The 2022 AACA Zenith Awards, an experience to remember!

Craig and Debbie Henry were extremely honored to attend the Antique Automobile Association of America Zenith Awards and Grand Nationals event on May 20-21, 2022, in Virginia Beach, VA.

Our 1934 Packard Series 1107 Twelve Club Sedan was found worthy by the AACA Zenith Award Team to receive the highly coveted Zenith Award on May 20, 2022. The following is an excerpt from the AACA award notification.

"The award is called the AACA Zenith Award, and it will be given out for the sixth time at our Grand Nationals in Virginia Beach, Virginia, May 20, 2022.------We wish to advise you that out of the 2,500 plus vehicles shown in 2021 at the national AACA meets your 1934 Packard, AACA Vehicle number 36563 has been selected to compete for the Zenith Award for 2022. You can be justifiably proud of this great accomplishment as it recognizes your vehicle as on the finest in the world."

We arrived early to the Hilton Tapestry Founders Inn in Virginia Beach. Despite the 5 prior week's detailing "Teddy" named by Debbie, we wanted to have plenty of time to get the "spit polishing" done before the Zenith judging began on Friday. Debbie named the '34 Teddy because it's color is Roosevelt Maroon. No one knew what cars had been selected for the Zenith Award, but we knew

they would all be memorable examples of hard work and investment to make them worthy of participating in such a special event.

The judging was held in a large tent located on a tennis court surrounded by a tall chain link fence. There was no entrance wide enough thru the fence. But by Friday morning the resort maintenance team got the

tent ready, and cars began to roll in on Thursday. We got our Packard positioned in the tent and were the 10th car to arrive. We were a bit apprehensive getting our wide turning Packard into the tent since it was a bit tight for 13 cars. It then became clear the competition for the "top restoration prize" was going to be very competitive as we studied the following fine cars; 1912 Cadillac Torpedo, 1925 Moon Series A Roadster, 1928 Auburn 8-115, 1929 Du Pont Model G by Merrimac, 1947 Ford Super Deluxe Sportsman Convertible, 1956 Studebaker Pinehurst, 1958 Pontiac Bonneville, 1963 Ford Thunderbird Sports Roadster, 1964 Studebaker Daytona, 1966 Ford Shelby, 1969 Pontiac GTO Judge, and a 1973 AMC Javelin.

Everyone was in the tent polishing their cars and checking for any detracting issues on Thursday and early Friday morning. Adding to the polishing challenge was

the continuous flow of pollen from the foliage leafing out. On judging day, the temperature rose from 78F on Thursday to 94F on Friday. Shade from the tent was greatly appreciated. Judging began promptly on Friday morning. Steven Moskowitz, Chief Judge, AACA Senior Master Judge and CEO of AACA introduced the esteemed team of master judges and explained that each car would be judged by two teams. The first round ended about noon and then after lunch the second team came around to complete their judging task. All the judges were so gracious and displayed a wonderful interest in how each car arrived in its current condition for the Zenith Award. The Zenith Award booklet and the special individual sign produced by AACA was excellent and very informative for everyone. As we visited the other cars and learned their history and saw some of the excellent documentation characterizing their restoration story, we quickly began to guess which car was the "best"! At 4pm on Friday, Steve Moskowitz announced each car and its owner as the lovely crystal spire trophy was awarded by Wayne Tuck, AACA President. All of us were anxious and hopeful that our car would be the last announced to achieve the top Zenith Award for 2022. As you probably know now, the, 1929 DuPont Model G by Merrimac owned by Lammot





Some Psalms - From "The Sussex Patrol"




Exclusive to the Deep South Region





Membership Corner: The Allure of Tours

Your membership in AACA is what you make of it. Maybe you are a member who has spent years restoring an old barn find and love to show off your labor of love at car shows and win lots of awards. Maybe you are a member whose pride and joy is your daily driver that you like to "show off" in the grocery store parking lot or at the corner gas station. Maybe you are a member who doesn't own an antique car right now but loves reading Antique Automobile magazine and strolling through local cruise-ins. Or maybe you are a member who just loves to go on car tours.

If you're a veteran tour person, you know them, you love them and you can't wait until the next one. For those of you who are not that familiar with touring, hopefully this information will serve as a good introduction to this part of our beloved hobby.

There are many themed tours that take place throughout the year. The question most asked is what rally or tour best fits your interests and what do you need to know to participate? If you're not sure, here's some tour definitions to guide you in the right direction.

Ecorted Group Tours: There are usually around 20 cars on an escorted group tour. These are small groups so everyone can meet, chat and get to know each other. In most cases you stay in some beautiful hotels, often the smaller, country house hotels, etc. Each car has a route book, which has detailed written directions, route maps, hotel information, recommended places for coffee/lunch, and everything there is to do, see and visit each day.

Independent Tours: Some groups offer tour books for purchase, which allows you to enjoy a driving experience independently, without the hassle and guesswork of organizing a group. Just use the information provided, book the hotels (all with suitable parking), and enjoy the routes – knowing you're going to be driving fabulous roads through beautiful scenery, while staying in some glorious places.

Hub Tours: Hub tours are tours that use one primary location designated as the base or center of the tour. Your tour will use this location and travel back and forth to selected attractions usually within an hour or two from the hub location.

Progressive Tours: Progressive tours are tours that move from one location to another such as city to city or state to state. You check in to and out of new hotels throughout the length of the tour. The era of cars on the tour will dedicate the daily miles driven. Older cars usually stay around 200 miles per day while newer cars can go 300-400 miles per day.

Rallies Classification: A rally is a competition run on public roads that requires you to follow driving instructions while performing a task along the way. As a "car person" the chances are good you've already run a rally as part of a regional or national club event. Common formats include the "poker" or "question and answer" rallies, where you gather playing cards or look for answers along the route.

T-S-D (Time Speed Distance) Rallies: Most car buffs are also familiar with the Sports Car Club of America' European style "time-speed-distance" (T-S-D) rallies that they've been running for more than 50 years. These are based on precision: you are still driving on public roads and obeying all traffic laws, but in addition to staying on the route, the ultimate task to perform is to arrive at the finish exactly on time.

Vintage Rallying: Vintage rallying sort of bashes those formats together to form an intriguing competition suitable for antique cars, while still requiring precision driving skills. This format eliminates the odometer; you're given the speed and the time, but not the distance. No computers, maps or calculators are permitted. You are given your route instructions, and you provide the pencil, a time-of-day clock, a stopwatch and your performance chart for your car, which provides you with a reference of precise time lost due to various maneuvers such as stopping, accelerating to speed, or turning at each speed. You work to stay right on course and make all the speed changes precisely, so that at any point on the route a surprise checkpoint can record your time and compare it to the perfect score. Seconds off, either early or late, dictates your score.

Keep your eyes on the AACA website and the event calendars in both Antique Automobile magazine and Speedster to see what tours are being hosted by AACA and maybe try one out for yourself. No matter what type of touring you may decide to do, the most important rule to remember is to always enjoy the drive.





The 1940s is commonly abbreviated as "the 40s

Most of World War II took place in the first half of the decade, which had a profound effect on most countries and people in Europe, Asia, and elsewhere. The consequences of the war lingered well into the second half of the decade, with a war-weary Europe divided between the jostling spheres of influence of the Western world and the Soviet Union, leading to the beginning of the Cold War. To some degree internal and external tensions in the post-war era were managed by new institutions, including the United Nations, the welfare state, and the Bretton Woods system, facilitating the post-World War II economic expansion, which lasted well into the 1970s. The conditions of the post-war world encouraged decolonization and the emergence of new states and governments, with India, Pakistan, Israel, Vietnam, and others declaring independence, although rarely without bloodshed. The decade also witnessed the early beginnings of new technologies (such as computers, nuclear power, and jet propulsion), often first developed in tandem with the war effort, and later adapted and improved upon in the post-war era.

percent over the 1930 population of 122,775,046 people. The census date of record was April 1, 1940. This census introduced sampling techniques; one in 20 people were asked additional questions on the census form. Other innovations included a field test of the census in 1939. This was the first census in which every state (48) had a population greater than 100,000.

Sports Overview


In the early 1940s, sports organizations tried to entertain Americans. But after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, disruption in sports schedules could not be avoided. Millions of American women went to work in factories during World War II, and women athletes found themselves in demand as the shortage of male sports talent grew worse.

After the war, professional sports began to turn into big business. The hardships of the Great Depression (1930– 39) were over, and attendance at sports events began to rise. Television brought increased audiences to games and extra money for advertisers. In 1949, the National Basketball Association (NBA) was set up to organize basketball on a national level. In baseball, players negotiated a minimum salary of \$5,500 per year in 1947 and persuaded the owners to set up a pension fund for retired and injured ball players.

As travel became easier with the new aircraft technology and as television spread across the country, salaries for top players shot up.

As sports became richer and the number of fans began to grow, racial barriers started to break down. When African American Jackie Robinson joined the Brooklyn Dodgers in April 1947, he broke the color barrier in professional baseball. Within a few years, a handful of black players had become among the best in the game.

After 1945, American sports gradually became part of the entertainment industry. New professional organizations and commissions modified the rules of play to ensure maximum entertainment value. Between 1946 and 1952, the income major league baseball received from television rose from one million to five million dollars. Athletes delighted fans with more and more spectacular achievements. After the hardships of depression and war, American sports helped create a new, optimistic national mood.
