


4. Video Game Time!








5. Google Earth Has Virtual Tours of 31 National Parks in the U.S.



Letter from the Editor

I sure hope you are doing what you need to do to stay safe until this virus goes away!

For me, social distancing is the way I need to handle this. Being my elderly aunt's caregiver means I have to take extra measures to protect her. I wash my hands all the time. I also try not to touch my face, but once I'm told not to, it itches all the time.

Some of the new terms that are being thrown around might just need to be understood. These terms are from dictionary.com. Here's a clarifying guide to the lingo at a time when there's more than enough confusion to go around.

Asymptomatic: While the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Prevention has identified the common symptoms of COVID-19 — fever, cough and shortness of breath — not everyone shows symptoms to the same degree. When someone does not exhibit symptoms but is still infected, they are referred to as asymptomatic.

Community spread: refers to the spread of the virus in an area, "including (to) some who are not sure how or where they became infected," according to the CDC.

Flattening the curve: The phrase "flattening the curve," as it relates to COVID-19, refers to practicing the guidelines set by the CDC and WHO in order to prevent an overwhelming spike in cases.

Hand-washing: Although the importance of handwashing is not seasonal, it becomes critical during a pandemic. Cleansing the hands of germs with a full, 20-second hand-wash with soap stops germs from ending up on the face, where there's a chance for infection.

Isolation versus quarantine: is a method of keeping sick people away from healthy people, while quarantine is a method of keeping healthy people who may have been exposed to the virus away from other healthy people to see if they show symptoms.

Pandemic: defined as "the worldwide spread of a new disease" by WHO, differ from epidemics or outbreaks in sheer global reach and impact.

Social distancing: According to the CDC, practicing social distancing means avoiding gatherings and congregate settings, as well as maintaining a distance of 6 feet from others when possible.

Hang in there, this too shall pass. Take some time to spend quality time with your loved ones. (Via skype, facetime, chat or other electronic means until it is safe to shakehands or hug each other.



The By Laws

Every month we will print a section of the by laws. This is so you can review the section and bring up any discussion at our meetings to clarify or petition to change the by laws.

ARTICLE VI - MEMBERS

Section 5: Members in Good Standing - Means for the purposes of these bylaws that said member has paid all dues and assessments levied by the Antique Automobile Club of America (National and this Region) and has met all other requirements for membership in this Region.

Section 6: At its discretion, the Deep South Region may choose to issue Life membership status to a member(s) for outstanding service to the club and to AACA provided the person(s) has been a member for 10 years or more. The member making the proposal shall state the reason he/she feels the nominee(s) worthy of this honor. Any proposal for Life Membership can and shall be proposed at any general membership meeting of the DSR, discussed, voted on and approved by the majority of the members attending.

ARTICLE VII - MEETING OF THE MEMBERS

Section 1: The Region shall hold an annual meeting during the month of November on such date, time and place as the Executive Board shall direct. The business of this meeting shall be the election of officers, report of officers and any other business at hand.

Section 2: A regular meeting of the Region members shall be held once each month at a time and place as the Executive Board may designate, except when the date conflicts with a national holiday.

Section 3: In all matters of voting, only members in good standing may vote, and the result will be determined by a simple majority of the members voting at the meeting.

The Frustration of Loving a Discontinued Car

Ever like a car so much that you wanted to buy its replacement, only to find that the car company never bothered to make a replacement? I've done this. Three times now.

First was with my '92 Nissan NX2000. It was the last of a line in the States that started with the Nissan Pulsar, a little Sentra-based 2+2 coupe that looked like it should have its engine amidships, a la Fiat X1/9. The second generation, the "GoBots" Pulsar, advertised not only T-tops but a removable rear section that could render the little coupe as a shooting brake or an ersatz El Camino, depending on what you did (or did not) bolt on. The NX2000 was a proper sports coupe, with a 140-hp, 2-liter, all-aluminum SR20DE for power, and it took all of the abuse I hurled at it for 11 years and never really guit. (There was also a visually cleaner, but gutless, 1600 model.) But unlike the traditional four-year cycle for Japanese cars, the NX arrived mid-1991 and was done by the end of 1993. No direct replacement was forthcoming; the rear-drive 240SX was part of the long-standing Silvia line, and the 1995 200SX was really just a two-door Sentra with an alphabet soup name.

Second was one that I still miss, even two years later: my Mazda5. It was just the right size for me and my family,



I got 25-plus mpg with it, and it had all of the Mazda zoom-zoom that was advertised. No blistering acceleration, to be clear, but it was delightful, and tactility abounded. The dual sliding side doors were a bonus for my line of work. I bought my '06, near-90,000-mile, 5-speed Mazda5 used in 2012, from a friend who's still a friend—so you know that it was good. Five years and 125,000 miles later, the only bad thing I have to say about it is that when laden, the rear suspension would bow out and eat the insides of my very expensive Michelins within a thousand miles. (Unladen, they'd go indefinitely.) The Mazda5 was restyled around 2011, to its detriment, and as I was sitting around waiting for a Skyactiv Diesel version of the replacement model, I learned that Mazda would be focusing on passenger cars,





and that there would be no replacement model. I sold it cheap to my kid's kung fu instructor, a guy who had made a series of bad decisions and has had not-great things befall him. He's still driving it, so it must be doing okay.


When it's time to replace our Fiesta ST, well, we won't be able to get a newer Fiesta ST, or any Fiesta, or a Focus.



The third remains in our family, and while it has a long time to go, it makes me fear for the future. Four years ago, we got my wife into a Molten Orange Ford Fiesta ST. (She wanted a green one, like Jeremy Clarkson drove around a shopping mall in that Top Gear episode, but that color was discontinued by the time we were buying.) It is ridiculous fun—surely the most fun you could get out of a new car for \$25,000 (ours, bereft of options, didn't cross \$22,000). 30,000 miles out of a set of tires is not awesome, and the shocks appear to be filled with pebbles from the local guarry in lieu of hydraulic fluid. There's no

torque steer to speak of, and even with her heavy right foot my wife is still managing 28 mpg around town. Plus, I suspect that it's actually quicker, 0-75 mph, than my twin-turbo Skyline GT-R. I've been hearing good things about the new Fiesta ST: better interior, better economy, and equivalent performance. The ride's even supposedly improved, even if only incrementally. It would be years before we'd have to look into it yet, but a replacement new-generation Fiesta ST would be a strong candidate sometime in the year 2025. Except... oh, right, America isn't getting the new-generation Fiesta ST. Or Fiesta anything. Or passenger car that's not a Mustang. Another favorite family car we can't follow up with.

I know it's not just me. I've spoken with (for example) both Chrysler PT Cruiser and Chevy HHR owners who swear they got the best vehicle ever. I've had friends with Toyota FJ Cruisers who have been approached with cash offers at gas stations. Have you ever owned the last generation of a particular car—not necessarily because it was the last of its type, but because you wanted it and loved it and it was the right car for you at the time—and then years later you wanted another and discovered that there was no direct followup? I'm not talking "I bought an LS6 Chevelle and nothing else was ever the same..." I'm talking an entire line of cars disappearing before you had the chance to get a newer version of the one you loved but used up. Tell us about it below.

Collector Classics: The 'perfect' restoration took 33 years Attention to detail, patience crucial to putting shine back on rare 1933 McLaughlin Buick coupe

VANCOUVER – Peter Trant takes his time when he restores old cars, a prime example being his ultra rare, Canadian-built 1933 McLaughlin Buick Series 80 Victoria coupe.

He paid \$300 for the dilapidated 1933 car when it was 33 years old in 1966, took it apart for restoration in 1979 and finished it 33 years later.

Trant restored other cars during those years and spent 44 years teaching future shop teachers at the British Columbia Institute of Technology. He was originally going to do a quick restoration on the Buick to drive it across Canada on a vintage car tour in 1980. But he took his 1947 Lincoln Continental convertible instead.

When he disassembled the McLaughlin Buick, he found

the floorboard under the front seats had been imprinted at the factory with "Not For Production." He has never heard of another 1933 McLaughlin Buick Series 80 Victoria coupe and this could have been a prototype car built by General Motors of Canada using parts shipped from the U.S. All he knows of the history of the car is that it was reputed to have been once owned by a past mayor of Surrey.

He really got going on the car again about 10 years ago and made the decision that the McLaughlin Buick deserved a top-quality restoration. Although the body was good and the car was basically complete, the fabric roof insert had caved in and water had rotted much of the wood and ruined the interior.

"The more I got into it, the fussier I got. I decided to make it as good as I could," he says looking back on the thousands of hours spent renewing every part of the car.

He offers three reasons for the obsessive restoration: it was the first vintage car that he bought; it was made in Canada; and it is a very rare car, possibly being the only McLaughlin Buick of its kind.

Col. Sam McLaughlin started General Motors of Canada building Chevrolets and Buick cars in his hometown of Oshawa, Ont. He imported parts from General Motors in the U.S. to build his McLaughlin Buick automobiles but they were very different from their U.S. cousins thanks to a host of unique and deluxe features.

Trant did all the restoration work himself, with the exception of the chrome plating and the final painting. He says he went at the restoration "backwards," starting with the "jewelry," which included meticulously restoring the lights and hundreds of other chrome-plated parts with each piece then being sent out for re-chroming and carefully put away for when the car would be reassembled.

He spent one winter doing the woodwork, which was complicated because, at the factory, the wood structure was made before the sheet metal body panels were fastened on. Using white oak, he made the original type of mortise and tenon and splined joints while replacing about 80 per cent of the internal wooden framework that reinforces the body built by Fisher for GM.

Next came the work on the body that was originally built with the panels joined over the inner wood framework.

At the factory, where body panels were to be joined, workers cut grooves in the wood to put asbestos over the wood so it wouldn't catch fire when the panels were welded together. The welded seams were then filled with molten lead to make the body completely smooth.

Trant did the frame with new or restored parts and rebuilt the complete running gear himself including machining all the parts. Every part was restored the way it was put in the car originally. Even unseen brake parts were copper or cadmium plated just the way they were originally, even though no one will ever see them. He even made the 130-centimetre-long muffler entirely from stainless steel using original factory drawings and dimensions from the shop manual.

The final touch was the upholstery. Trant had a skilled upholsterer lined up to do the work but, before the car was ready, he retired from the business. His answer to that was to do all the upholstery work himself.

He acquired the original upholstery material, borrowed the upholsterer's sewing machine and went to work.

"I understand material such as wood and metal and found that upholstery fabric is just another material," he says.

"I watched my mother use a sewing machine so I thought I could do it too."

It wasn't as simple as he thought. Each seat was filled with over 80 cotton bags containing different sizes of coil springs. Peter took everything apart, individually sandblasted and painted every spring, sewed them into new cotton bags and then painstakingly reassembled them into the seat frames.

He had to make the stitched embossed door panels and the special metal nailing strips that hold the panels onto the doors. And he made a mould to recreate the rubber mat that is part of the front floor carpet and seals the floor shift for the transmission. He made the visors and assist straps and even had the tassels for the pulls for the rear window blinds recreated by copying one that was with the car.

He got his information from 1933 sales brochures he had collected over the years and photos in an original shop manual. The



hardest piece to find was the last piece: an original unrestored chrome-plated Harrison heater that was a factory option.

The car is painted two shades of royal maroon and has luxury touches like dual side mounted spare tires with metal covers, a fold-down trunk rack, factory backup lights, a clock in the glove box door and an original radio that is turned on with a special key.

Peter Trant's restored 1933 McLaughlin Buick Series 80 Victoria coupe was honoured at last fall's Luxury & Supercar Weekend Concours d'Elegance at VanDusen Garden, winning first place among the classics and the This Car Matters award for excellence.

Trant offers this advice for those who may embark on a complete restoration of a classic car: Spend time looking at whatever aspect of the project you plan to tackle, study it carefully, look for clues how the pieces fit and work together until you are able to make sense of it; Take a lot of pictures before and during disassembly because you will never remember all the details later on; Do the absolute best job you can on every part because errors have a habit of accumulating. Don't throw anything out until you are absolutely finished. Often great authenticity clues exist among the worn and shabby parts you are remaking or replacing.

He has driven the

1933 McLaughlin Buick just 10 kilometres to the VanDusen show. Asked what he will now do with the car, he says he really doesn't know. He is just getting started on the complete restoration of the 1919 Pierce Arrow limousine that he bought in New York many years ago.


I typically get approached with questions about the car at almost every stop. Between lunch and dinner trips and
