
Immediately following the breakfast I attended the Membership meeting. This membership committee meeting that I attended was extremely productive and I look forward to the ideas the group came up with. The






The New Mobilian's

News from Birmingham

I've been pretty busy up here. I was a full time intern at the Birmingham Public Library Archives for the month of January. I filed and categorized a great deal of records from the Episcopal Church of Alabama, ranging from 1927-the early 1990s. I also processed information and newspaper clippings of Harry Kerlin, an electronics fanatic that introduced and demonstrated primitive televisions in the early 1930s (1932-33).

I processed brochures advertising and showcasing early television equipment & sets along with the correspondence of Horace Grooms, a Birmingham area judge that was active in the Civil Rights Movement . During my time there, I helped date two pictures by the cars present in them. One picture was of a house designed by a local architect and had a 1937 Ford Standard sedan, due to its one tail light and windshield wiper. The other was also a house with its photo taken for a tax record. Barely visible in the corner of the foreground was the distinctive tail fin and tail light of a 1957-1958 Imperial.

I certainly impressed my supervisor, who fondly recollected his 1967 Chevy Camaro convertible that he had during his high school years in the late 1970s. I started classes full time the first week of this month. My Junior History Seminar (which I was allowed to enroll in a year early with my advisor's recommendation) has me writing a 12-15 page research paper that I formally present to the History Department in May.

The time period given to this year's class is 1865 (the year the War Between the States ended) to 1900. The topic I submitted for approval was the research the development of higher education in the State of Alabama. I intend to focus on a large white school (Auburn), a small white school (either Southern University or Spring Hill) and both of the pioneer black colleges in the state (Tuskegee & Alabama State).

My goal is to research the recovery of the two white schools after the war and the founding and early success rate of Alabama's largest historically black colleges. I'll get feedback on whether my topic is accepted or not by Tuesday, February 18.

My other classes are the study of World War II & the Holocaust, Introduction to Short Fiction, and Microeconomics 200. I was elected to be the Treasurer of BSC's Alpha Tau Omega chapter, and my term is this whole calendar year (Spring 2020 and next Fall). I haven't been able to connect with the club culture of the area too much due to always having homework or fraternity stuff to do. I hope everyone is doing well and wish to see y'all whenever I can! - David Reeves

The Continuing the Restoration Saga

In January, Darrin and I got together to discuss what to do with the 1966 GTO. The body shell and the chassis had been stored at his shop and it was time. We decided to start with the chassis and drivetrain. The chassis which I got from Art Morrison Enterprises last fall was starting to show some surface rust.



So, we borrowed Clyde Smith's trailer and Darrin brought to his garage at home.

Disassembly was a bit like Christmas with all the cool

suspension parts coming off. Zeno recommended a place for blasting and powder coating in Baldwin County called Unique Powder Coating. Again, using Clyde's trailer, I headed off to the Wilcox exit on I-10. Mike, the fellow who owns the place, said go north four miles. I did and drove right past the 12 inch x 12 inch sign on the side of the road. (I was getting concerned that I might hear banjo music ... just sayin'). When I finally got there, I was astounded at the size of this facility. It is immense.

I drove the truck and inside trailer building with lots of room to spare. There are at least 5 very large ovens for baking the powder coating. When I arrived they were removing about 15 8-foot lengths of metal fencing from one oven. My



concerns about the chassis being too large faded quickly.

They off-loaded the chassis, sub-chassis for the rear assembly, the hood and deck lid. We had loaded up the suspension parts, but brought them home as the ovens would have melted the bushings. Anyway, the guys were pretty quick in getting this job done and the next week, in very threatening weather, I



headed off to get them.

As often happens more often to me, I felt rather old and feeble as I watched

three guys pick up the chassis and load it, by hand, onto the trailer. As I pulled out of their shop, the sky opened with a vengeance. I stopped to check the straps before getting on I-10. And I got

soaked. The traffic was buzzing along at a brisk 45 mph with lots of emergency lights flashing. I had one eye on the road and one in the mirror watching the straps. Things proceeded along across the bay and through the tunnel. As I approached the DIP exit I noticed, to my horror, one of the orange straps flapping

in the breeze. Once through the intersection I carefully crossed three lanes and pulled to the side. The strap had broken, but there was enough left to



tie the chassis down onto one side of the trailer. I creeped down I-10 to Rangeline and tippy-toed (as it were) back to Darrin's. I know I looked like a drowned rat upon arrival.

So, here's a picture of the chassis. Now, as for the suspension parts, I got the pleasure of blasting them in Darrin's garage. In and of itself, not a big deal, except when you finally look behind you and there is a dust storm across the garage. A coating on the 55 Chevy, the 61 Cadillac and the worst affected item, Clyde's blue chair. Whoever had used the vacuum last had not replaced the filter. What a mess. Sand everywhere. Two trips to Lowe's later, I was vacuuming up sand everywhere except for the cars. I let Darrin clean them off.

Darrin and I had discussed what type of motor to put in the car. Initially we were thinking about a LS of some vintage but finally decided that, if we could find one, we would go back with a Pontiac 389. Fortunately, Zeno was speaking with club member Charlie Lyons and Charlie is getting ready to put an LS set up on a 1966 Pontiac Bonneville. Charlie arranged for us to buy the motor and (correct) transmission. Better yet, when they delivered the car, they drove it into the garage. It sounded great (score one for our team!).

Once again, I found I'm a good "step and fetch it" guy. As those who know him will tell you, when Darrin is on a mission, such as removing a motor and transmission then going through disassembly, get out of the way. Get him his tools, clean up the spills and do the Lowe's runs.

The By Laws

Every month we will print a section of the by laws. This is so you can review the section and bring up any discussion at our meetings to clarify or petition to change the by laws.

ARTICLE VI - MEMBERS

Section 1: Membership in the AACA is a pre-requisite for membership in this Region. A membership is hereby defined as follows: "A" Husband and wife "excluding children" and "B" An individual.

Section 2: Upon receipt of a properly executed application endorsed by a member and upon submission of a current National membership card, and one year's Regional dues, new members shall be accepted.

Section 3: Dues - The amount of dues payable to the Regional Treasurer shall be fixed by vote of the members. All payments of the dues shall be made to the Regional Treasurer. Dues are for the calendar year January 1st through December 31st. Dues for Deep South Region members who are student "Age 13-25" or Junior "Age up to 13" AACA Members will be the same as those of the National organization. DSR dues will change according to changes made by AACA for student/Junior members.

Section 4: Dues for new DSR members, joining after June 30, will one/half of Annual dues

Section 5: Termination of Membership-The membership of any Regional member may be terminated by the unanimous vote of the Executive Board for conduct unbecoming a member of AACA, or any other cause, upon giving the member in question full opportunity to hear and reply to the charges and reason for such action. Members are responsible for themselves and their family. Any member whose Regional dues are not paid the last day of February shall be dropped from the Regional roll. After March 1st in order to be reinstated, a properly executed application is required.



It's a publicity stunt, of course, but Hollywood now gives out Walk of Fame stars to vehicles as well as people, animals,



The efforts to find a sustainable replacement for gasoline precede the term "e-mobility" that currently dominates press releases in the auto industry. During the Second World War, a widespread fuel shortage led many motorists to experiment with cars and trucks that ran on wood, coal, or both.



Woodpowered
vehicles have
been around
since the auto
industry's
earliest days,
but they
didn't rise to
prominence
until the end

of the First World War. Alarmed by gas shortages during the war, many countries in Europe encouraged private companies to find a new type of fuel. Electric cars were considered, but they were ultimately deemed too impractical for an array of reasons, including the limited driving range they offered and the extra weight added by the batteries. Wood gas generators emerged as the ideal compromise.

In 1922, the Automobile Club de France organized an endurance rally open to wood gas-powered trucks. The participants needed to cover about 75 miles in two days. The technology advanced at such a rapid pace that the

following year's edition took participants on a 745-mile, 12-day trip. In 1925, the rally was 1,300 miles long and it lasted three weeks.



At its peak,


the wood gas industry attracted big names like Renault, Latil, Panhard, and Berliet. However, it soon became evident that



the system's cons outweighed its pros. Gasified trucks burned a phenomenal amount of wood, and the whole setup was incredibly heavy so it




reduced the all-important payload. At the time, the transport industry was shifting towards trucks that could drive further with heavier loads, so demand for a system that reduced both range and payload was low at best. Besides, what were the odds of another gas shortage sending shockwaves across the continent? Berliet's research and development program was one of the last still around when it shut down in 1927.




The gasifier strikes back

Wood-powered cars triumphantly returned to the automotive landscape during the Second World War. While major automakers had long given up on the technology, smaller companies had continued to invest in it and developed more compact kits that could be mounted on regular passenger cars.

The issued encountered during the 1910s and 1920s hadn't been fully solved yet, so running a woodpowered car or truck was often a last resort. Still, 12 percent of the 71,690 passenger cars registered in France in January of 1944 were equipped with a wood gas generator, and 58 percent of the 120,567 trucks accounted for used the system, according to Transports en France pendant la Guerre.





A hands-on manual published in the late 1930s named Manuel Pratique des Automobiles Gazogèneexplores the requirements of operating a wood-powered vehicle. It explains the average truck typically burned 220 pounds of wood every 62 miles, and it strongly advises against running out; filling up isn't as simple as running into the forest with an axe to chop down a

In many systems, the wood needed to be cut into chunks no bigger than three inches long and two inches in diameter. It needed to be dry, meaning it had to be




cut at least six months prior to being burned and stored out of the rain. Finally, hardwoods like birch and oak were preferable,



while resinous woods such as cypress were to be avoided.

Some of the smaller stoves fitted to burned charcoal. The advantages were that charcoal was lighter than







wood, and it was easier to store because it took up less space. However, it was much more sensitive to humidity than wood. Other wood gas systems burned a mixture of charcoal and wood, while a few were powered by anthracite. Burning any of the aforementioned materials produced a flammable syngas that replaced gasoline once it had been properly filtered and cooled.



Regardless of power source, wood gas systems primarily were made up of a stove, a cooler, a filter, and network pipes. The stove was a large, often cylindrical

component typically attached to the back of the car, though it was sometimes mounted on a separate trailer. The location of the filter and the radiator varied from system to system.

Simply bolting a wood gas generator onto the back of a car reduced the engine's output by up to 40 percent. Motorists could slash that figure by lowing the compression ratio, and they could also offset the power loss by fitting a shorter rear gear. The manual points out that wood gas-powered cars were best-suited to country driving even when they were adequately modified because their acceleration remained lackadaisical at best, and they were jerky to drive in stop-and-go traffic.

Towards extinction

Today, wood gas generators are little more than a footnote in the history of the automobile. The kits that powered cars on both sides of the pond during the war were scrapped as soon as gasoline became readily available again. Finding a car still equipped with a period wood gas generator is easier said than done, but we tracked one down in a museum-in-the-making named Provence Collection located near Draguignan in the picturesque south of France.



The car in question is a 1929 Ford Model A. Jack Wilcock, one of the museum's expert mechanics, explained the car



comes from Denmark, and it's fitted with a wood gas system manufactured by Skandinavisk Motor Co. His research revealed the kit was an expensive, high-end model. It replaces the fuel system altogether, which wasn't always the case; some cars could run either on wood gas or standard gasoline.

The wood goes into the stove that's mounted on the back of the car. The gascharged smoke produced by the chunks as they burn rises, goes down through a



layer of charcoal, and up again into a tube that runs under the car. It enters a two-in-one filter/radiator unit mounted in front of the stock, Ford-badged radiator before being routed to the cylinders through the A's stock intake manifold.

Wood is loaded through the lid on top of the stove, while charcoal is loaded through two fist-sized holes cut into the bottom part of the unit. Ash is removed through a bigger hole at the very bottom of the stove. At startup, a pipe concealed under the passenger-side running board is used to test whether the gas is pure enough to burn in the four-cylinder. This operation is dangerous because the car can belch out a massive flame.

The A is not currently running, but it was driveable about three years ago. When he started it, Wilcock remembers that it smoked so much the neighbors called the fire department because they thought the workshop was burning down. It emits less smoke as it warms up, he points out as his dad – the garage's second mechanic – proudly shows a video of the



Ford moving under its own power. It looks fascinating, to say the least. Luckily, we've been invited back to drive the Model A as soon as it's up and running again.





Happy 85th Birthday, AACA!

Did you know that AACA turns 85 years old this year? It is amazing to me that an idea had by 2 gentlemen in 1935 has turned into the club as we know it today. Without the foresight of Ted Fiala and Frank Abramson, who knows if AACA would even exist today? With a simple concept --gather folks together for the fun and enjoyment of old cars -- they created this hobby we all love so much.

Did you know that the very first issue of our beloved club magazine was published just 2 years later and was called The Bulletin of the Antique Automobile? Guess who the first editor was? Ted, of course! The sole purpose in creating the magazine was to be able to better communicate with all of the members of this new fledgling organization. Today, Antique Automobile is regarded as one of the best publications in the hobby.

During the 1940s, the club started having annual "outings" to get members to be more active in club activities. This decade also brought the club a set of official by-laws and governing documents, as well as our official colors: Packard Blue and brass. Local regions/chapters became a thing with the Illinois Region becoming the first one. The concept of

touring began with the first Glidden Tour in 1946 and our judging system emerged with a grand total of 11 classes. (Today, we have 133 classes!)

The 1950s brought us "Hershey," which is now considered to be the largest antique car show and flea market in the world. This is also when Hershey, Pennsylvania, became the permanent home of AACA National Headquarters. The '60s brought us Judging Schools. The '80s gave us Grand Nationals.

What started out with 14 founding members has continued to grow to more than 55,000 members. We've gone from one meeting a year to an average of 15 shows and tours yearly that gather our members all over the U.S. AACA is currently considered the largest antique car club in the world. In the world! I bet Ted and Frank could never have imagined how their idea would spread!

While many things have changed over the years, one thing has remained constant... this club exists to bring together anyone and everyone who loves old cars. It is our job as the stewards of this hobby to promote the club as much as possible to keep it going for as long as we can. So, raise your glass or grab a piece of cake and help us wish a very happy 85th birthday to AACA this year!




