does pure gas give me better mileage?

Pure gas gives better mileage than E10, and much better than E85, simply because gasoline has higher free energy than ethanol. The free energy of gasoline is 34.2 MJ per liter. The free energy of ethanol is 24.0 MJ per liter.

That means E10 (10% ethanol) has a free energy of 33.2 MJ per liter, and E85 (85% ethanol) has a free energy of 25.6 MJ per liter. As a result, your mileage is reduced by 3% with E10 over pure gas, and 25% with E85 over pure gas, all else being equal. Mileage will be reduced even more if your engine doesn't run as well on E10, which is often the case with older vehicles.

Refreshment Committee: Martha Fuller said for the July meeting everyone should bring sandwiches or salad for our annual dinner.


Member Announcements: Jimmy O'Brien thanked

First Solar Car

The first solar car invented was a tiny 15-inch vehicle created by William G. Cobb of General Motors. Called the Sunmobile, Cobb showcased the first solar car at the Chicago Powerama convention on August 31, 1955. The solar car was made up 12 selenium photovoltaic cells and a small Pooley electric motor turning a pulley which in turn rotated the rear wheel shaft. The first solar car in history was obviously too small to drive.

Now, let's jump to 1962 when the first solar car that a person could drive was demonstrated to the public. The

International Rectifier Company converted a vintage model 1912 Baker electric car (pictured above) to run on photovoltaic energy in 1958, but they didn't show it until 4 years later. Around 10,640 individual solar cells were mounted to the rooftop of the Baker to help propel it.

In 1977, Alabama University professor Ed Passereni built the Bluebird solar car, which was a prototype full scale vehicle. The Bluebird was supposed to move from power created by the photovoltaic cells only without the use of a battery. The Bluebird was exhibited in the Knoxville, TN 1982 World's Fair.

Between 1977 and 1980 (the exact dates are not known for sure), at Tokyo Denki University, professor Masaharu Fujita first created a solar bicycle, then a 4-wheel solar car. The car was actually two solar bicycles put together.

In 1979 Englishman Alain Freeman invented a solar car (pictured right). He road registered the



same vehicle in 1980. The Freeman solar car was a 3-wheeler with a solar panel on the roof.

At the engineering department at Tel Aviv University in Israel, Arye Braunstein and his colleagues created a solar car in 1980 (pictured below). The solar car had a solar panel on the hood and on the roof of the Citicar comprised of 432 cells creating 400 watts of peak power. The solar car used 8 batteries of 6 volts each to store the photovoltaic energy.

The 1,320 pound solar Citicar is said by the engineering department to have been able to reach up to 40 mph with a maximum range of 50 miles.

In 1981 Hans Tholstrup and Larry Perkins built a solar powered racecar. In 1982, the pair became the first to cross a continent in a solar car, from Perth to Sydney, Australia. Tholstrup is the creator of the World Solar Challenge in Australia.

In 1984, Greg Johanson and Joel Davidson invented the Sunrunner solar race car. The Sunrunner set the official Guinness world record in Bellflower, California of 24.7 mph. In the Mojave Desert of California and final top speed of 41 mph was officially recorded for a "Solely Solar Powered Vehicle" (did not use a battery). The 1986 Guinness Book of World Records publicized these official records.



The GM Sunraycer in 1987 completed a 1,866 mile trip with an average speed of 42 mph. Since this time there have been many solar cars invented at universities for competitions such as

the Shell Eco Marathon. There is also a commercially available solar car called the Venturi Astrolab. Time will only tell how far the solar car makes it with today's and tomorrow's technology.

Join for the Cars, Stay for the People

We all became involved in the AACA for different reasons, but we stay for a common one: the people.

My wife Marion and I were almost obligated to get involved in the AACA and antique automobile hobby

because of birth and circumstances. Marion & I were both born and raised in the Detroit metropolitan area, and we're "Baby Boomers," so we grew up during the highpoint of Detroit's muscle cars (until, arguably, today) and muscle car culture. Unlike some of today's teenagers, when we came of age it was inconceivable to not have a driver's license and not get it as soon as possible. A driver's license—and if you were lucky, a car— meant freedom. Freedom to drive to school and not have to ride the bus; freedom to get an after-school job; freedom to socialize with friends; freedom to date; freedom to just go do something whenever you wanted.

As children of Detroit, cars were in our DNA. It was probably an omen of things to come for Marion & I that our first date was to the Detroit Auto Show. Shortly after we married, we purchased and customized a Chevy van, and almost started a customizing shop with my father-in-law (a chief clay modeler for GM), but I joined the Air Force instead. My military career made it difficult for us to own an antique car—we moved 18 times in 25



years—but we never lost our love for cars. Everywhere we lived we attended car shows and cruiseins, and made the pilgrimage home to Detroit as often as we could to attend the Detroit Auto Show. In 2004, after attending another car show, Marion told me, "We need to buy an old car." We purchased a 1970 Chevelle Super Sport and transported it to Tucson, Arizona, my last active duty assignment, where we discovered the AACA. Fifteen years later, I'm fortunate to be a member of the AACA's Board of Directors (something I never aspired to, let alone expected).

I suspect we joined the AACA for reasons shared by many of our fellow members: to enter our car in the local AACA Region's annual show. We renewed our AACA membership and over the years got more involved in both our local region and the national club not just because of the antique vehicles, but more so because of the fun we had, the nice people we met, and the friends we made. At one of the first AACA Board of Directors meetings I attended, one of the other directors said something I'd never heard before but which rang so true: "Members join the club for the cars, but they stay for the people." We all need to keep this in mind—not just the AACA National Directors, but also every region and chapter officer and every member. In order to survive as a club let alone continue growing—we need to be welcoming to everyone (regardless of what kind of vehicle they own or like), and our club and regions/chapters need to be fun. Executive Board Meeting July 18

Reserve Fund - The Board recommends that a reserve fund separate from the general fund be set up to ensure that the club has enough money to cover the \$5,500.00 yearly cost and any anticipated or unforeseen cost that the club may encore. The Board recommends that the club strive to have a minimum balance in the reserve of \$7,500.



Cars Of The 1950s: Space-Age Fins And Chrome Everything

In 1950, there were about 40 million cars on the road, nationwide. By the end of the decade, that number almost doubled. Having a car in the driveway was just one piece of the "American Dream" puzzle. Having a car became synonymous with success. Post-World II America boasted new automobiles that the consumers fell in love with.



Unlike cars of today, cars of the 50's were enormous. You could get the entire family, Grandma included, in



one car. They also had big motors that guzzled gas like crazy

European car manufacturers were turning out small, sub-compact cars and even sports cars. American car manufacturers didn't want anything to do with those "foreign" cars.

The "Big Three" car manufacturers battled each other for years. General Motors, Ford Motor Company and Chrysler Corporation were the top American car manufacturers. The three did their best to stay one step ahead of the other two and fought, tooth and nail, to maintain their top status. The Big Three had some stiff competition in automobile manufacturing in the 50's.

Crosley, Hudson, Kraiser-Frazer, Nash, Packard, Studebaker and Willys were all competitors of the top three sellers. They managed to considerably water down market share for General Motors, Ford and Chrysler. More importantly, they brought important innovations and great new features to consumers.








Hood latch of a 1950 Ford truck.

Car buyers wanted their cars dripping with chrome -- the flashier, the better.

Everyone was excited when the new car models were introduced in the 50's. For days leading up to the big reveal the dealers would paper their showroom windows to hide the new car models until they were ready for the grand opening type event. It was a big deal! Everyone talked cars, discussed the new models and knew the specifics like horsepower, cubic inches, features and of course, the cost.

The automobile industry in the United States, established in 1950, boasted a new, all-time production of 7,987,000 vehicles.



Henry Ford introduced America to the automobile, but Detroit gave it style, splendor and pizzazz. No decade in history ever matched the 50's in the automobile industry.


While the style and construction of the day represented conformity, the American car screamed out the Country's optimism. It was an enthusiastic decade of hope. Detroit's car manufacturers looked at conformity as an alien concept and did everything in their power to excite buyers

to flock to their new car showrooms.



Tailfins on cars during this era somewhat resembled deep-sea creatures.

Crosley Motors ended up throwing in the towel in 1952. Unfortunately, they had misread the market for compact cars. America just wasn't ready for it. Hudson, who had been making cars since 1910, was compelled to merge with Nash Motors by the end of 1953. The end result of the merger was the formation of American

Motors Company (AMC).

Kaiser-Frazer after having phased out Frazer models by the end of 1951 acquires Willys Overland Motors in 1953 but succumbs to market pressure and moves its operations to Argentina where it continues to sell cars.

It was announced that air conditioning was available as "optional equipment" on at least three 1953 cars.

Power steering was only available on one car in 1951. That number increased to five models in 1952 models. Also coming out in 1951 were power brakes which were available on two models by 1952. Air conditioning was available in cars, starting in 1953.

With all of the new advances and options available when purchasing an automobile, prices began to climb. That being said, taxes rose even higher. It was estimated that out of the average price of \$2,000 paid for a new automobile, about one third, went to taxes.

Studebaker, having one of the most state-of-the-art designs of its time, merged with Packard Motor Company in 1954. This was a strategic move to join forces to compete with the "Big Three." Packard all but disappeared by 1957. Studebaker survived the decade with a revival in sales in 1959 and continued to make cars until 1966.

Unfortunately, the company was never again a serious competitor.



Ford's Motor Company's Edsel fiasco will go down in history, but that's another story, altogether. These days, cars are smaller, sleeker, more fuel efficient and practical. Cars in the 1950's were the exact opposite. They weren't economical, environmentally friendly or even particularly safe, with no seat belts, but they sure were something else!


