Driving with Great Grandpa Jim

Recently Darrin Dahlenburg and I stopped by the Henderson museum to drop off some of the last remaining Founders Tour items for Jim. We found him directing construction of his new office, making sure there was a glass door for the shower/tub. This new office will be quite something with plate glass windows to oversee the cars. It also looks like it will be twice the size of the rabbit warren Jim is currently sharing with assistants Jan and Kristi.

Jim was in an expansive mood and decided to tell us about a recent adventure he had had with great grandson Bennett. Bennett is 17 and Jim is quite excited that he is showing an interest in his old cars. On the previous Saturday, Jim had offered to let Bennett drive one of the cars, the cream and green 1954 Ford Skyliner. This is a beautiful car with the plexiglass roof and a section of plexiglass in the hood to expose the motor. This car was taken around to various Ford dealers as a demonstrator of Ford excellence for 1954. The car is loaded, automatic transmission, power steering, breaks, windows, seat and air conditioning. A/C was quite rare in a Ford in 1954 with only a handful being produced.

Jim says he had told Bennett to get with Mark Glenn the day before the drive to get the car unearthed from the museum and running. However, when they arrived on Saturday, the car sat, untouched, buried at least four deep. Not quite sure what happened, Jim told Bennett they could move the other cars and free-up the Ford.

First, they had to see if it would run. They soon found out that the battery was dead. No big deal, Jim showed Bennett how to jump off a car, or rather get a car to turn over. As with most old cars, the gas in the carburetorhad evaporated. They removed the air cleaner and carefully dripped in some gas. With a charged battery and gas, the car came to life.

The car,however, wouldn't move. Flat tire. Another learning lesson, how to pump up a tire. Finally, with Jim driving, they cleared the museum. The car started to baulk, sputter and complain as they headed out on the road. Jim said he figured the car had not been run recently and just needed to be blown out. After a bit, the car did settle down and Jim got Bennett to drive. It wasn't long before the car started to buck again. Jim said he told Bennett to just keep on going which he did, until Jim says, Bennett forced out the last bit of gas in the tank. They got the car mostly off the road.

Jim called Mark to bring some gas. Mark came with a 5-gallon can but they couldn't put gas into the tank



as the access to the tank is behind the license plate and the spigot from the can is too short (hidden access was common on many cars from the 1950's. Anyone know where the access is on a 1956 Chevrolet? A 1964 Comet?).

Mark said he could fix the problem and headed home to get some items. He returned with a fairly wide hose about 4-feet in length and some duct tape. He proceeded to tape the hose over the spigot on the tank and put the other end in the tank access. Jim said he probably added about 3-gallons.

These days, Jim has been told not to be out in the sun or the heat. As such, while waiting for Mark to fix-up the car, he said he was hiding out under a large bush (not a tree) on the side of the road. This is why he was wearing a ball cap and wanted to drive the air-conditioned Ford. With the car running, Jim wasted no time getting himself and Bennett back into the car and they hot-footed it back directly to the museum. They didn't even stop for more gas.

When we asked why they didn't stop for gas, Jim said he had no idea where Mark found the hose or what possibly could have been lodged it (dirt, gravel, weeds, bugs, paper bits, etc.). He was concerned that whatever that was it now could possibly be in the Ford's gas tank. When Darrin and I left the museum, we tracked down the Skyliner in the repair shop with the hood up.

As a final comment on the way out, Jim told us that he was buying a lifetime membership for Bennett with AACA and a DSR membership. One has to admit, for one of his first experiences with driving an old car, Bennett learned a lot more than just putting a key in the ignition.




1948 Tucker Model 48

Only 51 Tucker 48's were produced, and the car on view is the 2nd to last one ever built. At the end of World War II, the "big three" car manufacturers, Ford, Chevrolet, and General Motors, were not putting out any newly designed models due to using their resources to fund war efforts. This allowed for many of the smaller, lesser-known makers a chance to make a name for themselves. When Preston Tucker created the Tucker Car Corporation in the mid-1940s, he had high hopes of bringing in a new age of automobiles.

The first design sketches of the Tucker 48 appeared in a December, 1946 issue of Science Illustrated alongside a photo of a 1/8 scale model blown up to appear full size. Though it was only a nod to what would soon become a reality, the public was very excited about the impending Tucker sedan. Tucker brought on a host of famed designers and engineers, including Alex Tremulis, previously of Auburn Automobile Company, to help bring the car to life in a very short period of time.

All 51 of the Tuckers ever produced were hand-built in Tucker's factory in Chicago, and ready for sale in the 1948 model year. Sadly, despite the incredible amount







of excitement following the development of this new company, Tucker Car Corporation closed its doors forever on March 3, 1949, just two years after production of the sedan began. Tucker Car Corporation was very publicly investigated by the SEC for stock fraud in 1948, which lead to an equally publicized trial. The company was fully acquitted not long after the investigation began, but the negative backlash from the public scared most of Tucker's investors out of the business.

The Tucker 48 was considered to be a technological marvel at the time, and referred to as the "car of tomorrow" by Preston Tucker himself. It featured many revolutionary safety features that hadn't been seen before. These included a windshield that would entirely pop out in an accident so as not to shatter all over the passengers, and a large space in place of the front dash where the passengers could conceivably duck into during an accident.

This chassis, according to reports and an inventory taken at the factory just before its closure, actually left the factory without a transmission. It was sold at auction in 1950 to a St. Louis-area collector, where it was finally outfitted with a transmission in the early 50's. Though the metallic bronze-colored paint is from an older aesthetic restoration, the interior broadcloth, dashboard switchgear, and Kaiser-sourced door handles are believed to be the 1948 originals.

The Tucker 48 was a pioneer in the late 1940's, introducing advanced design aspects, safety features and engineering firsts to the automobile industry. The most recognizable feature of the Tucker 48 was a third directional headlight known as the "Cyclops Eye". Centrally located, it would activate at steering angles of greater than 10 degrees to light the car's path around corners. At the time, 17 states had laws against cars having more than two headlights. Tucker fabricated a cover for the center light for use in these states. This unique design feature set the Tucker apart from all other cars on the road, and gave the car a futuristic look on the road. While earlier cars had large headlamps that rotated as the front wheels turned, none before the Tucker had a rotating headlight that was flush with the front end of the car.

The inventor of the windshield wiper was a woman. One of the mainstays of 50s pop culture is Audrey Hepburn, probably the most recognizable Hollywood actress of her era and beyond. She debuted in the 1953 film Roman Holiday, which won her an Academy Award.

One of the most monumental achievements from the 1950s was the first human ascent to the summit of the tallest mountain on Earth, Mount Everest. It was made on 29 May 1953 by the sherpa Tenzing Norgay and British explorer Sir Edmund Hillary.

Our 1950s fun facts wouldn't be complete without mentioning some of our favorite TV shows, and probably the best one of them all is I Love Lucy. One of the most successful sitcoms of all time, it first aired in 1951.

This 1950s fun fact deals with one of the most iconic pageants in the country: the Miss America Pageant. In 1954, the prestigious event was first broadcast to the entire country on live television from the Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City.

The most scientifically significant 1950s fact is the passing of the National Aeronautics and Space Act on 29 July 1958, which created the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). The space agency went on to achieve the first human moon landing in history just a little over a decade later.

A fast food phenomenon that came to define the American lifestyle, the McDonald's hamburger chain had its roots in the 1940s – but the McDonald's franchise under Ray Kroc credits 15 April 1955 as its founding date. The first burgers were sold for a cheap 15 cents each.

America was swept up by the hula hoop craze in the 1950s. The iconic toy was first designed by Arthur K. "Spud" Melin and Richard Knerr. It was an instant success, and they sold 25 million units in the first four months

Yet another feature of American life was introduced in the 1950s with the opening of the first indoor mall, in Minnesota. Named the Southdale Center, it's the oldest temperature-controlled indoor mall in the U.S.

The now-iconic Barbie doll was first introduced in March 1959 by Ruth Handler and the Mattel company. It was inspired by a German doll called Bild Lilli.

Ben Hur was released on 18 November 1959 and went on to become one of the most successful films in history. It won a total of 11 Academy Awards, a record that wasn't broken until decades later by the film Titanic in 1998.


