



### Who Invented the Automobile?

# 1769 – Nicolas-Joseph Cugnot builds the first self-propelled

road vehicle in France.

Humans have been thinking about different ways to travel for thousands of years. As time has gone on, we have devised increasingly more effective and efficient methods of travel. The automobile made a dramatic change in the way people live and travel. There is not a simple answer to the question of who invented the automobile and when. It has been a work in progress, developing over the past several hundred years. To better understand the history of the automobile, it is going to be helpful to look at a time line and see how all the pieces fit together. The following months will describe the invention of the automobile and its development with a focus on American automobiles in the twentieth century.


During the next few months I/we will present how the automobile was invented. The sources for this information are listed at the end of the article. - Charlotte

By definition an automobile or car is a wheeled vehicle that carries its own motor and transports passengers. The automobile as we know it was not invented in a single day by a single inventor. The history of the automobile reflects an evolution that took place worldwide.

It is estimated that over 100,000 patents created the modern automobile. You can point to the many firsts that occurred along the way to producing the modern car; and with that goal in mind, highlighted below are articles, biographies, timelines, and photo galleries related to the history of the automobile and its many inventors.

The automobile as we know it was not invented in a single day by a single inventor. The history of the automobile reflects an evolution that took place worldwide. It is estimated that over 100,000 patents created the modern automobile.

French Army Captain Cugnot was one of the first to successfully employ a device for converting the reciprocating motion of a steam piston into a rotary motion

by means of a ratchet arrangement. A small version of his three-wheeled fardier à vapeur ("steam dray") was made and used in 1769 (a fardier was a massively built two-wheeled horse-drawn cart for transporting very heavy equipment, such as cannon barrels).

The vehicle had to stop every ten to fifteen minutes to build up steam power. The steam engine and boiler were separate from the rest of the vehicle and placed in the front (see engraving above). The following year (1770), Cugnot built a steam-powered tricycle that carried four passengers.

In 1770, a full-size version of the fardier à vapeur was built, specified to be able to carry four tons and cover two lieues 4.8 miles in one hour, a performance it never achieved in practice. The vehicle weighed about 2.5 tones tare, and had two wheels at the rear and one in the front where the horses would normally have been. The front wheel supported a steam boiler and driving mechanism. The power unit was articulated to the "trailer", and was steered from there by means of a double handle arrangement. One source states that it seated four passengers and moved at a speed of 2.25 miles per hour (.

The vehicle was reported to have been very unstable owing to poor weight distribution, a serious disadvantage for a vehicle intended to be able to traverse rough terrain and climb steep hills. In addition, boiler performance was also particularly poor, even by the standards of the day. The vehicle's fire needed to be relit, and its steam raised again, every quarter of an hour or so, which considerably reduced its overall speed and distance.

After running small number of trials, variously described as being between Paris and Vincennes and at Meudon, the project was abandoned. This ended the French

Army's first experiment with mechanical vehicles. Even so, in 1772, King Louis XV granted Cugnot a pension of 600 livres a year for his innovative work, and the experiment was judged interesting enough for the fardier to be kept at the arsenal. In 1800 it was transferred to the Conservatoire National des Arts et Métiers, where it can still be seen today.

241 years later, in 2010, a copy of the "fardier de Cugnot" was built by pupils at the Arts et Métiers ParisTech, a French Grande école, and the city of Void-Vacon. This replica worked perfectly, proving that the concept was viable and verifying the truth and results of the 1769 tests.

This replica was exhibited at the 2010 Paris Motor Show. It is now exhibited in Cugnot's native village of Void-Vacon, Meuse.

Historians, who accept that early steampowered road vehicles were automobiles, feel that Nicolas Cugnot was the inventor of the first automobile.

And historians, who accept that early steam-powered road vehicles were technically automobiles often consider Nicolas Cugnot to be the inventor of the first automobile

There are reports of a minor incident in 1771, when the second prototype vehicle is said to have accidentally knocked down a brick or stone wall, either that of a Paris garden or part of the Paris Arsenal walls, in perhaps the first known automobile accident. The incident is unrecorded in contemporary accounts, first appearing in 1804, thirtythree years after the alleged accident. Nevertheless, the story persists that Cugnot was arrested and convicted of dangerous driving, another first for him if true. This however was not the end to the steam engine.

## If You Don't Like Change, Try Extinction

In the three years I have been fortunate to serve on the AACA Board of Directors, I have spoken with or traded e-mails and letters with many AACA members and officers of AACA

regions & chapters. Many of those conversations focused on the challenges faced by our regions & chapters (and almost all clubs in general)—declining membership and difficulty in attracting new members, especially younger members. When I've spoken with region/chapter presidents about their club possibly hosting a future AACA Nationals or National Tour, the answers I received were frequently the same: "Our region/chapter is too small;" "Our members are too old;" and "It's too much work and we don't have enough people willing to help." (Unfortunately, I've also heard some region/chapter presidents say "I've been president for years because I can't get anyone else to step up to the responsibility, and I'm tired of doing it"—but that's a topic for another article.)

The common factor in all of these challenges is the unwillingness of many regions, chapters, and members to change and do the things necessary to attract new members. They don't want to change what they're doing and are unwilling to add new activities. The problem with this is that if they don't change, their region or chapter will slowly atrophy and eventually disband as its members pass away or leave because they're not having fun. What's the old saying? "The definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting a different result." One of my former commanders (in the Air Force) put it more bluntly: "If you don't like change, trv extinction."

So, what can our regions & chapters do to prevent extinction?

1) The first thing you can do is reach out to AACA national directors that can help you. We're all here to support our regions/chapters and members however we can, but the first ones you should reach out to are the Vice President of Membership (currently Fred Trusty) and the Vice Presidents of Regions Development & Support (currently Chester Robertson for the Central Division, Paula Ruby for the Eastern Division, Jeff Oaks for the Southeastern Division, and Myron Smith for the Western Division).

2) The second thing is you need to have fun activities to energize your current members and help attract new

ones. If the only monthly activity you have is a dinner meeting at the local Golden Corral or Denny's—especially if you don't have an interesting guest speaker—you're in trouble (and unlikely to attract younger members). Everyone has different interests, different things they like to do, so try to add a variety of activities throughout the year so every member (and spouse/significant other) can find something they'd enjoy doing. Keep holding those dinner meetings—they're a great way for members to connect and for you to provide them important information—but also plan some short cruises/tours, hold cruise-ins, hold an annual show or swap meet, plan group visits to museums, parks, or other historic or interesting sites, organize an overnight weekend driving tour, etc.

3) You need to bring in new members. Membership is a contact sport. People who might be interested in joining your region/chapter and the AACA are not going to track you down—a few might, but not many. If you want new members, you need to seek them out and take every opportunity to approach possible new members: when someone comes up to look at your antique vehicle at a local car show or when you're filling it up at the gas station, talk to them, ask if they've heard of the AACA, and invite them to one of your upcoming region/chapter activities. Set up a membership tent (and staff it with your most outgoing members who will grab people as they go by and talk to them) at your car show, cruisein, or swap meet. Set up a membership table at local cruise-ins and car shows, and, if you have a local new car show, see if the organizers will let you display some AACA cars and have a membership table. Don't forget to use the four free 1-year memberships sent in the fall to every region/ chapter president (and if you need more, you can request them from AACA Headquarters) and the free 1-year membership offered to every military veteran under the Military Sponsorship Program (available on the AACA website under the membership tab or from AACA HQ).

4) Host an AACA National Activity. As strange as it may sound, one of the best ways to jump start your region/ chapter—energize your current members and attract new ones—is by hosting an AACA national activity.

A number of AACA regions/chapters, with the common concerns of being too small and/or too old, have hosted an AACA Nationals or National Tour and seen their members get more involved in the region/chapter, be excited and proud about their club hosting the show or tour, and seen membership grow as they attracted new members to help with the show and others join after the show because they enjoyed it and found out about the AACA and the region/chapter. (It's hard to believe, but many people—even people who own and love antique vehicles—have never heard of the AACA.)

If your region/chapter is aging and slowly dying through the attrition of members, take a look at what you're doing and implement some changes to reverse the trend. Yes, change is hard and sometimes uncomfortable initially. However, if you don't like change, try extinction.





# This One Car Is All That's Left of an Early 20th Century Michigan Automaker - Meet the final Alpena Flyer.

The small northern Michigan town of Alpena is known as a vacation destination today, but in 1911 it was home to a small car company. The Alpena Motor Car Company was one of many firms in the early 20th Century that jumped into the automobile business and–like most of them–it has long since been forgotten. However, of the several hundred cars built by Alpena Motor Car, just one spectacular example survives, and it is on display in Alpena at the Besser Museum.

The Alpena Motor Car Company was founded in 1910 with plans to begin production the next year. As with many automobile startups, founders issued optimistic numbers for expected production. They told the press they would build two models and hoped to be producing 3,000 cars a year in the near future. Advertisements for the car touted its "wonderful, silent, powerful and efficient motor," where everything was enclosed "including valves." In fact, the engine was "troubleless."

The factory employed 70 workers and new Alpena Flyers began shipping to customers in 1911. Prices ranged from \$1,450 to \$1,600. Later models would include small variations and different engine choices. While there is a lot of information on the cars available in newspaper articles and advertisements, there is a shortage of the actual cars themselves these days.

Ron Winter set out to find a Flyer a few years ago and located a basket case. It was little more than a frame and an assortment of loose parts. But since a better example couldn't be found, Winter bought it and brought it to Restorations Unlimited II to have it restored. They saved the parts they could and fabricated some parts that were missing. It took them nine years but the finished product is what you see here: A Brass Era car that looks like it rolled out of the factory yesterday, even though it is over 100 years old.

This example is a 1911 Standard Touring Alpena Flyer. It is "Dark Royal Blue," the only color the Flyers came in that year. It is powered by a 33-horsepower 4-cylinder Northway engine and is right-hand drive, which was common at the time.

Alpena Motor Car ran into legal and financial problems shortly after this car was first built. In 1912, the company was sued for patent infringement over its suspension design. We don't know the actual outcome of the case but a cash shortage followed and the company was insolvent by 1914. Production figures are sketchy but the company probably did not make more than 1,000 cars during its brief existence. A few hundred is probably a more reasonable estimate. And until someone finds another example, the only one you can see today is this one, home again in Alpena.
