





NOS, OEM, or Replica Parts? Which are the Best Classic Car Components for Your Project

When restoring a classic car, no matter how old or what type of vehicle it might be, you're going to have a number of different options when choosing replacement parts. In fact, it can often be confusing to try to work through all of the choices available to you and decide which ones are the best match for the spirit (and budget) of your project.

One thing to keep in mind is that there's always a chance you'll be able to order brand new factory parts that still fit your classic, particularly if it shares its lineage with an existing model. For example, when searching for flywheel bolts for my first-generation Datsun I discovered that Nissan has used the same part on every single manual transmission car it has ever built—including the modern Z. One quick trip to the dealership and I had all the bolts I needed.



If you can't locate what you need from the factory, there are a number of different tiers when it comes to restoration parts, which come with varying degrees of quality, cost, and availability. Understanding what each type of replacement component has to offer will help you make the right decision when ordering the parts you need

New Old Stock (NOS)

Despite what the Fast and Furious franchise might have you believe, NOS doesn't just stand for the popular Nitrous Oxide Systems power adder. In the classic car world, NOS more often refers to 'New Old Stock' replacement parts.

What exactly does that mean? The origin of New Old Stock is a little convoluted: it describes official OEM parts that were ordered as 'new' back in the era in which the vehicle was in service. For whatever reason, these parts then sat on the shelf for years and years, never having been installed or used in a repair.



For many collectors, NOS parts are among the most desirable to use during a restoration. This is because they almost always offer the best combination of fit and function, given that they were designed and produced using the same tooling as the car or truck they will be installed in. Even if a third party supplier built the part in question, it was accomplished using the standards of the

NOS parts are a little like opening a time machine to the year your vehicle was built and stepping right into the service department. As such, they often command a price premium, and finding them sometimes requires a bit of luck (as certain items can be rare), as well as a willingness





to spend more cash that you might have expected.



A word of warning. Not all materials age well on the shelf, particularly rubber, nylon and plastic, which can dry up or become stiff and brittle with time. Keep this in mind when looking at NOS parts that make use of rubber seals or soft-touch interior components.

OEM Replacement Parts

In some ways, OEM replacement parts are the nextbest thing to NOS. These are parts that have been licensed by an automaker to be manufactured by a thirdparty supplier to fit in the vehicle you are restoring, and as such they come with all of the usual guarantees and protections that you'd find with a factory part.

That being said, OEM parts come with a few caveats. Car companies will often change suppliers for the same part several times of a period of years, which means components can change slightly in terms of shape, size, functionality, quality and reliability by the time they make it to the modern parts counter. There's a chance that whatever you order won't be a perfect fit for your project, and you may need to make modifications to use the part in question.



It's also true that OEM suppliers aren't in the habit of building parts that nobody wants to buy. If you own an unusual or rare vehicle, or are looking for a part that wasn't shared with many other models, you may not be able to order an OEM replacement part.

NORS

NORS parts are an unusual niche that walks the line between New Old Stock and OEM. 'New Old Replacement Stock' can be thought of as period-correct replacement parts, and are often branded by their manufacturer instead of the automaker.able to order an OEM replacement part.



They aren't quite OEM, but they would have been installed by a dealer for repairs done on a vehicle if no OEM parts were available at that time. They don't hold nearly the same cachet with collectors as NOS, and as such won't feature the same high pricing.

Replica/Reproduction/Remanufactured Parts

If NOS parts are a little too expensive and you can't find the OEM replacements you are looking for, then it's time to broaden your search to include the wild, wild west of replicas, reproductions and remanufactured parts.

Replica and reproduction parts are just what they sound like: the efforts of third-party companies to produce components that match the factory, only without all of pesky costs associated with licensing. Sometimes called 'jobber' parts, due to their popularity with budget body shops and mechanics, they will get the 'job' done, but often times have trouble matching genuine gear when it comes to fit or quality.

That being said, there are also companies out there making high-end reproductions of parts for cars that have almost no support from either the aftermarket or the factory. Navigating the world of replicas means doing your





due diligence on who is reputable and who isn't before making a purchase.

Remanufactured parts will be familiar to almost anyone who's worked on a project car. These components are refurbished versions of used parts that have been rebuilt to work like new. They come with a guarantee, and almost always require a core exchange where you send the seller the component you are replacing. They can be a very cost-effective way to repair expensive mechanical parts if you're not concerned with originality.

Used Parts

Wait, used parts in a restoration? For some projects, picking up a parts car to pick clean can often be the most cost-effective way to get a vehicle back on the road. Some items, such as trim pieces, fasteners, electrical components, and interior details can be very difficult to source any other way. The same goes for sheet metal, especially if originality is important to you.



Tapping in used parts to complete a project is never a bad idea, provided that they're in good condition and won't simply put you back at square one a few miles down the road. They're also often an affordable alternative to NOS or OEM components, particularly on more modern classics.









What Were They Thinking When They Ordered That?

As I sat in our 1988 Suburban today, the thought occurred to me, "This truck

had to be a 'special order'."

Have any others wondered about the options on their collector vehicle and wondered if it was a dealer "showroom car", "inventory stock" or a "special order"? The Suburban is a Silverado (top of the line model) but without popular accessories of a tilt column or power windows. It does have power locks. The unusual nature of these options is what made me wonder. I think most of us who have participated in restoration have changed our projects options at least in a minor way from the way they came rolling down the assembly line. I've installed factory correct dealer option air conditioning in a couple of vehicles and factory correct AM/FM radios, along with putting a power seat chassis under the original upholstery seat frames. On a minor level a rear window defogger has been added to some along with optional wheel covers and whitewall tires. They are still correct vehicles, just

not the way they were originally equipped. And, I have no problem with this. I just find it interesting.

When I ordered my new 1976 Cutlass, the dealer tried his darnedest to sell me sport mirrors and a half vinyl top as was popular at the time. It still has neither and I like it that way. When Dad ordered his 1984 top of the line Silverado Suburban, he again got it with standard little mirrors (which were not quite useless but almost) and an end gate with a manual roll up back window. By that time almost all of them had power windows and the manual is difficult to manipulate.

A couple of other oddities are two of the 1966 Impala's I own, I'm sure they were special orders (I know one was) one is a 4-door sedan with painted two tone, V8, factory air and overdrive. The other is a 2-door hardtop with 6 cylinder and overdrive.

Other unusual options are colors. In 1969 when mChevrolet brought out the highly metallic olive green, I saw a number of these with a grass green interior that clashed terribly. (They corrected this by offering a dark olive green interior in 1970.) I know my 1966 Caprice Wagon was a special order. It is black with blue interior. Not that they clash but there were better selections it could have had. It also is unusual as the only option on it is a 283 V-8 and Powerglide transmission. As long as I'm discussing colors, a friend recently purchased a 1969 Charger, silver with black vinyl top with bright blue interior. (The build sheet for this one indicates it was a special order.

So, how many other oddities are out there with RPOs (regular production orders) or SPOs (special production orders)?

25 Terms Classic Car Lovers will Understand

- Banger This term refers to the number of cylinders a car has (i.e. "4-banger") is a 4 cylinder.
- Bone-Stock This is an original car with no alterations.
- Brougham This type of car was once common and refers to a vehicle with an open chauffeur's compartment in the front and closed seating for either 2 or 4 riders in the back.
- Cabriolet This is an older term for a convertible with windows, as opposed to earlier open-top cars which did not have windows.
- Dagmar These are torpedo-like decorative elements on fenders and/or bumpers from the 1950s, sonicknamed after the busty 1950s TV personality, Dagmar.
- Digs Drag races were called digs in some circles.
- Estate Car This term refers to an early form of a station wagon, used to carry people around and to/ from large estates.
- Fade-Aways These are fenders that blend into the body of the car rather than sticking out in a pronounced bump out, first made popular with the 1941 Packard Clipper.
- Fodor This is an early term for a 4-door car.
- Four on the Floor Nickname for the 4-gear shift on

the bottom of the driver's area.

- Governor This is a regulator which controls how fast the car can be driven.
- Gull-Wing Doors -These are doors that open up instead of out, as seen in "Back to the Future" with

the time-traveling DeLorean.

- Hopped Up A car that's been modified to perform better has been "hopped up".
- Land Yachts This phrase is what really large cars from the 1950s and 1960s are often called.
- Louie This is a left hand turn.
- Mouse Motor This is the nickname for a small motor manufactured from 1955 to present by Chevy.
- OEM This is an acronym for Original Equipment
 Manufacturer. This is done to specify when repairing

or buying a car if the parts came from the source or if they were bought from an after-market maker.

- Pinstripe This is the term for a line of detailing that runs along side of the car from front to back. It was also called a "coach line" in the old days.
- Pony Car This term refers to a small car with lots of power, so named after the Mustang was released.
- Roscoe This is a slang term for a right hand turn.
- Rumble Seat This early invention was a flip down eat for 2 that could be stowed away when not in use. This back rumble seat was often uncovered, which made riding in one not as pleasant. They are sometimes also

called "mother-in-law seats".

Suicide Knobs These devices,

 to the steering
 wheel, were also
 called Brodie
 knobs after the
 near death of
 James Brodie.



These knobs were rumored to have been dangerous and illegal, but they are not illegal at all. They are also called "spinners" since they help you more effectively turn the wheel with one hand- so you can keep your arm around your date and still drive. These can be made of wood, metal, rubber, or even carved Bakelite.

- Touring Car A touring car is an open car with no side windows manufactured in the early days of the automobile industry and meant for taking in the countryside views, uninterrupted by windows or window frames.
- White Walls This phrase refers to the tires with white rubber detailing that were so popular from 1900 into the 1960s. Though they are still in production today,

you don't see them all that often in the wild.

Woody
 This is the term for car with faux wood paneling on the sides, like many of the early station wagons had.
