

## **Honoring our Military Members**

# Veteran of the Year 2019 Bill Atkeison

I joined the army in September of 1967. Seven months later I was in Vietnam (Me153).

A thing I was a part of, a large memorial cross we fabricated and carried to the top of a hill just outside our wire and erected it - a small brass plaque was attached reading in part, 'in honor of the American Servicemen who served in Vietnam; it was dated 28 OCT 1968. Quite possibly the World's First Vietnam Veterans Memorial (I'm in the front row, left side, hat, no shirt).

After my first six years I got out and about three years later joined the Virginia National Guard; C Troop, 183rd Cavalry where I was assistant platoon sergeant of the maintenance platoon and Recovery NCO - I was in charge of the M88 recovery vehicle, a tank wrecker (that's me sitting on top of the M88).

I quit the guard after 9 years.







# Veteran of the Year 2016 Lou Lartigue

Louis J. Lartigue Sr. attended high school at McGill Institute in Mobile and college at the University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg, Mississippi. He graduated in 1968 with a degree in Personnel and Industrial Management and the ROTC Program as a Distinguished Military Graduate and commissioned in the Signal Corps.

Lou entered the Army in February 1968 and was assigned to the 82nd Airborne Division. In 1969 he was assigned to the 9th Infantry Division in Vietnam. Subsequent assignment saw duty with the 25th Infantry Division, Hawaii, and 82nd









Airborne Division, Ft. Bragg, NC. He held several Signal and Logistics Staff positions with Joint U.S. Military Advisory Group, Thailand/Laos; Headquarters U.S. Army Communications Command, Ft. Huachuca, AZ; Headquarters U.S. Army Europe, Heidelberg Germany; U.S. Army Electronics Research and Development Command, Maryland; and Headquarters Department of the Army Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics, Pentagon. Lou attended the Armed Forces Staff College, Logistics Executive Development Course, and graduated from Florida Institute of Technology with an MS in Logistics Management.

After retirement from the U.S. Army as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1988, Lou went to work with CACI INC-Federal in Washington, DC in the Information Engineering and System Analysis career

fields for 15 years. He was a Department Manager and Project Manager for several major research and engineering projects for the Department of Defense and the Department of the Army.

Lou is married to his wife Betty of 53 years, has three children, and they live in Mobile, AL. Both are involved in volunteer work with the Community and Church. Lou is currently the Chaplain and Past Commander VFW Post 49, Member Honor Guard American Legion Post 250 and MOAA, President of the South Alabama Veterans Council, Board of Directors Parkway Senior Citizens Center and State Veterans Cemetery Foundation, Past Grand Knight Council 8740, and Past President Society of Logistics Engineer. He was selected as the Mobile Bay Area Veteran of the Year in 2016.



## **Brian Daly**

December 1979 - Signed in for early entry to the Navy.

**February 1980** - Got a haircut I thought was regulation. Began training at Naval Education and Training Center Newport RI. First morning, they shaved my head. There went \$10 down the drain.

May 1980 - On their way from Houston to Ireland, my mother looked on as my father commissioned me as an ensign. They appeared on the NETC quarterdeck, he in his USAF LTC uniform. We went to the O-Club for a drink, and before I could say, "Dad take off your hat", he got clobbered by the clanging of the bartender's bell. He almost made Dad pay for a round for everyone there because he did not uncover in time. I did, of course. Fortunately, Dad made a good plea of ignorance of Navy traditions, like the sign he missed, saying, "He who enters covered here, will buy the boys a round of cheer."

June 1980 - Reported to Naval Oceanography Command Joint Typhoon Warning Center Guam. Bought my first new car from Mark's Motor Company in Tamuning, a 1980 Honda Civic GL. Called her "Silva Hilda Honda". When that car was shipped for my PCS to California, I bought another, a 1974 Duster with a manual floor shift Slant Six. It came with drive shaft, speedometer, ignition and alternator issues. A Navy auto hobby shop, and a friendly CPO, helped. The car could climb Nimitz Hill like it was the Bonneville Salt Flats. Called her "Dolly Duster", after my sister's quarter horse. Rescued the car from salt air evaporation on an opportune lift with a contract freighter.

December 1981 - Left for Houston on Christmas leave, then



Fleet Numerical Oceanography Center Monterey California for duty there. Declared Houston as residence, so paid no income tax lol.

**April 1983** - reported for admin training at San Diego preparing for first Executive Officer (XO) tour at sea. Left the Honda with my sister's family, and the Duster I sold.

**May 1983** - met Oceanographic Unit THREE in Pearl Harbor as XO.

**May 1984** - Reported to Defense Mapping Agency Fort Belvoir VA as instructor in Mapping Charting and Geodesy. Didn't know much about it, but learned fast with the help of USMC Gunnery and Top Sargents.

August 1987 - Reported to Amphibious Base Little Creek VA for training in littoral warfare. Met USS Inchon (LPH-12)





when she returned from deployment in the Mediterranean. Relieved OA Division (Weather) Officer,

**Jan 1990** - Came off active duty and joined National Weather Service, returned to Houston and joined the Naval Research Lab unit there. Moved to Kansas City in January 1995.

March 1996 - Re-affiliated with an Amphib unit in Kansas City Reserve Center, then Naval Oceanographic Office in Oct 1998 on second XO tour to stand up a new unit. At that time I met AACA/DSR at Comfort Inn in Picayune MS where we housed our Reserve Unit on drill weekends at Stennis. The club I believe was on the way to a show in Yazoo. I vividly remember meeting Patt and Buddy, and I think Walt and Martha were there also...I saw at least one Model A. Annual Training was in Monterey and Bahrain associated with US and UK numerical weather prediction experiments, flying missions in Persian Gulf, and writing findings. Did war games in Thailand in 1998 and 2000 as a meteorological officer and for protocol duties.. Other training evolutions were stateside. Served a third XO tour at headquarters Naval Meteorology and Oceanography Command at Stennis. Also did tours at

volunteer training units.

#### Retired in Jan 2006.

Comments: I skated through relatively easy duty with no loss or injury, except when the XO gave me an earful leaving my ears ringing. Lost shipmates in Guam and GITMO due to car accidents while on liberty, and one fellow officer, an Academy grad and 110% a Navy man, in the Pentagon on 9/11. He was about to take command of an LHD within a year I believe. He is interred at Arlington. It was not necessary to recall that many Reservists to active duty then. However my service was not much of a personal sacrifice and does not hold a candle to many, especially those of us who went through Vietnam. The most life threatening think I faced was a hangar deck fire on Inchon while we were in the yards..

I wanted the experience, regardless of family objections, and still would not trade it for all the diamonds in South Africa. I consider myself very blessed.


### **Herb Thoms**

After graduation from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in June of 1968 I headed for Subic Bay, Philippines to report aboard my first ship, USCGC Androscoggin, which was deployed to Squadron 3 off the coast of Viet Nam. Those of us headed for the Androscoggin expected to catch the last few months of her deployment before heading back across the Pacific to our homeport of Miami, Florida. However when we checked in to CG Squadron HQ at the Subic Bay Naval Station, we learned that the "Andy" was deployed on

an extended gunfire support mission off the coast of South Viet Nam and wasn't expected back for weeks. After several weeks the "Andy" returned to Subic and I reported aboard, only to learn that the ship had so many mechanical problems that we were to be sent home early so that we could get necessary repair work



done(the ship was a leftover Navy WW2 seaplane tender, like most of the CG's ships during that era).

After a year of ocean station patrols in the North Atlantic aboard Androscoggin I walked across the dock at Coast Guard Base Miami Beach and took command of USCGC Cape Knox, a 95-foot, 105-ton Patrol Boat with a crew of 14. My time as a 23 year old youngster in command of the Cape Knox generated some of the most cherished memories of my career.

After two ship assignments in south Florida I was off to New Orleans for my first staff job. A chance meeting in the laundromat of the apartment complex where I was living introduced me to the love of my life. Five months later Brenda and I were married at a church in Daphne.



After New Orleans it was back to South Florida and back afloat as Operations Officer and Navigator aboard USCGC Diligence, a 210-foot 1,000-ton Medium Endurance Cutter with a crew of 90 homeported in Key West. This was truly an adventurous assignment which included a week-long





firefighting effort at sea extinguishing a major fire aboard the British cruise ship Cunard Ambassador. We moored alongside her in calm seas 75 miles southeast of Key West where our damage control parties and the Ambassador's ship's company fought the fire till it burned out nearly the whole hotel section of that massive ship. It was also the early days of the Caribbean Drug War, which saw us making some of the first Coast Guard at-sea smuggling ship seizures and crew arrests since Prohibition. As "Dilly's" senior boarding officer I was the guy who did most of the stressful boardings, seizures, and arrests. We were literally reinventing the Coast Guard's law enforcement mission by the seat of our pants in those days.

After an exciting tour on "Dilly" I was honored to be selected to command CG Station Ft Lauderdale, Florida. This 50-person Station was one of the busiest Search and Rescue facilities in the Coast Guard. Using my recent law enforcement experience aboard Diligence, I trained my Lauderdale boat crews in this newly emerging Coast Guard mission, which led to numerous smuggler boat seizures and many arrests in the final year of my tour at Lauderdale, making us the first Search and Rescue Station in the Coast Guard to play an active counter narcotics role.

My early law enforcement experience on Diligence and at Fort Lauderdale led directly to my next two Washington assignments as the Coast Guard's Liaison Officer at the State Department where it was my job to work with State and the CG in coordinating the international diplomatic processes which permitted the Coast Guard to board, search, and seize foreign flag vessels on the high seas. After State it was a natural progression for me to spend some time in the Law Enforcement Program Office at Coast Guard Headquarters.

Since there were so few CG Officers with hands-on law enforcement experience in those days I was destined to continue my career in this direction. After my time in DC it was back to Miami – this time for several assignments in multiagency drug task forces. These were the "Miami Vice" days in the 80's when every Federal Agent in Miami thought he was Don Johnson! Exciting, dangerous work involving drug seizures measured in tons. My involvement with the FBI in one lengthy operation led to my receiving a special award from the Director of the FBI.

After years of "dealing in drugs" it was a nice change of pace to get back to some basic CG missions - Aids to Navigation and Search and Rescue-as Commanding Officer of USCG Group Mobile, headquartered here in Mobile. As Commanding Officer of one of the largest Groups in the Coast Guard, which consisted of 26 CG units in three states, I spent my three year tour constantly on the move around my 26 units working with my Commanding Officers and staff to provide CG services to the eastern Gulf of Mexico and several lengthy inland waterway systems. When we moved to Mobile I had the feeling that we probably wouldn't leave, since Mobile is Brenda's home town. After a wonderful tour at the Group I did a short geobachelor tour back in Miami, and retired in 1994.

During my command tour in Mobile I was very active in the community and became good friends with Mobile's Mayor, Mike Dow. When Mike learned that I was retiring, he asked me to join his senior staff as Mobile's Executive Director of Public Safety. It was my job to pull together police, fire-rescue, and animal control departments, along with the city's Municipal Court System into an integrated Public Safety Division consisting of over 1,100 personnel with an annual budget of \$180M. My duties also included being the City's representative on the County Emergency Management Agency's Board of Directors, where I served three two-year terms as Chairman. I was also selected to head a multi agency training team for the State Department's Agency for International Development, which taught U.S. emergency management principles and procedures to senior government officials in Romania in multiple two-week training programs from 2000 to 2003. This effort led to a complete overhaul of that nation's emergency management systems. When my Mayor decided not to run for a fifth term, I decided that nearly 12 years at City Hall was plenty for me as well, so I retired for a second time in 2005.

Mobile is our permanent home – a wonderful place to live. Brenda retired from the U.S. Attorney's Office in 2008 and now enjoys volunteering as Vice President of the Friends of the Mobile Animal Shelter, where she manages the Shelter's pet adoption programs. I had a third career as a consultant, working with Frazier Group LLC on many law enforcement related projects around the country, and serving as Senior Advisor to the Major Cities Police Chief's Association. I finally retired for the third and final time in April of 2019, and now enjoy being home and playing with my toy cars – my two Corvettes, my H2 Hummer, and my 1928 Model "A" Ford.

## Earliest known plan-built car still required casting your own engine

These days, do-it-yourself implies building a headboard out of pallet wood. When the automobile was still in its infancy, the term called for a wider range of skillsets in order to cast and machine the engine for a scratchbuilt horseless carriage, as illustrated by the circa-1900 English Mechanic plan-built automobile coming up for auction next month.

Long before Mechanix Illustrated published guides for rolling basic sheetmetal shapes over a Ford chassis to build a sports car, Thomas Hyler White had an idea. An engineer who had worked for Daimler shortly before the turn of the century, Hyler White came to the conclusion that just about any bloke could build his own automobile rather than purchase one from the nascent auto manufacturing concerns — as long as he had an engineer like Hyler White to guide him.

So Hyler White began publishing plans through English Mechanic and World of Science magazine. In 1899 came a set of plans for a gas-powered tricycle, and in 1900 he started a 31-part series of articles on "A Small Motor Car and How to Build It." As Bonhams noted, the rear-engined 3-hp single-cylinder horizontal-engine belt-and-chain-drive horseless carriage design that Hyler White chose was rather dated, even then, and evolved during the course of the series as Hyler White saw where he could improve it.

But the series also explored the in-depth processes necessary for building such a vehicle, including the construction of a radiator and the casting and machining of the cylinder and other engine components. Granted, Hyler White did have an ulterior motive: After leaving Daimler, he went to work for David J. Smith in London, a firm that specialized in castings specifically for blokes who read do-it-yourself articles on how to build automobiles from scratch.

Undoubtedly dozens of British tinkerers and shedhobbits started their own Hyler White-design motor cars, and many of them abandoned the projects partway finished. Some, though, did see theirs through to completion, among them one English Mechanic reader who left no forwarding address or scrap of identity on the car he abandoned in a field in Kent.

Thus, when C.A. Smith came across the motor car with a tree growing through its chassis in 1921, Smith declared it an 1897 Benz and fixed it up enough to start (but not finish) the London-to-Brighton run by 1928. Over the next several years, the motor car changed hands and identities multiple times. After subsequent owners decided it couldn't be a Benz after comparing it to documented Benzes, they guessed it was a French Hurtu. But it didn't look much like a Hurtu either. It took until the 1950s for its then-owner Reg Taverner to realize the motor car's true origins, though he apparently never uncovered the name of the English Mechanic reader who built it according to Hyler White's plans.

Since then, other such English Mechanic homebuilt motor cars have surfaced, but this one in particular, registration number A166, is believed to be the earliest of them and thus, according to Bonhams, "the world's oldest DIY motor car" (excluding, of course, all the auto pioneers like Gottlieb Daimler, Karl Benz, and Henry Ford who, you know, built their own cars).

## The dangerous history of bad child car seat designs

Survivorship bias arises when we make assumptions about those who made it through an ordeal without considering the data or testimony of those who didn't. It's what led Abraham Wald to discover exactly where to uparmor planes during World War II. It's also why people will inevitably come to the defense of the deeply stupid child restraint devices of decades past simply because they lived

#### through that period

The fact of the matter is, however, that child restraint systems built before the late Sixties or so weren't put on the market for safety and weren't designed to save children's lives in the event of an accident. Instead, companies – some established and respected, others fly-by-night – offered such

















devices to make a quick buck and in many cases put children at greater risk of injury or death

Take, for instance, the baby seat pictured at top or those above, lampooned by Modern Mechanix. Offered as early as the Twenties, they hooked over the car's front seat simply to offer a place to put a kid to either free up its parent's hands to drive or to get the kid out of the parent's way, as if the kid were little more than an inconvenience to the parent. Some of them claimed a measure of safety - ostensibly, with the kid out of the way, the parent could focus on safer driving – but far more placed an emphasis on the child's comfort, its desire to see out the windshield, or the parent's convenience

Other approaches proved either less effective or far more dangerous. The Lull-A-Baby hammock and the Auto Strap seen above might have attached the kids to some point on

or in the car, but they weren't points designed to restrain a passenger, nor were the devices capable of keeping the kids from knocking about the interior of the car. Sears, which offered the Auto Strap, didn't do much better in later years with its Travel Time car seats – which still hooked over the back of the seat, but offered padding this time – and did much worse with the steel travel platform offered at the same time.

This is not to say that parents at the time were inconsiderate monsters who didn't have the health and safety of their kids in mind. As some have argued, their attitudes were more fatalistic - some people lived, some people died, and it was really all chance to them - than now, likely due to the lack of research into and the understanding of the forces involved in a crash, even among experts.

Some enterprising parents like Britain's Jean Ames;



















Denver's Leonard Rivkin; and Torrington, Connecticut's Lester Bresson took matters into their own hands, inventing child car seats that secured the occupants to the vehicle itself to keep them from bouncing around the cabin of the car in a crash. Most parents, though, remained at the mercy of what products were on the market, figuring those were safer than nothing at all.

However, as we saw when surveying automakers' limited efforts at building safer products prior to the Nader era, safety takes a back seat to the corporate bottom line. Indeed, as this Australian Broadcasting Commission report from February 1970 shows, devices like those shown above –still on the market at the time – were demonstrably unsafe, even more dangerous than just leaving a kid unbelted during a crash, yet manufacturers weren't willing to pull the devices from the market for fear of losing revenue.

While the National Traffic and Motor Vehicle Safety Act, which passed in 1966, only mandated the installation of seat belts and didn't appear to address child seats, Ford and GM started working on accessory child car seats they could sell as optional add-ons about this time.

Ford claimed to have its Astro-Guard child restraint seat on the market in 1965, though the earliest literature we see for it is in 1967, where the five-point belted seat—apparently secured with an adult lap belt—was sold as an accessory alongside a safety vest that Ford apparently introduced in 1957. By late in the 1968 model year, Ford introduced the Child's Lifeguard Safety Shield (later rebranded the Tot-Guard), a massive three-piece polyethylene seat that cocooned the occupant and that a lap belt secured to the seat.

Starting in 1969, GM started to offer an accessory child safety seat, what it would later rebrand the Love Seat. Actually, GM introduced two separate designs – a "baby in a bucket" design for infants and a booster-style seat for toddlers and older children – before redesigning the seats into something more resembling modern child car seats in the late Seventies.

(Volvo, which had been working on child car seats since 1964, also trialed a child car seat circa 1970 and seen in the video above, which entailed turning the entire front passenger bucket seat around and ensconcing the child in between two giant foam pads, themselves strapped to the seat.)

According to The Henry Ford, the later version of the Love Seat – with its five-point harness and wraparound bolsters – not only influenced modern car seat design, it also led states across the country to start mandating the use of child car seats. Tennessee started in 1978, and the other 49 states followed by the mid-Eighties. No federal law like that mandating seat belts in cars covers use of a child seat.

It's easy to get flippant when looking at these old restraint systems that we now consider absurd. "How did that generation survive?" some might ask. "I came through just fine sleeping on the package shelf," others might boast. But the harsh truth is that many of that generation didn't survive due to poor understanding of crash physics, corporate greed, legislative inaction, or outright obstinacy, so take these photos as a reminder not just of your own survivorship bias but also of the forces at play – then and always – when it comes to consumer safety.

## **The By Laws**

Every month we will print a section of the by laws. This is so you can review the section and bring up any discussion at our meetings to clarify or petition to change the by laws.

#### ARTICLE IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 4: TREASURER - (A) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the Region. The Treasurer will establish and manage an account, or the Executive Board may approve accounts, in such banks as.

- (B) Checks or drafts in the name of the Region may be drawn with the signature of two of the following (nonfamily) members: Treasurer, President, Vice-President or Secretary. Bank accounts shall be so structured.
- (C) The Treasurer will pay all insurance, public utilities, taxes, regional publication and postage expenses upon receipt. The Treasurer may pay all other bills not to exceed \$500. The Treasurer, with the approval of the President or the Vice President, shall, in an emergency situation, provide payment for any expenditure directed by the President or the Vice President. All expenditures shall be presented to the membership for review and approval by the majority of those attending the next following regularly scheduled Region meeting. All other expenditures must be approved by a majority vote of members attending the meeting at which approval is requested.
- (D) The Treasurer may pay all bills concerning club sponsored car shows upon receipt. The payments shall be listed separately on the Treasurer's report for review and approval at the next following regularly scheduled meeting. A separate report of the car show's receipts and expenses shall be presented to the membership.
- (E) The Treasurer shall collect all dues and keep records of the same. The Treasurer may pay all membership dues payments collected on behalf of the Antique Automobile Club of America national office.
- (F) The Treasurer shall certify membership dues payments to the preparer of the annual Region Roster for purposes of inclusion in the roster.
- (G) The Treasurer shall render a financial report to the Region at the regular meetings for approval by the majority of the members present at the meeting, and whenever the President or the Executive Board requires such a report.
- (H) In the case of a special event that requires a separate bank account be established, the President with the agreement of the Executive Board, may appoint a voting member in place of the Treasurer to manage any special account.
- (I) The members roster will be produced by the Treasurer



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


