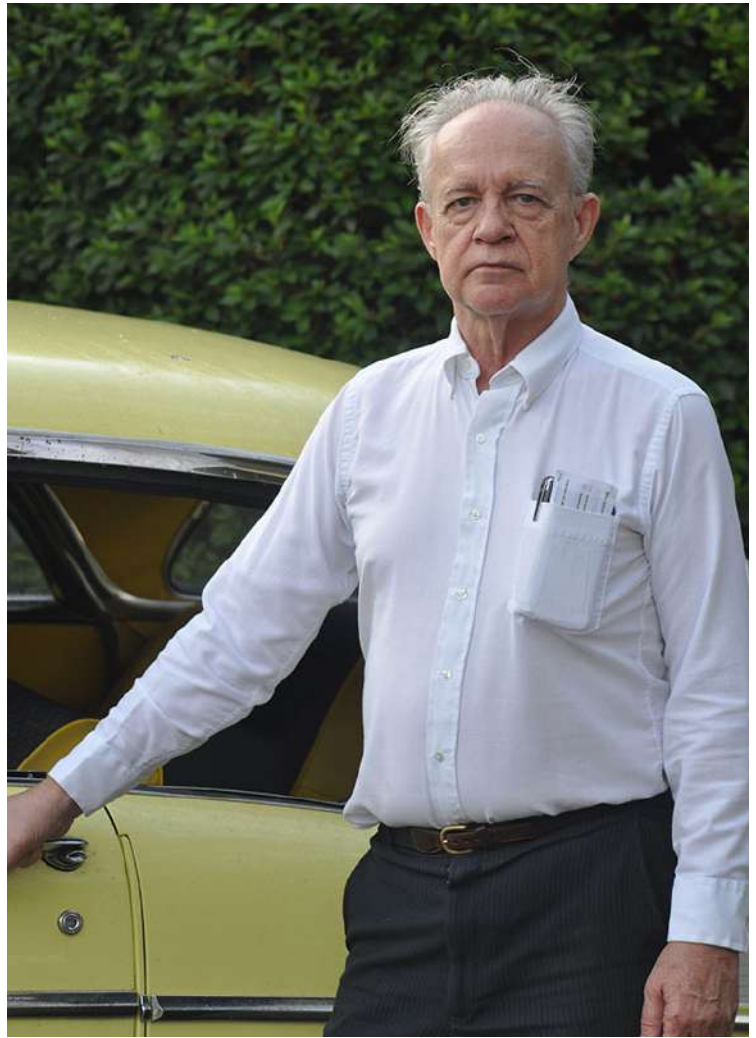

outdone, I've asked Darrin to order a new radiator, electric fan, shroud assembly too, please God, stop the chronic overheating.



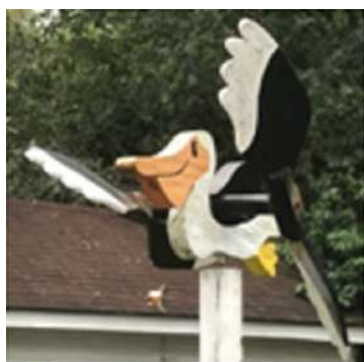
3. Not car related:

The By Laws

Every month we will print a section of the by laws. This is so you can review the section and bring up any discussion at our meetings to clarify or petition to change the by laws.

ARTICLE VI - MEMBERS

Section 4: When a special meeting is called, the Secretary must give notice to all members, not less than (7) days before the date of the meeting by telephone, E-mail or USPS mail.

Section 5: Definition - Notice shall mean conveyance of information requiring notice or having the information concerning such meeting published in the Regional publication known as The Sparkplug.

ARTICLE VIII - REGIONAL REQUIREMENTS BY AACA

Section 1: The members of the Region shall not, as a group, use the name of AACA in connection with a commercial or charitable project in a manner implying sponsorship of the AACA or the Deep South Region.

Section 2: The Region or its chapters shall not hold any activity in conflict with national event of the AACA.

Section 3: Announcements of Regional activities must be sent to the National Vice President in charge of activities.

Section 4: The names and addresses of all Regional officers and members must be sent to the National Secretary/Treasurer each year as required by AACA.

Section 5: The AACA is a nonprofit organization. The members thereof shall not be entitled to any individual or collective interest, participation, share, right and property - right in and to the asset of the club thereof. No dividends, pecuniary profits, stock dividends, or payment of like manner shall ever be declared or paid to geographic area of a Region thereof.

Keeping your car interior clean during Coronavirus (and in general)

With the COVID-19 pandemic, personal hygiene is more important than ever, and that extends to our vehicles. Of course it's a good idea to keep a car sanitary in general, but it's even more important if you're buying or selling a car. Because our classifieds and our auctions site are one of the main reasons people come to Hemmings, we want to offer some guidelines for keeping cars clean and helping prevent the spread of disease. Before we begin, however, we can't stress one message enough: Don't put yourself or others at risk. If that means putting off buying or selling a car for while, just wait. As we've mentioned, Hemmings is taking every precaution while we keep our business running, and we want you to be safe, too. If you do go ahead with a purchase or sale, take extra precautions. And remember, it's not just a matter of protecting yourself from infection, but protecting others in the event you yourself are sick.

The basics: Wash your hands, don't touch your face

The general guidelines for preventing the spread of any disease are the same around cars as anywhere else. Wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds after touching



any unknown surface that someone else might touch, whether you're picking up a car from a repair shop or doing some socially-distant car shopping. These guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) are worth a refresher, even if you think you're already a hand-washing expert. If you don't have access to soap and water, hand sanitizer works as a backup.

Also, keep your distance. Don't get in a car with someone from outside your household, even if the third row of an old station wagon is 6 feet away from the driver's seat and the windows are down. Coronavirus isn't classified as airborne,



which can be confusing because it definitely can be spread through sneezing and coughing. And, because coronavirus can spread through people who aren't showing any symptoms, you don't want to risk exposure in the confined space of an automobile interior. Does that mean letting a car sit for a while, even days, after someone else is in it? Again, there's no harm in taking that kind of safety measure.

The difference between cleaning, sanitizing, and disinfecting



Kosilla always wears a mask, eye protection, and gloves whenever he's cleaning a car, not just recently, because as a professional detailer he comes into contact with car-related germs on a daily basis.

For details on how to effectively make a car germ-free without ruining the interior with bleach, we turned to Larry Kosilla, a professional detailer with his own line of AMMO NYC car care products and a YouTube channel full of tutorials. His recent video, which we've included below, is a good overview of how make your car clean. "It isn't a blanket approach, you need to be specific to each panel," Kosilla said in a phone interview, noting that a typical car interior is made up of many different porous and non-porous materials.

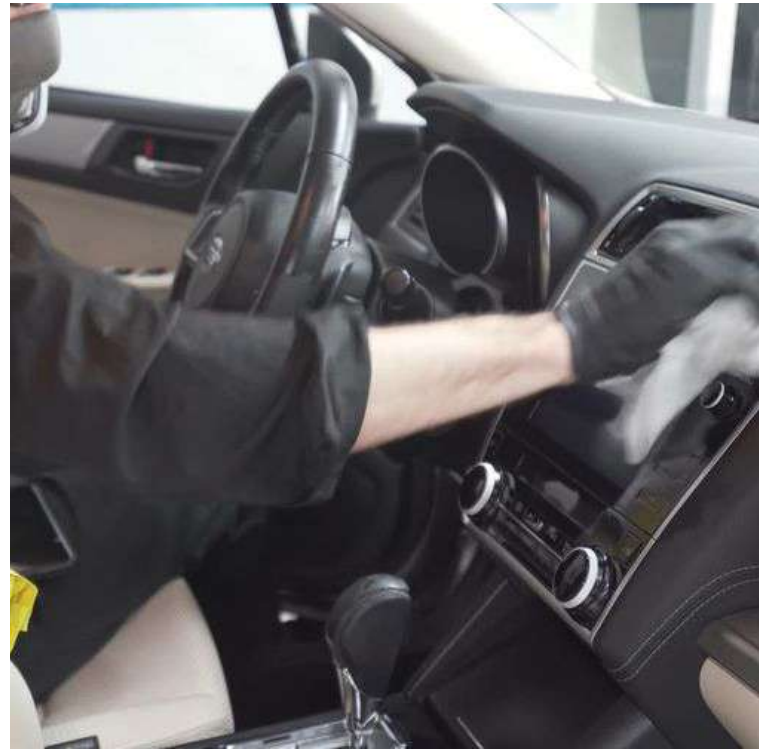
He recommends focusing on the six spots in the car most likely to host germs, bacteria, and other infectious material: the steering wheel, cup holders, seatbelt, inside door handles, gearshift knob, and radio buttons. But before you get into cleaning, you need to know the difference between cleaning, sanitizing, and disinfecting. Cleaning is the act of physically removing dirt and other substances from a surface, usually with a detergent. Sanitizing lowers the number of germs on a surface, while disinfecting uses chemicals to actively kill germs. Don't skip the first step, Kosilla said. "Cleaning is actually important. The CDC says you actually have to clean a surface before you disinfect it."

Equally important is understanding how sanitizers and

disinfectants work. Most disinfectants require a certain amount of dwell time to work effectively. That usually means leaving the surface wet for the indicated amount of time. "You have to read the bottle," said Kosilla, "and then do what the bottle says." You should also check out the list of EPA-approved disinfectants for Coronavirus, and look for the EPA label on the back of any sanitizing or disinfecting product, which allows the manufacturer to make legitimate effectiveness claims.

Besides cleaning your cars for your own safety and peace of mind, if you're selling a car, you should do this any time a new person gets in and out of the vehicle. The same goes for your personal cars when you pick them up from service. And if you're car shopping, don't be afraid to ask the dealership or seller if you can give the car a wipe-down yourself.

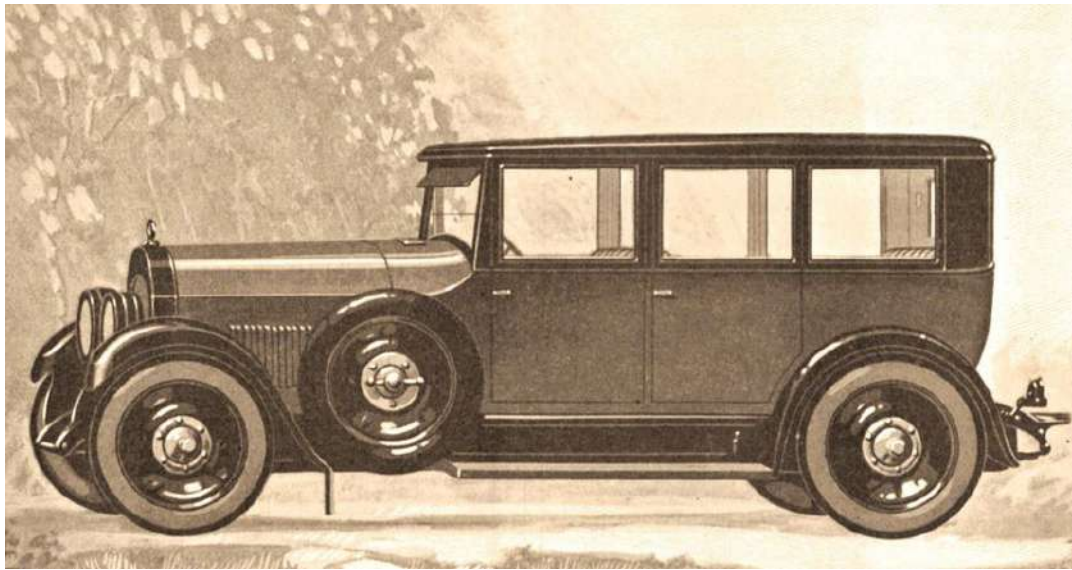
Disinfecting your car without ruining the interior



So if you can't bleach the inside of your car, how do you disinfect it? With dwell times for disinfectants typically 3 minutes or longer, "That's a long time for a very high-pH product to sit on a very soft material," said Kosilla. In his video, he recommends a deep clean on the whole interior, disinfecting those six hot spots, and sanitizing whatever else can be done without any visual discoloration. Plus, Kosilla notes that most sanitizing products are made for non-porous surfaces. On seats and fabric where you can't keep the surface wet, it doesn't do much. Bear in mind, as Kosilla himself stresses, he is not a doctor or an infectious disease expert - he's figuring it out as we go just like the rest of us.

As with any cleaning product, always test an inconspicuous area first. Once your car is clean, you can take some extra steps to ensure you don't bring any new dirt or germs inside. And don't forget to clean your keys.

Open Carriage to Enclosed Coach

Coachwork for motorcars carried on the style of the horse-drawn wagons that preceded them. Early automobiles saw engines placed in chassis that were inspired by the single- or multiple-horse-drawn surreys, wagons, and coaches. The majority of the horse-powered wagons were completely open, without windshields, and bench seats were standard fare. Many of these vehicles had iron- and wood-framed tops that were covered by treated canvas or cloth, with side curtains of similar material that could be mounted in place for protection from inclement weather. Some carriages did have enclosed bodies, as did early automobiles, and most of these were more often seen in larger villages or cities, but less frequently in rural areas. Many of the bodies for early automobile companies were designed and produced by the same coachbuilders who built bodies for horse-drawn carriages. The carriage industry was especially prolific in the Northeast. New York City was the center of activity, and saw many body companies, all within a 50-mile radius, continue to thrive by building coachwork for the new "horseless carriage." This was true for the well-respected Brewster & Co., which had several locations in Manhattan prior to its final factory in Long Island City, Queens. By the mid-Teens, when Europe was involved in the Great War, fully enclosed coachwork with plate glass windows was becoming more popular for automobiles. Sales of the same would start to replace the open touring cars and roadster body types. The popular motor magazines of 1917 to 1924 prove that the majority of automobile

manufacturers viewed the two-door coach and four-door sedan—which both offered room for up to five passengers, in enclosed comfort year-round—as viable products they could sell. Just about all manufacturers listed enclosed coachwork in their advertisements. Most manufacturers tried to cover the entire spectrum of sales opportunities by offering six body styles: three open and three enclosed. Depending upon which customers the automobile manufacturer was focused on, the enclosed bodies could all

have some unique feature. Among the popular types and styles were some form of coupe (two and four passenger), sedan (five and seven passenger), berline, limousine, and less so, a town car. The open body styles were either two- or four-passenger roadsters, or touring (like a sedan, in both five- and seven-passenger capacity). Even convertibles, with roll-up windows, started to become more available in that post-World War I era. On occasion, the convertible was called a cabriolet, but certain town cars would also share that cabriolet name, depending upon the marque. The two-door sedan, or coach, became an extremely popular enclosed body style, especially among the medium- and lower-priced cars. For the most part, with the possible exception of cars in the price range of Ford, Essex, and Chevrolet, nearly all offered a seven-passenger sedan model. All the enclosed body styles used thick plate glass for the windows, including windshields, into the late 1920s. Safety glass was eventually invented to prevent the horrific injuries caused by sharp pieces of broken plate glass hitting passengers in collisions. With the armistice and end of WWI in 1918, automobile sales increased as servicemen returned home and looked for a car that would provide comfort year-round, thus rendering the coach body style very popular. Manufacturers saw the enclosed body style as the future, even though roadsters and touring cars were still popular. With the increased development of pressed steel body panels, it quickly became easier to build a sedan or coupe. Thus, the sedan became the focus of the motor car industry, taking the lead in sales of new cars.

What's the Latest News About Our New Building?
