
Christmas Lights Cruise

For the National events, Darrin and I will attend as many as we can. The two of us will be judging cars at these shows.


Whatever the new year brings, I hope you see the best in it, and enjoy your friends in this great hobby.

Well, maybe the guy who sold my husband the '71 sixpack Barracuda in the late '90s. He might regret that one,
but the rest of the people who handed over the pink slip
are perfectly happy to have the space in their garages.
I know, because I called and asked them.I couldn't get
ahold of everyone. The man who sold Tom the Charger
isn't reachable except via séance, and the Craigslist
connections that netted us the Opel GT and '93 Cummins
Turbo Diesel are long gone from our call logs. Not even
an email search of, "What's the least you would take,"
brings them up. I'm kidding, I would never. I'm more of a,

trailer," type customer.

The idea of calling folks to follow up on long-done car sales came about while pulling the brake booster on my '69 Dodge Polara. All that time spent upside-down in the footwell gave me far too good a view of the sagging headliner and peeling headrest trim, and I started to wonder if I was a bad car owner. "Do you think Ed is sorry he sold us this car?" I asked Tom, while holding the liberated booster like a proud fisherman. "I mean, he took pretty good care of it, and we basically treat it like a taxicab." Tom looked up from the back of the shop and said, "I dunno, why don't you ask him?" So I did.

Ed Walsh and I have been friends for more than 20 years. He gave me my first ride in a Hemi car, and when I needed to find a good engine builder, he suggested Tom—who was so good, I married him. So starting this project with Ed was easy. There was no need to remind him who I was or explain why I was asking. "Hey dude, are you ever sorry you sold us the Polara?"

And he said, "No. No. When I got the car, it wasn't like, 'Oh, my God, I had to have this.' It was just like, 'Oh, okay. I guess I can scrounge the money together to get it,' and when Tom said he wanted it, I was just happy it was going to a good home." That could have been the end of it, no drama, just a story about a guy who needed a daily driver, got a cheap one, and sold it when he didn't need it anymore. With classic cars though, there's always more. Why this cheap car? Where did it come from? What was its history before it became Ed's commuter?



"I think Rich found it in Sacramento," Ed started, but I stopped him. "No, no, it was Damion. Damion found it in the Auto Trader maybe?" Ed thought for a second and said I was right, our mutual friend Damion had found the car, an exact match for the green four-door Polara he already owned, only two doors cooler. He couldn't justify the ownership of two green Polaras, nor does anyone in the world have that much parking space, so he told Ed about it. Ed had been driving a hot-rodded '69 Coronet and needed something a little less ambitiously geared for daily use, so when his friend Rich offered to drive up to get the big Dodge, Ed became the second owner of a 383ci, twodoor, triple-green C-body. "The original owner was the seller's wife, who had passed, or stopped driving, I don't know which" Ed told me. "She had worked at the army depot, which is why the car has the parking pass sticker on the bumper. There was another pass in the glove box, along with the smallest pair of driving gloves I've ever seen. I was like, 'Man, how small was she?' They were like a baby's gloves. She must have been a tiny lady." It's funny in these modern times, when big SUVs get disparagingly called "mommy-mobiles," to realize that small women have driven huge cars since the beginning of automotive history. Ed had to get back to work, but he finished up by





saying that he was pleased that Tom and I had swapped the 383 for a 440. "When I think of all the low-miles C-bodies that I took 440s out of and junked, I feel bad. Until recently, those cars just weren't worth anything except as engine donors. When I got that car, people were just beginning to talk about them as collectible, or at least worth driving. Hemmings even did a story on it!" The talk with Ed made me feel better about putting all the miles on the car since we bought it, although Jeff Koch's article made me feel like I needed to apologize for the engine upgrade. I swear that once I get the brake booster back in we'll address the droopy headliner and sun-faded roof.



You think someone would regret selling this ramp truck, but life goes

It was so much fun to dig into the Polara's back-history that I started calling some of the other people who owned my cars before I did. Bobby Yowell, who now goes by Bob, was the original owner of our 1971 Dodge D700 ramp truck. It had a wild paintjob and hauled a Pro-Stock Duster with an even wilder paintjob to NHRA races. Yowell did not want it back. "I like golfing now," he told me with a laugh.

My next call was to Harold Pope, another original owner, this time of a 1970 Dodge Challenger I've had since around 2005. I've run into Harold a few times since buying his car, mostly at Mopar shows and drag races, but it took him a second to realize who I was on the phone. "I haven't sold any car in a long time," he said, sounding befuddled. "Last one was a '70 Challenger." Once I cleared up that the '70 Challenger was the car in question, he was more than happy to tell me its history. Like Ed, he picked it up because he just needed a car, his daily driven 1963 Cadillac had a blown head gasket. "Later I learned they just get loose, I could have torqued it down and kept the Coupe deVille," he said with a shrug I could hear through the phone. We all live and learn. Harold found a good trade-in deal on a Western Sport Special 318 Challenger in B7 blue with white vinyl top and interior, and drove it home. He said he always regretted not springing for at least a 340, but that the smaller small block was enough to keep the e-body moving.



Soon after purchase, Harold proposed to his girlfriend, and the Challenger took them to Las Vegas to seal the deal. "It had 1000 miles on it when we left Vegas in the evening, and two days later we were on the Alaskan Highway. So I guess it did alright." It still has the remains of a British Columbia sticker on the rear window. I've made so many changes to the Challenger since owning it that I'd forgotten several of the details of its restoration. Harold reminded me that it had several previous repairs, including a driver's side dent, "Pizza man, poor kid destroyed his truck on it. Shame, pretty truck," a passenger side door ding, "I was getting it repainted and the body shop opened the door into something," and finally, my favorite, a weldedup gas tank. "We were moving up to Sacramento, and I was towing a little trailer with my motorcycles and some furniture and it got loose and punched a hole in the gas tank. Ended up having to be pushed to the gas station by the CHP." Sounds like Harold had some funny memories of the Challenger, did he regret selling it to me? "Nah, it was just sitting there," he said, and went on to tell me about racing a dragster in the '60s which interested him more than talking about commuter cars, then and now.




My latest purchase, a 1981 Pontiac Trans Am.

My last call of the day was to a number in my phone listed as "Kiwi Steve Trans Am," who was, as you might guess, a New Zealander named Steve who I bought a Pontiac from this past summer. I was most nervous about this call, since I had no personal relationship with Steve, and he had no reason to want to talk cars with me. "Hi it's Elana I bought the Turbo Trans Am from you don't worry nothing is wrong with it I love it can I ask you a little about it?" I blurted out the second he picked up the phone. Supporting my longheld theory that New Zealanders are amongst the most chill people on the planet, Steve announced that he was only procrastinating his own work and thus had plenty of time to talk Trans Am.

What Were They Thinking When They Ordered That?

As I sat in our 1988 Suburban today, the thought occurred to me,

"This truck had to be a 'special order'."

Have any others wondered about the options on their collector vehicle and wondered if it was a dealer "showroom car", "inventory stock" or a "special order"? The Suburban is a Silverado (top of the line model) but without popular accessories of a tilt column or power windows. It does have power locks. The unusual nature of these options is what made me wonder. I think most of us who have participated in restoration have changed our projects options at least in a minor way from the way they came rolling down the assembly line. I've installed factory correct dealer option air conditioning in a couple of vehicles and factory correct AM/FM radios, along with putting a power seat chassis under the original upholstery seat frames. On a minor level a rear window defogger has been added to some along with optional wheel covers and whitewall tires. They are still correct vehicles, just not the way they were originally equipped.

And, I have no problem with this. I just find it interesting.

When I ordered my new 1976 Cutlass, the dealer tried his darnedest to sell me sport mirrors and a half vinyl top as was popular at the time. It still has neither and I like it that way. When Dad ordered his 1984 top of the line Silverado Suburban, he again got it with standard little mirrors (which were not quite useless but almost) and an end gate with a manual roll up back window. By that time almost all of them had power windows and the manual is difficult to manipulate.

A couple of other oddities are two of the 1966 Impala's I own, I'm sure they were special orders (I know one was) one is a 4-door sedan with painted two tone, V8, factory air and overdrive. The other is a 2-door hardtop with 6 cylinder and overdrive.

Other unusual options are colors. In 1969 when Chevrolet brought out the highly metallic olive green, I saw a number of these with a grass green interior that clashed terribly. (They corrected this by offering a dark olive green interior in 1970.) I know my 1966 Caprice Wagon was a special order. It is black with blue interior. Not that they clash but there were better selections it could have had. It also is unusual as the only option on it is a 283 V-8 and Powerglide transmission. As long as I'm discussing colors, a friend recently purchased a 1969 Charger, silver with black vinyl top with bright blue interior. (The build sheet for this one indicates it was a special order.

So, how many other oddities are out there with RPOs (regular production orders) or SPOs (special production orders)?




