DSR has been asked to host a National Meet in 2005 by Patt Paquet

Buddy and I have been asked repeatedly by those AACA members who attended the South-eastern Division Tour here a couple of years ago when we were going to do another. We explain to them that we have shown them the best we have. Recently we were approached by some of the National Directors asking if DSR would consider hosting a National Meet. This was brought to the member attending the May meeting. It was the consensus that every member should be made aware of this request via the newsletter. The following will give members an idea of what this type of event entails.

A National Meet, like every other car show, has to have a date and location and it has to have several key people along with various committee chairs. The three main ones are the Meet Chairman, the Regisration Chairman and the Chief Judge. The Meet Chairman is in charge and is responsible for the meet. He/she appoints or accepts volunteers for various committee chairpersons and is responsible for seeing they are versed in their duties and can be team leaders so to speak. The Registration Chairman will receive all entries for the meet. This is done by AACA members obtaining for National Headquarters the necessary applications or via the internet. In this age of modern technology, all registrations are done on a computer with a program supplied by National Headquarters. The Chief Judge has one of the most demanding positions there is for a National Meet. He/she must be a Master Judge with a minimum of 25 National Judging Credits.

In addition, a *Chief Marshal* and his committee are necessary to handle the tow vehicle and trailer parking, motor home parking and to lay out the field on Friday before the meet on Saturday. The field is set up by class with a designated parking space for each individual vehicle. This members of this committee will assist the vehicles entering the show field and finding their parking places.

Some meets have flea markets. When a flea market is held in conjunction with a National Meet, it is important that it reflect the family oriented nature of our hobby and are in keeping with its intended purpose, i.e. to provide a source of parts, accessories or memorabilia related to the hobby. There are several other rules and regulations that come under this category. (No alcoholic beverage sale, distribution or public consumption is allowed on the Meet premises.)

A Club Merchandise Chair and committee are needed to handle the sale of AACA merchandise at the meet. This is usually Thursday afternoon, Friday and Saturday.

When possible, a Hospitality Room, either near the Registration pick-up area or in a separate room is appreciated by those attending a National Meet. It is generally open on Thursday afternoon and most of the day on Friday, closing around 4 p.m. It can be something such as water/soft drinks/punch and cookies or as elaborate as the Hospitality Chair wants it to be.

Another position is that of *Trophy Chair* and committee. This group will have their work completed close to a week ahead of the meet. The trophies will be set up on a special table for the Awards Banquet. The people on this committee will work with the person overseeing arrangements for the banquet to get the trophies in place.

It works well and relieves the Meet Chairman of a lot of work to have a **Banquet Chair** and committee. These members will be at the host hotel at whatever time deemed necessary to have table decorations, etc., in place for the Awards Banquet.

National Meets are scheduled so that the show field judging occurs on Saturday. Other events may also be planned for Thursday evening, Friday and Friday evening. These may include some sort of reception (very casual) on Thursday evening, visits to local points of interest and/or seminars on Friday morning and a Friday night hospitality party of some type. A Judging School and Member Round Table discussion are always held on Friday afternoon.

A commemorative Meet plaque (what we re-fer to as a dash plaque) is produced and given to each participant that registers a vehicle in the meet. The design is to be submitted to the Vice President of National Activities at least six months in advance of the meet.

The proposed date for DSR to host a National Meet is October 29, 2005. This may seem a long time off, but when it comes to planning an event of this nature, just like the tour we hosted, the time goes by in a hurry. Any AACA member can enter a vehicle in the Meet. There is even a class now for what is commonly referred to as "daily drivers". Every DSR member who wishes can enter his/her vehicle. You will also have the opportunity to meet many of your national officers and directors. How many times will that happen?

Discussion will be held on this issue again at the June meeting and a decision will have to be made at the July meeting. We have a hotel that is willing to work with us and a tentative location. Please make a special effort to attend these meeting to offer your thoughts.




Vol. 38, No. 6 June, 2004 Your Editor presents a compilation of the Reports from Patt Paquet and Walt Fuller

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT June. 2004



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
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DSR, AACA, Regular Meeting, held 4th Thursday of each month, except November


