Mobile car community saddened by death of fellow hobbyist and friend By Ernie Youens

Winston O. 'Junie' Jarvis, Jr., died Oct. 3, 2000 following open heart surgery performed on Friday, Sept. 22, 2000. Although the surgery was more extensive than originally anticipated, he was able to talk with his family the following day, which happened to be his eightieth birthday. The ICU of Mobile Infirmary wasn't where he'd planned to celebrate. He seemed to be recovering slowly after some "ups and downs".

The weekend prior to his death he talked with family and friends, appearing to be on the mend. Unfortunately, soon after this, his heart began to fail and he died early Tuesday morning.


Junie had met his wife, Ann, through a local church group. They were married Sept. 21, 1946. Ann grew up in Michigan where her father worked but the family eventually returned to Mobile which was their original home.

Junie and Ann have a close relationship with their five children, all of whom are married and live within four blocks of each other and their parents in a beautiful old Mobile neighborhood. His only sister, Helen Crane and her husband, E.M., live next door. Although Helen and "Ick" never had any children of their own, they have, in effect, adopted the children of Junie and Ann. The entire Jarvis family, all devout in their faith, have the family fellowship that can be envied. All this was not by accident, but was inspired and achieved by the loving kindness and encouragement of Junie and Ann.

Both Junie and Ann loved antique cars and the car club activities. They are members of both the Old South Antique Car Club and the Deep South Region AACA. They particularly liked antique car touring and are the only DSR couple that did not miss a single annual week-long tour the club used to have. According to Ann, this year would be the first time in probably 30 years that Junie didn't go to Hershey. She said that she had gone with him at least twenty of those. Traveling in their motorhome with their friends, the Fews, either leading the way or following in theirs, the trip was a much anticipated event. First Carlisle, then on to Hershey, was something the four of them enjoyed together.

Interment was at Pine Crest Cemetary with a graveside service. Junie will be sadly missed by all of Mobile's auto enthusiasts. He enjoyed being with us and was always helpful to anyone he could befriend. He truly lived his Christian religion.

Editor's Note: Lots of folks have asked how he got the nickname 'Junie'. Ann told me that was his mother's way of saying "Junior". The family used it to differentiate between he and his father. Soon everyone in the neighborhood started calling him 'Junie'. The name stayed with him all through school and a very successful business career. It was his until the day he died.

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Tips, tools and other things you auto know

Vinegar ain't just for salads:

Brush vinegar on decals, let it soak in then wash away those unwanted decals.

Soak nuts and bolts in full strength vinegar to remove rust.

Mix 1/4 cup vinegar with five gallons of hot water in container. Place in car overnight to remove smoke odor.

Clean stainless steel with a cloth dampened in vinegar.

Take the Pledge:

There has been a lot of controversy about the best product to use when cleaning and detailing plastic, vinyl and interior/exterior rubber parts. If you want a dust-free

power windows/seats/mirrors or antennas) that get dirty and eventually stop working. In many cases, removing the switches is difficult and can be expensive to replace. It has been found that proper maintenance can keep them working indefinitely. Simply spray the switch with TV tuner control cleaner/lubricant periodically. It is available from Radio Shack and other electrical supply stores. (Read label for cautions.)

Electrifying news:

When installing spark plugs, file the ground electrode's sharp edges a little to round them off. This eliminates the slivers of metal that heat faster than the rest of the plug.
