The beautiful cars come rolling in





Volunteering for Cruisin' the Coast 2022

Well, we went and did it. On Saturday September 24, Kathy and I spent a few hours helping stuff about 9,500 goody bags to be handed out at the actual event scheduled for October 2 through October 9. A lot of people were there to make light work of the job. Henry Ford would be proud of the assembly-line efficiency of the process. You can see the three rows of tables in the picture below.

They also had a door from an old car (don't remember what kind, but think it was a Comet?) that is refurbished and painted with a logo for the event. I believe I understood them to say that every year a bit more will be added to the logo so the door is slightly different every year, but distinct differences will be added. Imagine photo's similar to the one below taken through the years. Pretty cool!

Sometime between September 24th and October 3rd, many bags had event t-shirts added. At the event, volunteers would bring requested bags with t-shirt sizes (adding additional shirts if more than 1 shirt was ordered)

to the front-desk operators. A good process for ordering the bag was similar to orders given to a short-order cook... "1-medium add 1-2x and 1 small. Also need 1-large and





1-5x." That, for clarification, is 3 different bags, one bag has 3 shirts, and the other 2 bags have 1 shirt each. As preshirt-stuffed bags were depleted, the volunteers would stock new bags with shirts for the next (or continuing) wave of recipients. It worked well and there was plenty of help (thanks to all that were there, reading this or not!).

I did, however, get a few photos later in the day and throughout the week. We saw a 1948 Thames Panel Van. For those who don't know, that's basically an Anglia except it's a van. I don't think he was actually in the Cruise, but that doesn't stop people from bringing cars and cruising. There were a few other British cars and a really cute Japanese car called a Figaro

that was imported from Japan. It is another of the few righthand drive cars in the left-hand drive U.S.A.

British Car Show in Fairhope

Did we have a car show! WOW! The weather on 22nd October could not have been more beautiful and we're always grateful for that. There were 141 cars registered to fill the show field. They came from afar: New Hampshire, Tennessee, and the far north of Alabama. Our spotlighted marque, the Triumph TR6, lined the field with about twenty, We had Land Rovers, MG's, Austin Healys, and we welcomed a growing class of about half a dozen beautiful British motorcycles. We had (exclusively) British valve cover races(gravity powered) as our new event for this year. And as well, we had four vendors on the grounds with interesting wares to show us. We also developed picturesque 8x20 foot backdrop for car photos. It should enhance fond memories of this year's show. The Friday night party was a sensational feast and we had door prize drawings on Friday night and on Show Day, so everyone went home with just what they needed. 19 marques were represented, spanning 93 years, from the present day Range Rovers and Jaguars, to a 1930 MG M-Type (the first

of Cecil Kimber's creations bearing the octagonal badge with an inscribed octagonal "MG", after the bull nose Morris Oxfords). Caretakers, or preservationists (we're not just "owners"), from eight states came to Fairhope.

Someone long ago must have looked at local climatology, and found October is our driest month. It's ironic since the following Saturday the 29th, it was a really sloppy day. Such sloppy days have happened to a couple of British Car Festivals, including 2019, as well as a couple of close calls while at the beach in years past.

2022 BCF Winners included the Richard B. Cunningham, Jr., Memorial Best in Show Award won by Jeff Herndon, and his 1954 Jaguar XK120. They, (and Jeff's 1970 E-Type 2+2) met Jay Leno during 2022's Cruising the Coast. That XK-120 also won the Pastor's Pick from Fairhope United Methodist Church. Jeff also brought his 1970 Jaguar E-Type. DSR's own Mac McNamara and family brought their Ford Anglia. I brought my MGA 1600 MkII.

Like I said, 8 states and 1600 miles. In years past we had

an MG-TC trailered from Houston, a Triumph TR-4 driven from Appleton, Wisconsin, and a Triumph TR-3 was driven from Chicago, each on the open road, but not interstates. The joy of driving a Brit roadster is best experienced on twisty county, state, and US highways. But this year we broke a record. The 2022 Longest Distance Traveled Award went to Mason Blosser, who traveled 1600 miles in a 1979 MG Midget from Manchester, New Hampshire. He's been with us a long time and moved there a few years ago.

Marques present included Lotus, Morgan, MG (M-Type, TD, TF, MGA, MGB, MGC including GT's) modern and classic Land Rover, Sunbeam (mainly Tigers and Alpines) Triumph Spitfire and GT6, Triumph TR6, Triumph Sports, pre-1968 (TR-2, 3. 3A, 4, 4A, and 250). Plus. we hosted Triumph and Norton Motorcycles dating back to the early 1960s. The Triumph motorcycle and the car line were not of the same manufacturer.

In years past we've had Buick powered MGB-GT-V8s, and Triumph TR-8, not retrofits but Authentic Original factory built cars, using the Y-bodied Buick/Pontiac/Olds 215 V-8. Rover later re-tooled that engine with the same

CID, and strengthened for a lengthened career in the British car industry. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Buick_Special#1961%E2%80%931963

It should be noted that British automotive parlance, some soft tops ("hoods" in Britspeak) are often described as "roadsters", "tourers", "Open Two Seaters" (OTS), or Drophead Coupés (DHC). A DHC generally has a few more creature comforts than an OTS, but not many. One is that the top folds back along and slightly above the rear body, and in the case of a Jaguar XK-120, may have a color matched windscreen frame, door handles, and wind-up windows, instead of a chrome windscreen frame, no door handles (reach inside in the door pocket and pull a cable) and side curtains. Most tops are manually taken down or up, but electrically operated soft tops can also be had. Jaguar fans seem to favor claiming of the terms, OTS and DHC, but other makes like the 1939 Aston Martin 15/98 (OTS) and DB2/4 (DHC) also have been referred to in such terms. One may recall the 1953 DB2/4 in Hitchcock's "The Birds", and in the closing scene, how easily Rod Taylor reached back (with thebirds all clucking as if ready to

attack in a fading evening light) and brought the top up over the car and secured it before making an escape with the ladies.

A 2-seater hard top is often called a Fixed Head Coupé (FHC) in Jaguars, or coupés such as the MGA Coupé. A "2+2" is a slightly lengthened coupé, like later E-Types.

Sedans are often called "saloons" but don't include gunfighters, poker games or rotgut whiskey. Station wagons are often called "shooting brakes" since they were used for hunting in the UK, but this time it actually does involve guns. That term can be applied to SUV's as well.






October 2022

Old Business: Christmas Dinner is confirmed with same date as last meeting, Christmas Brunch announced


Comments on Cruisin' The Coast: Ray Harper said it went well, stressed importance of going through the site manager in assigning volunteers their location

NASA launched the Hubble Telescope in 1990.

Arguably the most famous telescope, NASA named its space telescope after American astronomer Edwin Hubble.
