



March was a busy month for the Mac family. The Anglia was suffering badly from rot and, being a unibody car with rust a good way through the rear leaf spring supports as well as the support beam between each leaf spring, it was becoming a danger to drive.

Three years ago, I placed an order through Ex-Pressed Steel and waited patiently for the 2 rear leaf spring supports, the support beam between them, the rear valence section under the rear bumper (it was bent from previous wrecks prior to my ownership in my teen years, FYI), the two rear lower quarter panels and both door skins to arrive. Approximately 5 months later, I received the parts and arranged for someone to work on the car.

The Anglia was to be delivered to him on March 28, 2020. But it turns out that was two weeks after Alabama locked down for Covid. It was agreed to

but was held at St. Mary Magdalen, in Metairie, LA. After a 2 year hiatus from the Pandemic, it was hip, hooray for the British Motoring Club of New Orleans! They had a self contained catering operation going with jambalaya, burgers, hot dogs, cooked by the



great folks there.

The most fascinating car to me was this 1931 Austin Seven, 91 years old and still chuggin'! Well it happens with people too! This car ran like a Singer sewing machine!

Small Saloons: 1959 Mini Cooper; 1953-1968 MG Magnette. The Magnette was manufactured in two build series, the ZA and ZB of 1953 through to 1958;







based on the MGA chassis. The one to the right is based on the Mark III and IV 1959-1968, using a modified Wolseley body and an Austin 1100cc engine. MG Cars had previously used the Magnette name on their K-type and N-type models in their 1930s racing days.



MGA's 1956-1962. Regret no Twin Cams there...a BMCNO member sold his some years back.

Beautiful bikes too! This Triumph is, I believe, a 650 cc, 1969 or 1970 if I recall correctly.



No data tag...I think this is a late 40s or early 50s Ariel Red Hunter. Had a 500cc cast iron engine.

Lotus Europa (1966–1975) By the mid-1960s, the mid-engine vehicle configuration was well-established as the optimal design for Grand Prix



cars, however almost no road vehicles yet used this arrangement. Lotus planned the Europa to be a volume-produced, two-seater mid-engine coupe built to reasonable cost. Lotus cars were designed and built following Colin Chapman's philosophy of automotive



design: "Simplify, then add lightness". Many of these, especially the Elan (as driven by the late Diana Rigg in "The Avengers") were around 1,200 lb.

A Jensen Interceptor is behind the Europa. Considerably heavier

Race prepared Triumph Spitfire, a Caterham whose



design follows the Lotus Seven. That car originated in the 1950s as a simple, lightweight open two seater continued in production into the early 70s. Lotus then sold the rights to produce the Seven to Caterham, which has continued to build them since. - Brian Daly

# Land Rover Celebrates 60 Years of James Bond with Rally Defender

To celebrate six decades of the storied and uber-British James Bond franchise, Land Rover entered a Bond-themed rally-prepped Defender 90 into subsidiary Bowler's 2022 Bowler Defender Challenge. The first stage of the rally was driven by - and won by - Bond stunt driver and three-time British Rally Champion Mark Higgins.

The Defender is built by Bowler, the rally firm that Land Rover bought out of bankruptcy in 2019. They've integrated them into the Special Vehicles Division and already started to heavily Bowlerize new Defenders for race use.

The Bowler Defender Challenge is the first race series to use these vehicles. Built on the 4-cylinder 300PS gasoline model, the cars are tweaked and prodded into race cars, complete with strippedout interiors, exhaust and cooling enhancements, modified suspension and subframes, and roll cages.

There are 12 competitors in the Challenge, ranging from veteran rally drivers like Higgins to total (but financially comfortable) newbies. There will be seven races across Britain this year in the first iteration of the trophy, the first of which was held at Dollegau, Wales - won by Higgins, alongside co-driver Claire Williams. The Challenge is designed as a feeder for major international rally events, including the iconic







Dakar Rally (which is now held in Saudi Arabia).

The Bond edition Challenge Defender is a one-off to celebrate the franchise, and it's decked in a special, simple satin black-and-gold livery, which reflects the iconic opening scenes and movie posters. There's also the special Bond 60th logo on the roof and sides.

The hood is where the Bond geeks will really love it though – with the logo for each of the films in gold covering the entire surface. Ten of the twenty-five films produced by Eon Productions have featured a Land Rover, starting with the Range Rover Classic convertible in 1983's Octopussy. Land Rover's connection has only strengthened in recent years, with JLR and Aston Martin working together to take up the mantle of Britishness in grand style in the Daniel Craig era.

The Bond Defender will race throughout 2022 in the Bowler Defender Challenge, so keep an eye on the British rallying scene to see it tearing through the moors. If it seems like something out of a Bond movie, it's probably because the guy driving it drove one on screen!



Below are six categories that make up the core categorizations representing a large percentage of multi-marque collector cars within our hobby.

Antique - Generic term used for all autos built before 1925. Horseless Carriage: A term used to describe very early autos built at, or before the turn of the century, characterized by very slender, tall wheels and carriage-like appearance. Brass Era: Autos built 1914 and earlier, so-called for the abundant use of brass in the production process (radiator, headlights, horn, sidelights, etc.). Nickel Era: This bridges the gap between the use of brass and chrome on autos during the period from 1915 to 1928.

Classic - The term "classic" is the most overused term in the car hobby. Officially, it is a label used by the CCCA (Classic Car Club of America) to identify "fine or unusual foreign or domestic motorcars built between and including the years 1925 and 1948, distinguished for their respective fine design, high engineering standards and superior workmanship.

Hot Rod - Originally this term was used to describe the practice of taking an old, cheap car, removing weight (usually by removing roof, hood, bumpers, windscreen and fenders), lower it, change or tune the engine to give more power, add fat wheels for traction and paint it to make itstand out. **Street Rod** - In the 1970s hot rodders tried to clean up their reputation and thus started to use the term 'street rod' instead of "Roadster" or "Hotrod". An ingeniously simple idea re-born.

**Sports Cars** - or sports car, is a small, usually two-seater, two-door automobile designed for spirited performance and nimble handling. The term "sports car" was used in The Times, London in 1919. According to USA's Merriam Webster dictionary, USA's first known use of the term was in 1928. Sports cars started to become popular during the 1920s. In the postwar era, a "sports car" is most any car that seats two, can have a hard or soft top, and could be used for competition.

Production Car/25 Years or Older - This is a term used by the AACA to cover cars 25 years old or older that don't necessarily fall into categories such as Antique, Classic or Hot Rod and primarily deals with postwar collector cars.

**Muscle Car:** These are mid-sized cars built from 1964 to 1973 and characterized by large displacement, high horse-power engines. They came factory direct to dealers with the largest engines available from the manufacturer.

**Pony Car:** A term originally used to describe the Ford Mustang, but later used to describe all cars built that would compete with the Mustang such as AMX, Barracuda, Camaro, Firebird, etc.).

**Special Interest:** A "catch-all" category for a car of any age that has collectible attributes but is not covered by any of the preceding categories. This would include late model cars with enthusiast appeal (Buick Reatta, Cadillac Allante, and Dodge Viper), or extremely low-mileage or well-cared-for cars that normally wouldn't be collected.

Well, there you have it. If your car doesn't fit in any of the above-mentioned classifications, the only option left to consider;

**Used Car** - A car that is basically used as reliable transportation.



The American Symbol of Freedom - 1920s Automobiles If there was one thing that shaped the 1920s that gets too little credit, it is the 20s cars. For the first time regular people could go where they wanted, when they wanted, without need of a horse.

From the files of "WTF? 1920s pop culture" People did a lot of weird stuff to get in the news in the Roaring 20s.


Because of cameras these spectacles are readily available for us to laugh at.
