All Old Cars Are Model A's

At the Mother's Day picnic lunch, Charlotte and Darrin's grandson Barrett, was so excited to see our 1929 Model A Phaeton. He couldn't wait to tell us that there was only one car aboard the Titanic when it sank....a Model A!

But, in one of those "wake up in the middle of the night" moments I couldn't remember the exact date of the tragic sinking of that beautiful old ship. It was April 15, 1912. That was still in the era of the Model T's as the Model A wasn't released until 1928. So, I am thinking maybe it was a T instead. After much research I found out that there was just one automobile aboard and discovered quite an interesting story.

The cargo manifest lists a 1912 Renault type CB coupe! This car was purchased in France by the William Carter family to tour Europe while on vacation. The chauffer, Augustus Aldworth, then drove the family to the ship in the Renault. As the family boarded the ship for their trip home the car was crated and loaded. It was stored in the

port side deck storage area which is said to have been watertight.

The family survived the sinking but Aldworth unfortunately did not. When they arrived home Mr. Carter filed a claim with Lloyds of London for the loss of the car. The Renault was valued at \$5,000 which would be equivalent to about \$130,000 today!

No photographs of this car are known to exist. The hold where the car was stored is located near the bow of the ship which is said to be still intact. Several attempts have been made to locate this vehicle and to retrieve it.

There is a wonderful article about the car with photos of another 1912 Renault and all the specs on Google. It was written by Hagerty Media. It is very interesting and the source for much of my information.

Finally, after my discovery I presented my case to Barrett. His exact words to me were: "Well, all old cars are Model A's!". Wouldn't Henry Ford have just loved that!

ARTICLE XI - PROPERTY



Car Photography 101: Get the right "hero" and exterior shots to get buyers excited

Let's look at some tips for getting the best glamour shots and overall images of your vehicle. For all of our advice on how to photograph your car for maximum success,. Your lead image is important as it will be the first thing viewers see when browsing Hemmings Auctions, Hemmings Classifieds, or anywhere else you might try to sell your vehicle.



A search might show potential buyers the listing for your vehicle, but a subpar picture could keep them from clicking and reading more; the automotive shopping equivalent of swiping left, in modern parlance. It's best to make your car stand out.

In our magazines, we call this lead image the "beauty" shot, a picture that shows the car from its best view in the best light. It might also be called a "hero" shot. In almost every case, this image is a front three-quarter view, either of the driver's or passenger's side of the car. When properly photographed, that three-quarter view—in a single image—presents a pleasing visage of the front end, the profile, the "greenhouse," the roofline, and even the wheels. All of those elements of the car should be visible in a three-quarter image.









When taking a front three-quarter shot, keep the wheels straight or turn them away from the photographer, as if still turning the car as your parked it. The turned wheels add a dynamic look to a static image, as if the car were in motion. If you turn the wheel the opposite direction, the view will include the tread and might include the inside of the wheel, which will just look awkward, and is not nearly as pleasing as the outside of the wheel. For the rear three-quarter shot, keeping the wheels turned in the same direction as the car is parked also can give that same effect.



Between the three-quarter images and the straighton shots, we call this group of pictures the walk-around images. They allow a potential buyer to get a virtual walk around of the entire car from all sides. These are the images that need to catch a buyer's attention so that he will dive deeper, read the listing, and study the detail images. Be prepared to move the car several times during





the course of your photo shoot. If the front three-quarter view has good lighting, a suitable background, and is free of distracting objects (see part 1), the odds are pretty good that moving around to the back of the car will not yield the same results. You're better off moving the car because the rest of the setting is ready to go. This also makes for consistency - it's easy to focus on the car when the background looks the same in each shot. And we'll mention again that the few minutes that extra effort takes could literally pay off in hundreds or thousands of dollars of sale price.



For a little more eye-catching photo—but not too dramatic, as this is not a feature story but an attempt to sell your car—try taking the pictures lower or higher than just standing height. This different perspective can add interest to your images. Be prepared to get low, close to the ground even, and higher up, where a step stool or step ladder would be handy to have with you. After the three-quarter views, you will want to take a straight-on profile shot of each side of the car and both the front end and rear end straight on. Try not to use a wide-angle lens here, because it will distort the image. But do try to take those pictures straight on, to share the best direct views of your car that you can.









So, What's My Car Worth?

I am certain we have all been asked this question and also certain we have asked someone else this same question.

For those of us who collect cars, the value of the car is always important. We don't want to overpay and certainly do not want to part with a car for a bargain price.

So, what are our choices for determining value? There are many appraisers that will give you their estimate of value for a few hundred dollars. Most of these "guesses" come from a value guide or auction results.

The value guides are often published by insurance companies. But be careful, that high insurance estimate also works to generate a higher insurance premium.

Auction results are unpredictable. Not only are

bids determined by the number of bidders but also the majority of the seller listing agreements allow for "phantom" bidding by the auction company. This, is done to guarantee that the reserve price is met.

But the real answer to the question is "your car is worth what someone else will pay for it." Unfortunately, with fewer people entering the old car hobby, you should be concerned about the future value of your car.

A neighbor of mine has a late 30's Packard Sedan for sale. All six of the prospective buyers who, have looked at this car were over the age of seventy.

It is time for each member and each region to begin a diligent effort to attract new members. We, need to sell the "fun" that is available with our hobby.

More activities, such as shows, tours, and picnics, will always generate more members. Our cars need to be seen by the public.

We need to seek venues to display our cars, such as county fairs or antique malls. We have a great hobby in which a small minority of car owners participate. The best way to solidify the value of your collection is to increase our membership.

I hope the day doesn't come when no one wants an antique car.

Know when to use oil additives



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Aftermarket additives are a popular off-the-shelf item at truck stops and parts counters, but many of the necessary additives already are formulated in the diesel engine oils directly from the supplier.

"Engine oil absolutely has to have additives in it," said Stede Granger, technical services manager for Shell Lubricants. Granger said engine oil basically consists of two components: the base lubricant stock and the additives that support it.

"Engine oils are probably the most complicated, the most balanced and typically have the most additives of any of the oils we make," he said. "Oil manufacturers spend millions of dollars to develop the right additive package."

Engine oil is produced with one intention – to reduce friction – and Rob Howes II, executive vice president for Howes Products, said this is accomplished through the use of several common ingredients, including zinc, calcium, phosphorous and sulfur.

Howes said if an oil additive is used, it is important that it contain these base ingredients. "Otherwise, by swapping the additive in for a quart or gallon of your conventional oil, you are effectively degrading the oil," he said. "On the other hand, overuse of these ingredients, while great for the performance of the oil, can cause other problems, such as harming emissions systems or excess pollution."

Darryl Purificati, OEM technical liaison for Petro-Canada Lubricants, said the additive package of a heavy-duty engine oil makes up approximately 10-20% of the lubricant itself and is balanced to meet OEM requirements while optimizing the engine oil's performance.

"The balance of the lubricant formulation is critical, with chemicals combined in specific quantities to ensure that the oil protects the engine and enhances its performance," Purificati said.

Not all oil additives are made equal, and Howes said not all engine oil additives are effective, adding that some oil additives actually can reduce the oil's performance if not formulated correctly.

Certain aftermarket additives advertise an increased ability to protect or clean engine parts, but Granger said more of a given additive isn't always better, as it can impact performance in other areas.

"There's a lot of different functions of the engine oil," he said. "The problem is getting a very balanced formulation, because more of one additive can actually make things worse rather than better. It could negate the performance of the oil."

An overtreatment of an anti-wear additive could lead to an increase in deposit performance, said James Booth, commercial sector manager for Chevron Delo.

"We have recently drawn people's attention to the ash content in engine oils and the impact on DPF [diesel





particulate filter] clogging," Booth said. "A number of these supplemental oil additives contain metallic additives, which will take your engine oil over the 1% API CK-4 limit and result in a faster rate of DPF clogging. Adding top-up additives isn't like mixing Red Bull and vodka. It risks being more like adding Tabasco to your ghost pepper wings."

Friction modifiers, detergents and dispersants all help to keep the oil and metal surfaces clean, but Howes said balance is key. "Too little can reduce the effectiveness of the oil, and too much can overwhelm the oil, rendering the beneficial additives already found in oil ineffective," he said.

Lubricant marketers and additive partners must meet American Petroleum Institute (API) requirements, which also include adherence to the American Chemistry Council's code of practice. The engine oil must pass standardized engine and bench tests, often totaling over 100 for a single program, at the cost of multiple millions of dollars, Booth said.

There is a limit on the modifications to the formulation, and if the formula can't pass a test, "you need to start again from scratch," he said. "The breadth of testing and controls on modifications ensure the quality and consistency of performance. Top-up additives are not subject to these constraints."

Additives included by oil manufacturers target specific areas such as oxidation resistance or anti-foaming agents, among many other things, while complementing the anti-wear and extended-life properties in other areas.

The addition of a generic all-in-one aftermarket additive "would be like a doctor prescribing the same medication to all of his patients, no matter what their ailment," said Jami Melani, field engineering/heavy-duty technical services manager for BP/Castrol.

Oil additives can improve any oil, Howes said, but the lower the quality of the base engine oil, the more improvement truck owners will see.

"You will see the greatest improvement when using a conventional engine oil treated with a quality oil additive," he said. "When you look at the highest-quality synthetic oils, better ingredients and more additives are used by OEMs. So while you will still see a benefit from a quality engine oil additive, you will not see quite as vast of an improvement as when used with a conventional oil."

Howes said there are maximum levels of certain additives that should not be exceeded. On the other hand, specially formulated friction modifiers also can improve oil, but these come at a premium.

"Generally, OEMs balance the tradeoffs of cost and performance," he said. "This is also why you will see vast improvements when additives are combined with cheaper conventional oils, and smaller gains when used with the highest-quality oils. As with anything, there is a point of diminishing returns."




