Dauphin Way Baptist Shirley Looney Show





2020 AACA Special Fall Nationals Eastern Regional Meeting, November 5-8, Gettysburg PA.

Debbie and I attended the 2020 Special Fall Nationals AACA Eastern Regional, November 6-7 in Gettysburg PA. "Mother Nature" could not have been more kind, providing us wonderful weather for the entire week. Clear skies and temps in the mid 70's and even a bit of colorful fall foliage!

We took our 1941 Packard 120 Convertible ("Packie") to the Nationals to be judged for its Senior badge. Yes, "Packie" won his Senior badge! Yeah!!!!! There were over 600 cars attending from all over the United States. Some coming as far as Mississippi (Debbie and Craig), Alabama, Texas and Arizona!

The venue was held outside at the Gateway Wyndham and Marriott Courtyard Hotel which provided excellent trailer and attendee parking for everyone. AACA even had a display with some WWII military vehicles including a Sherman M4A3E2 tank!!! The soldiers were in full Army combat fatigues with their support vehicles and gear.

There were many beautiful cars of all makes and models on display. Stan Kulikowski was the Head Judge and commented he had his hands full announcing 600 awards. It was a wonderful and "safe" event including temperature taking and mask-wearing for anyone entering the location.

AACA did a great job meeting the COVID-19 prevention guidelines. Many of us visited the Gettysburg Battlefield Museum and the visitors center, which holds the Cyclorama artists rendition of the battle created by Paul Dominique Philippoteaux in the late 1800's. The canvas is over 300 ft. long and 40ft. high and was stitched together and restored before being ready for display many decades later in Gettysburg.

And of course, Pennsylvania provides wonderful cuisine in many of the local diners and restaurants, all operating at 50% capacity indoors and outside. 

25th Annual Social Security Run The Final Run 1995 – 2020

Let's start with a little history of this tour.

In 1995, Steve Gordon approached the Board of Directors of The Atlanta Region– Horseless Carriage Club and proposed a new regional tour designed on the basis of the London to Brighton Tour in England.

The idea continued to intrigue Robert Taylor – imagine that! A tour that would encourage participants to drive the older cars. Robert suggested a "Social Security Run" – cars had to be 65 years old or older. 1931 model cars would be the babies – the youngest cars to participate. A model was added each year. After several years the beloved "old cars" would not be the center piece of the tour any longer, eventually eligibility was changed and is now limited to Pre-War cars.

Many memories were made during the next 25 years. A Few Fun Facts for this tour –

- There have been 383 drivers over 25 years. Only four drivers drove all 25 years
 - 2 drivers are on their first SSR this year
 - Youngest driver was 16 years old
- Oldest driver is 93 years old, he is actually older than his car, and he is on this Run -#3 Harold Dye
- Over 3,800 persons have participated in the Run
- 48 vehicle manufacturers have been represented; 41 of those are no longer in business
- A 1907 Cartercar is the oldest car to participate in the Run
- A 1909 EMF, 1909 Buick, and a 1909 Kissell round out the next oldest cars driven on the SSR
- Ford Model A's and T's are by far the most popular cars driven each year

These are just a few facts for the SSR.

As far as this year, Tour #25 the HCCA really went all out. The tour was postponed from April to October due to COVID virus. Callaway Gardens had many plans in place to protect their guests. A huge thanks to them for the safety precautions they had in place.

Registration was on Thursday Oct. 29 from 12:30pm -2:30pm at The Lodge. After which we had a driving tour appx.25 miles round trip. This consisted of an afternoon drive to the Franklin D. Roosevelt Park for a BBQ dinner. This started the festivities. Most of our meals while on tours were served outside with "social distancing." This was followed by a driver's introduction ceremony back at the Lodge.

The HCCA had decorated the hotel ballroom tables decorated with poster boards, loaded with photos of all the tours.



Participants enjoyed looking for their pictures, those of old friends. A special thanks was given to those 16 people who supported the SSR for more than 20 years.

On Friday, Oct 30, we were off on a 103.3 mile tour to Historic Westville – Living History Museum where we visited homes from the 1800 hundred's, there was quilting, blacksmith, cobblers, etc. All portrayed in the 1800 era.

We were then off to Columbus, GA to the Civil War Naval Museum, a facility that features remnants of two Confederate States Navy vessels. It also features uniforms, equipment and weapons used by the United States (Union) Navy from the North and the Confederate States Navy (Southern /Rebel) forces. It is claimed to be the only museum in the nation that tells the story of the two navies during the Civil War. We were served lunch while at the museum.

After lunch we were headed back to Pine Mountain and The Lodge. For those that followed the directions back to the hotel we drove appx. 1 mile on an unpaved road; if you didn't have a rattle before this, I am sure you did afterwards.

On Saturday Oct. 31, on this day we drove 92.4 miles. Drivers participated in a Poker Run. Another





contest going on at the same time was the "Social Security Run" a timed event.

Our first stop was at the Wild Animal Safari. A 500-acre drive through the park with exotic animals and a petting zoo, we boarded buses and were given food to feed the animals. This was a guided tour with a history of all the animals along the







way. I must say these animals are well trained to eat out of your hand.

The animals would stand with their mouth open for you to put food in their mouths. Except for the giraffe he would stick his head in the window and give you a big kiss on the cheek or reach in food container and help himself.

While in the parking lot you could get a good idea of the cars that attended the SSR.

We ended the day with a drive through the gardens. In the spring this would have been beautiful with azaleas, forsythia



and dogwoods. Like everything this year. Since the SSR was postponed till October we settled with a light sprinkling of fall colors. Anyway, it was a nice drive.

The day ended with a banquet of great food and entertainment provided by the host club, Atlanta Region Horseless Carriage Club of America. Robert Taylor, who had been proclaimed at the start of the Social Security Runs as "Head Knocker," was honored by club with lots of memories along the way. HCCA thought since this was the last tour, they would start a "Memory Box" of items from past tours. Each tour had a theme and items from past tours were added to box. This box will be opened at an undetermined time in the future.

On Nov. 1, we were provided with a "Farewell Breakfast". Robert's daughters entertained the group with songs of past memories. All HCCA members and tour participants that had been instrumental in making the tour the success that it has been, were recognized. I guess the SSR was "Put To Rest", so to speak.

This year was an exception, we started in June 2019 and ended in November of 2020. What a year! Thanks for the memories and friendships we will share for a lifetime. The British Car Club Annual Show

Best of Show - 1936 AC 16/60 Custom Doctor's Coupe.

Well, like last year, it was threatening to be a rainout. But around sunrise, driving along the Bayway/Causeway, you could see skies clearing along the Eastern Shore, with some intermittent showers through the rest of the day. But overall it really was a beautiful day. Like 2019, some of the pre-registrants could not make it due to rain, but the SUL (stiff upperlip) prevailed over the awful weather. It will be challenging to plan in future for regional climatological changes with the global climate situation evolving as it is. Move it to November? Who knows? Not in 2021 though, I believe we have it for the 23rd (never mess with Halloween!). The National Weather Service updates 30 year "climate normal" data sets every 10 years. The currently used data are from 1981 - 2010. So we're due for another update early next year.

A unique car was brought in, a 1934 AC Doctor's Coupe. The owner (or "Caretaker" a term gaining favor in the club) said the only other one known in the world was converted decades ago, I believe with a Jaguar engine, but his was the only other known to exist, thus fulfilling the definition of "unique". That car was the Best in Show winner. It is interesting to note that custom bodies built by coach works like Hooper, Charles Worth and Tickford were common place with many British saloons, like the Daimler, Rolls Royce, Bentley, and the gigantic (for MG) MG-SA and WA saloons, prior to World War II. The AC Doctor's Coupe even had a pipe caddy with matches, on the driver's (on the right hand) side.

The AC was not the oldest. That honor went to one of the original MG Midgets, a 1930 M-Type owned by James Hester of Russellville AL. The M-Type was the first produced by the Abingdon-On-The-Thames Works to wear the octagonal MG badge after the bull nose Morris MG's (14/28, 18/80, and 18/100 Tigress) rolled off the line for the first five years of the factory. This M-Type was recently restored to its former glory.

One member brought his beautiful eye-popping Morris Special he built himself, in the "Trials - Specials and Bespoke Built Cars" class. It was displayed beside a 1974 Lola. Other first place in class winners include a Blue 1960 Austin-Healey 3000 BT7 Roadster, a Silver 1960 Austin-Healey Sprite, a White 1967 Jaguar Mark II Saloon, a Champagne 1999 Jaguar Vanden Plasa, a Blue 1954 Jaguar XK 120 OTS (Open Two Seater), an Opalescent Silver Gray 1964 Jaguar XKE FHC (Fixed Head Coupe), a Black 2004 Jaguar XK8 Convertible, a Green 1973 MG Midget, a Red 1959 MG MGA Roadster, a White 1966 MG MGB Roadster, a Primrose Yellow 1968 MG MGB Roadster, a Damask Red 1976 MG MGB Roadster, a Damask Red 1977 MG MGB Roadster Daphne AL, a British Racing Green 1966 MG MGBGT, a Red 2017 MINI Cooper, an Orange

2020 McLaren GT Coupe, Silver 1963 AC Cobra, a Red 1967 Lotus Elan DHC (Drop Head Coupe), a British Racing Green;


1935 Morgan Sports 3-Wheeler, a Green 1957 MG ZB Magnette DuoTone, a Limestone/Silver 1966 Land Rover Series 2A 109 Truck, a Green 1991 Range Rover Classic - Hunter, a Green 1965 Sunbeam Tiger Convertible, a White 1960 Triumph TR3A Roadster, a Green/Black 1961 Triumph TR4, a Powder Blue 1963 Triumph Spitfire, a Blue 1981 Mini Van, and for Restoration Class, a White 1971 Rover 3500S Saloon. In the motorcycle class a beautiful Silver 1958 Triumph Tiger 700 was displayed. We do want to see more bikes for sure, and encourage vintage British Bike Caretakers to bring their magnificent machines.

Special Awards included the Pastor's Pick-the Red 1967 Lotus Elan DHC SABCC; Diamond in the Rough, the White 1971 Rover 3500-S Saloon; Hard Luck Award the White 1995 Jaguar XJS Conv (wouldn't start); Kids' Choice the Orange 2020 McLaren GT Coupe; Longest Distance Traveled: The caretaker drove from Montevallo AL in the Blue 1956 Triumph TR3 258 miles; Best Bobby: Officer Roderick Bolden, Fairhope Police Department, Black 2018 Ford Explorer Police Cruiser (did not compete), and an "extra special" award we called "Save the Day" Award which was impromptu. We recognized Allen Bradley with a White 1958 MG ZB Magnette who restored electrical service for the catering truck.

It is indeed a pleasure to once again thank the faith community of Fairhope United Methodist Church, and Pastor Dr. Darren McClellan, to whom SABCC will be donating a portion of the show proceeds for their mission work. This has been a longstanding tradition of SABCC to assist our hosts, as they assist us.






part of tomorrow's world.

In tribute to Sean Connery, which James Bond car would you add to your dream garage?

Sitting within the pleasant confines of his aptly-named Goldeneye estate in Jamaica, Ian Fleming paused. The lead character for his first novel needed a name and, while scanning the bookshelf, his eyes--inadvertently or by fate--landed upon a book entitled Birds of the West Indies, penned by noted ornithologist James Bond. It set into motion literary history when, in 1953, that book-Casino Royale--was published. Fleming then went on to write another 14 Bond tales, three of which--The Man With the Golden Gun, and the short stories of Octopussy and The Living Daylights--were printed after his 1964 passing.

Monumental as the print series was and has since become--20 continuation novels have been authorized and authored by James Gardner (who wrote 14, published from 1981-'96), Raymond Benson (six from 1997-'02), and single novels from Sebastian Faulks (2008), Jeffery Deaver (2011), and William Boyd (2013)--the most famous British spy in history became an instant sensation on the silver screen the moment Sean Connery uttered the three most famous words in film history while playing baccarat in 1962's Dr. No: "Bond, James Bond." Connery pioneered and developed the role of Bond in From Russia with Love (1963), Goldfinger (1964), Thunderball (1965), and You Only Live Twice (1967), and returned for Diamonds Are Forever (1971), following the one-n-done appearance of George Lazenby in On Her Majesty's Secret Service (1969). Connery even came back in 1983 for the non-EON production Never Say Never Again.

n honor of Sean Connery's tenure as Bond, and as a tribute to his passing this past weekend at the age of 90, this edition of This or That offers four cars from both his films and the novels that served as their basis. Farewell, Mr. Bond.







Bond fans who are familiar with Fleming's first novel, Casino Royale, will recall that his personal car was not an Aston Martin, but rather, "One of the last of the 4½-litre Bentleys with the supercharger by Amherst Villiers, he had bought it almost new in 1933 and had kept it in careful storage through the war." Bond's Bentley made an appearance, albeit briefly, at the beginning of the second film, From Russia With Love, while Bond was courting his girlfriend, Sylvia Trench (portrayed by Eunice Gayson), whom he met at the beginning of Dr. No. Bentleys, such as this 1928 Bentley 4½-Litre, are icons of British motoring for countless reasons beyond the Bond series. According to the seller:

"It is with great pleasure that we offer this superb 1928 Bentley 4½-Litre, chassis number ST3006. This incredible W.O. Bentley is only the sixth 4½-Litre chassis built, and the first of the model to feature the now-iconic sports four-seater coachwork by Vanden Plas. A fascinating and meticulously researched report by Dr. Clare Hay reveals this car's extraordinary history, and it stands as one of the most complete and authentic 4½-Litres extant--retaining its factory original chassis, engine, gearbox, coachwork, rear axle, and numerous other components. It presents today in excellent condition, with the honest character preferred by Bentley enthusiasts, acquired through years of enjoyment and care."

"Chassis number ST3006 rides on the standard 10' 10" wheelbase chassis, and it was first registered in September of 1927, just ahead of the 4½-Litre model's official debut at the Olympia Motor Show in October. According to Dr. Hay, the factory allocated ST3006 as a works demonstrator, specified with open sports touring coachwork. The chassis record shows "Our Own Body Order," meaning it was ordered directly from Vanden Plas by Bentley Motors, and approved by the factory on completion. Elements of the handsome coachwork (body number 1408) include long wings, painted bonnet, single rear-mounted spare, and American-made Zapon fabric covering the scuttle and body. Dr. Hay believes the wings, chassis, and wheels of ST3006 were painted green, with an unknown lighter

shade used on the body. Vanden Plas' records also show the interior was in green Connolly no. 34 leather and black cotton duck fabric used for the weather equipment. Moderately popular in its day, the open sports tourer by Vanden Plas is now one of the most desirable--and most copied--bodies to grace a pre-war Bentley chassis. Images of the freshly completed ST3006 taken by Bentley's inhouse photographer Chas K. Bowers featured in the official Bentley Motors 4½-Litre catalogue. After its time in the spotlight, ST3006 was immediately put into service by the works sales department to demonstrate to dealers and clients."

"By the time it transferred to its first official private owner on June 11th, 1929, ST3006 had accrued 37,680 miles, most of which were put on by factory test driver and "Bentley Boy" Frank Clement as he toured dealers, to show off the latest offering. Factory service records during this time reveal how it returned to Works Service for an engine overhaul, decarbonizing, and an updated clutch. The first private owner was a Bentley enthusiast named H.C. Martineau of London, likely trading his 1928 61/2-Litre against this car. At various times while in Martineau's care, he brought it to the factory for a new Bluemels steering wheel (believed to be the one still on the car), Pullswell silencer and in September 1929, a new radiator from stock (No. C192), which it still wears to this day. In 1931, it received a pair of reconditioned SU "Sloper" carburetors, which, again, remain on the car."

"By August 1935, ST3006 had a new owner with Mr. G.F. Kennedy of London. It continued to receive regular service and maintenance, with factory records going all the way through 1940 when Rolls-Royce sold off the remaining spares and transferred services to McKenzies Garages. Subsequent owners are well-documented in the history report, showing the car in Britain through 1952 when it came to the States with Col. W.A. Howkins. Members of the Howkins family lovingly maintained it through 1988, when it returned to the UK with a new owner. The most recent owner acquired the car in 2001 and has continued to be a faithful steward of its remarkable history."

"Relatively early in its life, the car was repainted in its current livery of black with Bentley Green wheels. Later, the interior was reupholstered in green Connolly leather per the 1928 specification. While it is a restored car, the owners took great care to maintain as many original features as possible. The paint and coachwork are highly attractive and in excellent condition, with many of the body fittings and details dating to the 1930s. In the inspection report, Dr. Hay noted that finding the Vanden



Plas body number "1408" on seat drop plates, the spare tire triangle, rear seat spring case, and elsewhere was akin to discovering a famous artist's signature on a painting—such is the rarity of finding a genuine VdP sports tourer body. While the body upholstery has been replaced, it is very true to original specification, and it now displays a fabulously inviting patina that suits the car's road-ready character."

"Mechanically, ST3006 is both highly original and comprehensively prepared for regular use. It is a veteran of numerous rallies, including a run from Vancouver to Anchorage, Alaska, and back. It retains its original engine, original gearbox per the road-test notes, original chassis, steering box, and rear axle. Fittings like the carburetors and magnetos are also consistent with factory build and service records."



Ask what Bond was driving during his first silver screen car chase and many will answer Aston Martin. Nope. The scene took place halfway through Dr. No when Bond was being pursued by a trio of assassins (in a La Salle hearse) over a mountain road. As a "company car" had yet to be assigned to Bond, he instead was using the mysteriously-deceased Dr. Strangway's Sunbeam Alpine cabriolet, similar to this 1964 Alpine cabriolet painted--perhaps fittingly--British Racing Green. Spoiler alert: Bond escaped the clutches of the assassins and the Sunbeam survived to roll across Jamaica another day. According to the seller of this example:

"This is a rare Sunbeam Alpine Cabriolet from 1964 in the most beautiful color scheme British Racing Green with a beige interior. The car is equipped with the original 1.592cc engine and the manual gearbox. Great cabriolet to ride."



Let's put the most iconic Bond car of all time within this discussion: The Aston Martin DB5. On the silver screen, Connery's Bond used it in Goldfinger and the followup Thunderball. It didn't reappear again until Pierce Brosnan's rookie turn as James Bond in Goldeneye, and then again when current Bond actor Daniel Craig helped relaunch the series in Casino Royale. (Timothy Dalton's introduction as Bond in The Living Daylights placed him in a Aston Martin V8 Volante convertible converted into a coupe.) But in the novels, Bond didn't drive a DB5. It hadn't even been conceived yet when Goldfinger was published in 1954. Instead, Fleming placed him in the cabin of a DB III, described in the novel as having, "the advantage of an up-to-date triptyque, an inconspicuous colour--battleship grey--and certain extras which might or might not come in handy" versus the also-offered Jaguar 3.4. Thus instead, we offer Bond's original Aston DB III, similar (without extras) to this 1959 Aston Martin DB Mk III. According to the seller:

"This 1959 Aston Martin DB MK III is a stunning matching numbers car and a very strong driver just out of 25 year ownership. Retaining its original color combination of Desert White with Black Connelly leather. The ultimate and most highly refined variant of the successful Aston Martin DB2/4, the Mark III was introduced in March 1957 and produced through July 1959. One of only 551 produced. This particular example participated in the Mille Miglia in 2014 and is offered with its Heritage Certificate, original owners instruction book, and tools. The car runs and drives excellent and shows very nicely overall with lovely paint, chrome, and interior. Very straight body and solid





undercarriage. An extremely desirable and collectible late production Mk III model in factory left-hand drive form. A true gentleman's sports car offering performance, exclusivity and style. This Aston Martin DB Mk III is perfect for an owner looking for a sports car eligible for numerous events."



Let's jump ahead to Connery's last "official" appearance as Bond in Diamonds Are Forever. (Official Bond films have been produced by EON Productions since obtaining rights from Ian Fleming. Never Say Never Again, which was essentially a contemporary remake of Thunderball, managed in part by Kevin McClory. It was the only Bond film he spearheaded following a court settlement with Fleming that dated to a collaboration gone wrong in 1959-'60, the details of which can be found here.) Primarily set in Las Vegas, Bond escapes local law enforcement by driving a new Ford Mach 1 Mustang, similar to this 1971 Mach 1 Mustang. Having turned down an alley that narrows dramatically, making a car's ability to pass through to the other side by conventional means impossible, Bond ramps the Mustang onto its right-side tires, squeezes through the passage, comes out on the left-side rubber, and calmly drives away to continue his mission. According to the seller of this example:
