
# Lions and Tigers and Storms"Oh My"

As talks progressed so did the plans to participate in a future Great Race. Darrin and Sam began looking for the perfect car. While every car they came in contact with

Big Red made her way to Mobile, Alabama, in November of 2019. Darrin spent many hours going over the Cadillac listing what would make it road worthy for the 2020 Great Race. Items to be repaired were listed on a whiteboard that hangs in the garage. These items have slowly been crossed off. Test runs around the city and county became the norm.

Finally, it became official! Team Alabama and Big Red were registered in the 2020 Great Race starting in San Antonio, TX and ending in Greenville, SC. The event would be June 20-28, 2020. Darrin Dahlenburg would drive, Sam Barnett would navigate and Paul Dagenais and Charlotte Dahlenburg would be the support crew. The car was then

The car was driven around Mobile to key car shows and cruise-ins to create the excitement needed to round up sponsors for the race. Then the world came to a STOP. On May 7, 2020 it was announced that the race would be postponed until August 22-30, 2020, with a limited field and many of restrictions to provide safety for the teams.



# Who Invented the Automobile?


# 1789 – American Oliver Evans receives the first US patent for a steam-powered land vehicle.

Humans have been thinking about different ways to travel for thousands of years. As time has gone on, we have devised increasingly more effective and efficient methods of travel. The automobile made a dramatic change in the way people live and travel. There is not a simple answer to the question of who invented the automobile and when. It has been a work in progress, developing over the past several hundred years. To better understand the history of the automobile, it is going to be helpful to look at a time line and see how all the pieces fit together. The following months will describe the invention of the automobile and its development with a focus on American automobiles in the twentieth century.


During the next few months I/we will present how the automobile was invented. The sources for this information are listed at the end of the article. - Charlotte

The exact year that the fertile imagination of Oliver Evans first spawned the idea of a land vehicle propelled without the use of horses is unknown. However, as early as 1773, he wrote that, "There are witnesses living, to whom I communicated my intentions of applying my improved Steam Engine to propel carriages."

Evans was apprenticed to a wheelwright at the age of 16. Observing the trick of a blacksmith's boy who used the propellant force of steam in a gun, he began to investigate ways to harness steam for propulsion. Before he could successfully pursue this line of research, however, he became involved with a number of other industrial problems. Carding, or combing, fibres to prepare them for spinning was a laborious process constituting a bottleneck in the newly mechanized production of textiles. To speed this operation Evans

invented a machine that cut and mounted 1,000 wire teeth per minute on leather, the teeth serving as an improved carding device.

In 1784, at the age of 29, he attacked another major industrial production problem, the age-old process of grinding grain.

In 1782, Evans and two of his brothers purchased part of their father's farm in Red Clay Creek, DE, to build a grain mill. At the time, the process of grinding grain and processing wheat into flour was a time consuming and unsanitary method. The process was extremely handlabor intensive and the flour was often dirty as a result. Evans' idea was to harness the energy of a water-wheel to connect the milling process into one continuous system, moving the grain and flower both horizontally and vertically through the mill automatically without hand labor. Over the course of seven years, he developed and perfected five machines that, together, formed a production line that enabled a single worker to perform the work of five, processing 300 bushels of grain per hour. His efforts were recognized by George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, who both commissioned Evans to install a similar system in their mills.

The Revolutionary War served as only a temporary distraction for Oliver's growing obsession with creating a steam powered carriage. On May 19, 1787 he displayed a working model, and submitted plans as well as drawings, to the Maryland House of Delegates.





However, even though a patent was approved shortly after, Oliver was not alone in his quest to sever the limitations imposed upon man by Dobbins. Isaac Briggs, John Fitch, James Rumsey, Nathan Read, and John Stevens, to name but a few, were engaged in similar pursuits.

With the establishment of the United States Patent Office all states were required to relinquish all patents and inventors were compelled to reapply. Inventor Nathan Read of Warren, Massachusetts, a professor at Harvard, as well as member of Congress and judge, submitted the first American patent for a self propelled vehicle.

As an interesting historic footnote, the patent was approved on August 26, 1791. The approving signatures are Thomas Jefferson and George Washington.

A few years later, working off a patent granted in 1789, Evans produced an amphibious steam-powered wagon in 1804 called the Oruktor Amphibilos, or "amphibious Digger," that was built on commission from the Philadelphia Board of Health. The vehicle was a 17-ton, high-pressure steam-powered dredge designed to deepen the Delaware River dock area. In doing so, he was able to finally demonstrate the utility of his high-pressure steam engine.

Ironically, the Oruktor Amphibolos was hardly a success. Evans claimed that it was the first self-powered land vehicle in the United States, as well as the first self-powered amphibious vehicle. However, no technical drawings or evidence have survived that support Evans' claims to the invention outside of his own documents. Many of which are known to have contradictions and exaggerations on the dredge's design process.

Funny enough, Evans did successfully predict that the United States would eventually become connected by a network of railroads. He also wrote up proposals for mechanical road vehicles but couldn't get the financial backing from skeptical investors.

He may have had a passion for patenting his inventions, but one that he'd failed to patent was the design for the first refrigeration machine. His design operated using vapor, rather than previous versions that used liquid refrigerant for cooling. The design was later modified and patented by Jacob Perkins in 1834.

Still it was Evans that stood at the forefront of development and technological breakthrough. By 1792, he had built and tested horizontal and vertical reciprocating engines, and developed a revolutionary

boiler.

The poison for most visionary minds is rejection and that was in ample supply when it came to steam powered vehicles in the closing years of the 18th century. Nathan Read displayed a crude prototype to the Secretary of Defense and Secretary of War but they vetoed the idea of committing government funds to research and development.

By 1830 a veritable explosion in development of steam powered "road wagons", and other experimentation, led the U.S. Congress to initiate feasibility studies, as well as discuss possible taxation and regulation. A new age was dawning.

Oliver Evans died of a stroke upon hearing that his beloved workshop had burned to the ground at the age of 63.

In the 1840s, research and development into electric motors added a new wrinkle to the self propelled vehicle debate that had proponents for the use of steam, compressed air, and various gases. It was Moses G. Farmer, in 1847 that first developed an operational prototype using electric motors applied to the wheels.

As the world stood poised with one foot on the throttle and one in the stirrup, the fascination with the automobile unleashed a torrent of eccentrics and charlatans. Perhaps the most intriguing manifestations of the former were the creations crafted by proponents of spring powered vehicles, as in spring powered like a watch.

Hap, short for Harold, was a character who would rival any junkyard dog with his green and white checkered pants and red and white striped shirt (yes, both worn at the same time) he was a sight to behold. In the upper level of the barn sat a long forgotten early solid tire truck covered with all sorts of car parts. You could easily have walked past it. I didn't! Turns out it was a 1914 Hahn Huckster truck, which I still own. Hap named a price, I countered. Hap liked to flip coins – yes, I lost, but would have paid his price anyway.

Both Hap and the yard are long gone, but my memories of those frequent treks though that yard seem like yesterday. A housing development now sits on that hallowed ground. That is where all the junkyards have gone!

# **Tri-Five Trivia Every Enthusiast Should Know**

If you're reading this, you're probably a loyal classic Chevy fan, and you love the Tri-Five family. This group of automobiles falls into a class of their own. Here are some fun facts you may not already know about the Tri-Five.



The 1955 Bel Air weighed over 3,400lbs and was over 15 feet long.



The 265 V8 introduced in the 1955 Tri-Five became one of Chevy's most legendary engines and their first ever small block

V8. This engine remained in production in various forms for decades to follow thanks to its lively performance and easy to modify nature. It's estimated that more than 90 million engines of this type were manufactured, making it one of the most popular engines of all time.



The 1955-1957 year range represented a lot of effort by GM. They spent a million dollars in 1956 alone because they wanted to make the Bel Air look like the more expensive Cadillacs. The result was extravagant body lines, Cadillac-inspired bumper guards, and tail fins.



The base Chevy 150 models started around \$1,600 and came with a six cylinder engine.





The 150 series vehicles were produced as fleet vehicles and not marketed toward the average car buyer (though someone could purchase one if they were more economically minded). This series was outsold by the 210 and Bel Air every year it was available.



The introduction of the optional 265 cubic inch V8 and power glide automatic earned the 1955 model the nickname "The Hot One".

Oil filters were optional during the first production year.



Radios were also completely optional during the Tri-Five era. According the Internet Movie Cars Database, the Bel Air is a real star. It has recorded 2,109 major or minor Bel Air appearances in films.



The Nomad was introduced mid year in 1955 and was unique in its class since it was a two door station wagon instead of the typical four doors.



Although largely a carry-over model, sales soared in 1956, especially for Bel Air models. This is thanks to the popular V8 introduced in the prior year.

1956 Bel Airs had hidden gas caps -they were behind the driver's side taillight!



Tri-Five buyers had the option to add an electric shaver to their car. They could choose from three different brands that had 12V plug-ins. This allowed people to shave while driving or sitting in traffic.



Another stranger dealer installed option was the vacuum ashtray. Featured in the 1956-1960 accessory catalog, this sucked cigarettes and ashes in. The trash is then stored in a





special cylinder for later disposal.



The 1957 Nomad is the rarest Tri Five. Only about 6,500 were sold.



There were many different interior colors available through

the years. For example, the 1957 Bel Air had 10 different interior color combination possibilities. In addition, there were 23 different seat and door trim options.



Seven different V8s were available in 1957. One of the options was the legendary "Super Turbo Fire V8" which produced 283 horsepower thanks to continuous fuel injection. A vehicle with this option is rare since most Tri Fives were fitted with a two or four barrel carburetor.

In 1957, Ford outsold Chevy for the first time in years; however, the 1957 Bel Air is now one of the most sought after collectibles ever made. A 1957 Bel Air holds an average value of \$33,100 while a 1959 Ford Galaxie has an average value of only \$7,100.
